



FRUIT KEBAB is a memorable dessert for your next backyard or patio grill dinner. Set out a large dish of varied, colorful pieces of sweet juicy fruit — halved peaches, halved apricots, large prunes, pineapple, cantaloupe chunks and sliced bananas — a skewer for each guest and let each one string his own kebab. Fruit bowl should be marinated in advance with 1 cup grapefruit juice, 1/2 cup honey, 1/2 teaspoon chopped mint. Baste fruit kebab while broiling, if desired. Broil 5 to 8 minutes, then slide fruit off onto a plate and smack your lips.



PEACH SHORTCAKE makes a quick summer dessert. Using a yellow cake mix, bake a two-layer cake and cool. At serving time, arrange sliced, sweetened peaches over the bottom layer. TASTE TEMPTER is this Southern Spoon bread. Easy to prepare, it combines eggs, sweet milk and butter with the tangy taste of corn meal to provide a healthful as well as tasty hot bread. ### Southern Spoon Bread

Among the South's many contributions to good eating for folks everywhere is Southern Spoon Bread. A true Southerner, of course, would never use anything but white, water-ground corn

meal, but Westerners seem to prefer yellow corn meal.  
1 1/2 cups corn meal  
2 cups boiling water  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
2 tablespoons butter  
1 1/2 cups sweet milk  
3 eggs, separated  
(If self-rising corn meal is used, omit salt)

Sprinkle corn meal into boiling water gradually, stirring constantly until smooth and free from lumps. Add salt, butter and milk. Add well-beaten egg yolks and mix well. Beat egg white until stiff but not dry, and fold into corn meal mixture. Pour into a buttered 1 1/2-quart baking dish and bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, 45 minutes. Serve at once from baking dish, topped with butter, if desired. Yield: 60 to 8 servings.
