McKay Plans Vacation
 PORTLAND (AP) - Interior Secretary McKay, who has just completed an official tour of Alaska, hopes to spend the next few days resting at his beach cottage at Neskowin.
 The former Oregon governor, obviously tired, said on his arrival here Tuesday night that he hopes "people will let me alone."
 Asked by reporters for comment on the dismissal of 600 employees from the Bonneville Power Administration, McKay said he had not heard that it had been announced. But he added, "If it's all approved it's a good deal... There's probably room over there for some more cuts, if they've been over-stuffed."
 He said he regretted that Congress had killed the Hawaii-Alaska statehood bill. He said Hawaii is entitled to statehood now and that if such a bill could have gotten through Congress, an Alaska statehood bill would be easier to put across.
 McKay plans to go to Yosemite National Park for a horseback trip through the Sierras after his visit in Oregon.

Change In Tax Deadline Asked
 PORTLAND (AP) - A proposal that the Oregon state income tax due date be changed from April 15 to March 15 was advanced Tuesday at a meeting of the Legislative Interim Committee on Taxes.
 The committee referred the proposal to the Legislature's Tax Committee. It was made because the federal government has changed its tax due date from March 15 to April 15.
 State Sen. Howard C. Belton, Canby, chairman, reported that the committee is nearing agreement on timberland appraisals. For some time the committee has been studying reports for the state assessment and appraisal system.

CONTACT LONDON - Russian explorers and oceanographers are in the Arctic regions in force, the Moscow Radio said Wednesday. An English broadcast reported radio contact had been made with "one of the Soviet expeditions on an ice floe in the central Arctic."

Helicopter Saves Sailor
 DARRINGTON, Wash. (AP) - A Pennsylvania sailor missing since Friday on a bear hunting trip in the Cascade Mountains near here was rescued Tuesday after a helicopter spotted him frantically waving from a log.
 The missing enlisted man, Jay Vernon, 25, Irwin, Pa., suffered a leg injury after he became lost last Friday while he and two other sailors from Whidbey Island, (Wash.) Naval Air Station were hiking up 5,600-foot Prairie Mountain, 12 miles east of here.
 The pilot of the Coast Guard helicopter, Lt. R. E. Bracken, said Vernon was lying in a small clearing. Unable to land there, Bracken hovered over the spot and lowered aviation machinist mate R. H. Wheeler from the "copter" to the spot, then directed a ground party to the rescue.
 Bracken put down nearby and later flew the injured man back to Whidbey.
 Vernon had become separated from his two companions when he stopped to rest while they went ahead to look for a camp site. He was gone when they went back for him. Vernon was carrying the pack containing the party's food.

Steel Leader Optimistic

NEW YORK (AP) - Benjamin F. Fairless, board chairman of United States Steel Corp., believes his own company and the steel industry will operate at between 70 and 75 per cent of capacity for the rest of the year.
 The outlook for the nation's economy is "good, for peacetime," says Fairless.
 His company, greatest steel producer in the world, reported Tuesday that its second quarter net income was more than four million dollars higher than net income for the first quarter.
 The second quarter figures were \$49,020,738 or \$1.63 a share compared with the first quarter's \$44,820,376 or \$1.48 a share.
 In booming 1953 the second quarter was \$55,640,806 or \$1.89 a share.
 The first six months of 1954 showed big steel with a net income of \$93,651,114, or \$3.11 a share compared with \$105,016,764 or \$3.54 a share for the first half of '54.
 U.S. Steel declared its usual quarterly dividend of 75 cents a share on common stock payable Sept. 10 to holders of record Aug. 6. The regular quarterly dividend of \$1.75 on preferred is payable Aug. 20 to holders of record Aug. 3.
