Shriners Plan Annual Show

Officers of the Klamath Falls Shrine Club, headed by Charles Yorkland, as circus chairman are making last minute preparations for the sixth annual Shrine Circus produced by Polak Brothers.

The big circus, showing Tuesday and Wednesday, August 10-11 at the Klamath County Fairgrounds is bringing new and thrilling acts this season, including an elephant troupe, the prodigies featuring Baby Opal. These six "little girls" arrived last year from Cambodia, Indochina and perform for the first time this year in Klamath Falls.

The program includes other big animal acts, famous acrobats and aerialists, "Norbu" the gorilla that's really a man, a troupe of apes who perform acts usually accomplished only by human beings, mirthmakers and velvet-tongued Ginny Lowry who sings her way into the heart of her audience.

Arthur Springer will be ringmaster.

Two shows will be given daily. Matinee performances start at 2:15 p.m. The evening show starts at 8:15 p.m.

Civil Defense Tests Planned

COVENTRY, England, (AP)—The Churchill government takes over the civil defense reins of this war-battered city this week. Socialist city councilors washed their hands of the whole business months ago, contending civil defense is useless against an H-bomb.

Civil defense work will go on just the same, with the city's 3,000 volunteer workers putting in two or three hours a week at first aid lectures and rescue drill—and the national government will continue to foot the bill.

The Council voted last April to disband its preparedness machinery. One H-bomb on the city, they said, and there wouldn't be anybody left to rescue anybody else anyway.

Personal appeals by Home Secretary Sir David Maxwell Fyfe failed to move the Council, so last week the government stepped in and appointed three outside officials to form a commission and run the show.

It has all worked out nice and smoothly. The government keeps civil defense going in Coventry—and the Council has registered its protest.

The only people likely to be not so pleased about the whole business are the local taxpayers. Getting three top officials in from London is going to add a penny or two to the local taxes.

Under a 1948 act of Parliament, local authorities have to foot the bill for any outside help sent in to carry out duties they refuse to accept.

Ex-Banker Goes On Trial

CLAYTON, Ala. (AP)—Ex-banker Royall Reynolds, whose disappearance last March brought sleepy Clot, Ala., awake with a start, goes on trial today on embezzlement charges.

Reynolds' disappearance tied up funds in the now-defunct unchartered Merchant's Money Exchange at the critical spring planting period. He returned two weeks later. An audit showed a \$75,000 deficit in the bank's funds.

A citizens' committee agreed to accept a settlement under which depositors would get back all except about 10 to 15 per cent of their money. Reynolds liquidated all his personal holdings and his relatives chipped in to make up all except about \$9,000 of the deficit.

Alaska Cable Job Started

SEATTLE (AP)—Construction is underway on a \$6,750,000, 370-mile underwater cable system linking Skagway and Ketchikan and other Alaskan points, the Army announced Monday.

When completed, the new cable is expected to be joined at Ketchikan with an 800-mile, 15 million-dollar submarine cable planned by the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. to furnish additional communications between the southeast Alaska town and Port Angeles, Wash.

Both the Signal Corps and AT&T systems are expected to be completed by late 1956 and will provide a capacity of 36 telephone circuits, the Army said.

Telephone service between Alaska and the United States is now handled over 14 radio and land line circuits operated by the Alaska Communication System, a branch of the Army Signal Corps. Certain of these facilities will continue to be operated as a supplementary system.

The ACS now provides long-line communications throughout Alaska and between the territory and the United States. The system comprises some 45 separate stations which furnish direct telephone and telegraph service to all major cities in Alaska and to all military installations there.

Harmon To Head Air Academy

WASHINGTON (AP)—Lt. Gen. Hubert R. Harmon has been named superintendent of the new Air Force Academy, Air Force Secretary Talbot announced Monday after gaining the approval of President Eisenhower for the appointment.

Harmon, who has been special assistant for air academy matters since the end of 1949, was a Military Academy classmate of the President.

Harmon will have the job of organizing the staff and directing the start of the air academy at its temporary quarters at Lowry Field, Denver, Colo., when the school opens next year.

Huge Brush Fire Rages

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)—A gigantic brush fire, roaring through 5,000 to 6,000 acres of pine and post oak southeast of here, burned into its second week today.

But a fire that cut a 2,000-acre swath out of cedar brake and brush country 20 miles northwest of the state capital was believed "generally under control" after destroying three homes in the Lake Travis area last night.

The roaring fires, visible for miles last night, added smoke and eye-stinging cinders and ashes to drought-harried central Texas' miseries.

The blazes flared to major size last night after a day of 109-degree temperatures in this region, without normal rainfall for months.

The state highway patrol said some 250 volunteers had the fire around Dodd City, lake resort community to the northwest, under "general control" before 10 p.m. last night. But the big blaze threatening the eastern edge of the 5,000-acre Bastrop State Park, 35 miles to the southeast, burned on.
