

Eastern Trip Should Tell Milwaukee's Story

Giants Snap Streak

The Milwaukee Braves are building up steam for a fast sweep along the Eastern Seaboard which should determine whether there is any substance to the ghost of the National League pennant race.

A highly regarded entry during spring training, the Braves flourished through the first half of the season. But they've started to roll in the last two weeks and last night they ran their current winning streak to six games with a 6-4 victory at Pittsburgh.

A getaway game with the Pirates today will be followed by four games in Brooklyn starting tomorrow night, three in Philadelphia and three with the New York Giants.

It would take a virtual sweep to make the Braves a serious threat. Teams have done it before, although not recently.

Milwaukee trails the second place Dodgers by 8 games and the Giants by 10. In the past week the Braves have cut their deficit by 5 1/2 lengths.

Neither the Braves nor the Dodgers gained any ground yesterday because the Giants broke their six-game losing streak at the expense of the St. Louis Cardinals 10-0. Philadelphia vaulted into fourth place with a 3-2 victory over Cincinnati, Brooklyn defeated Chicago 3-1.

The Cleveland Indians kept rolling over the Boston Red Sox, 2-1 for the 15th time in 16 decisions. New York beat Chicago 7-5 on Mickey Mantle's three-run homer in the ninth. Joe Coleman pitched a three-hitter as Baltimore trimmed Washington 2-1 and Detroit trounced Philadelphia 10-2.

Walls, Jackson Falling

NEW YORK (AP)— Hurricane Tommy Jackson of New York and Earl Walls of Edmonton, Alberta, tumbled in the latest heavyweight ratings by Ring Magazine, revised Wednesday night by Editor Nat Fleischer.

Ezzard Charles, the ex-champ from Cincinnati, remains the No. 1 contender, followed closely by Nino Valdes, the Cuban giant who stopped the Hurricane two weeks ago.

Don Cockell who fights Harry Matthews in Seattle Friday, remained in the No. 3 place and Matthews moved up a notch to seventh. Jimmy Slade, the original "spoiler" of the Hurricane, still ranks fourth, followed by Roland LaStarza and Jackson.

Paul Andrews continues his advance in the light heavy class, ranking third behind challenger Harold Johnson, who boxes Archie Moore for the title Aug. 11 at Madison Square Garden, and ex-champ Joey Maxim. Andrews whipped Chubby Wright and knocked out Yvon Durelle in the last month. After Trinidad's Yolande Pompey lost to Moses Ward at Chicago, he was moved down a peg to sixth in the 175-pound division. Ex-Olympic champ Floyd Patterson is No. 5.

Joey Giardello regained the No. 2 contender spot in the middleweight class behind Rocky Castellani who has a title date with Bobo Olson Aug. 20 at San Francisco. Holly Mims was dropped to third.

Billy Graham fell from sixth to ninth among the welter after losing to Chris Christenson of Denmark. A couple of new faces edged into the top 10. Vince Martinez to No. 8 and Tony Demarco to No. 10.

Johnny Saxton, who is supposed to get next crack at Kid Gavilan's crown was dropped to fourth. Carmen Basilio of Canada, N. Y. remained in the No. 1 spot.

Marciano To Take Physical

NEW YORK (AP)— Rocky Marciano is in town today for a physical exam and a conference that probably will result in a Sept. 16 Yankee Stadium rematch with ex-champ Ezzard Charles.

The heavyweight champion has been vacationing at Cape Cod and Grossinger, N. Y. since he won a unanimous decision over Charles in a rousing 16-round bout at the Stadium, June 17. Charles fought a courageous battle but was well battered at the final bell.

In the hours after that battle with Charles, Dr. Vincent Nardello operated on Marciano's eye, removing old scar tissue from a fight of years ago. He had been cut again early in the Charles bout and bled freely throughout the contest.

Rocky still wears a slight scar over the eye as the result of that operation but believes he will be ready to start boxing in a week or 10 days.

"I'd like to fight again this year," he said yesterday. "The long layoff (nine months) was too much. I need more fights."

Al Weill, Rocky's manager, has been holding out on a definite signing with the excuse that he wanted to be sure that the eye had healed perfectly.

Rickey's Formula Places Ruth, Hubble High On List

NEW YORK (AP)—Branch Rickey, who has been coming up with ideas since he started in baseball a half-century ago, has a brand new one for the players and fans to mull over.

The 70-year-old general manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates has reduced to a mathematical formula the answer to why pennant winning teams of the past 35 years have been successful.

"The formula is so revealing and unrefutable," he says in a story in Life magazine, "that it has compelled me to put different values on some of my oldest and cherished memories."

For example he names his 25 top hitters and 10 best pitchers and the results are bound to cause controversy.

Babe Ruth is the No. 1 hitter and Carl Hubbell the best pitcher. Ty Cobb, who was regarded by many experts as the greatest hitter of all time, is only No. 23, and Hubbell is placed above the likes of Grover Cleveland Alexander, Lefty Grove and Dizzy Dean.

In the hitting department, George Sisler, Bill Terry and Paul Waner, all of whom were over the .400 mark at least once in their careers, are not listed in the top 25.

The formula works on the basis that the team with the widest margin in scoring runs as compared to the giving up of runs usually wins the pennant. Rickey says it has proved correct 96.2 per cent of the time in the last 20 years.

It deals solely with offense, with the stress on power. He scoffs at fielding averages, and takes these three basic ingredients: 1. On base average 2. Extra base power 3. Clutch hitting combined with speed and ability to take the extra base.

Under his rating, Rickey rates Ted Williams second to Ruth followed, in order, by Jimmy Fox, Rogers Hornsby, Hank Greenberg, Ralph Kiner, Stan Musial, Joe DiMaggio and Mel Ott.

In rating the pitchers, Rickey admits he has not been able to figure a better method than the present one of earned run averages — the
