Champion Sees No Changes

NEW YORK (AP)—Rocky Marciano thinks there is no danger of Ezzard Charles "doing a Walcott" in their September rematch.

"I think the guy's got guts," he said. "I kept pressing him all the time from the sixth round on. A lot of other guys fell apart. Some took 11 rounds, some 12 or 13 but most of them fell apart sooner or later."

"Only twice did I think I had him ready to go—the 10th round and the 15th."

We tried to draw out Rocky on whether he thought he might have softened up Charles for a second fight. He wouldn't try to answer. "It was tough on both of us," he said. "He hurt me a few times and I hurt him."

In the six weeks since the first fight, Rocky has been "lazing around" first at Cape Cod and later at Grossinger, N.Y., where he does his training. For the first time in a long time he was able to go back home to Brockton, Mass., long enough to hear what the neighbors had to say about his fight.

"A lot of people said they were glad it went the way it did," he said. "They told me they were happy to see me prove I could go 15 rounds and still win. They mentioned how a lot of my fellows said I couldn't win if it went to a decision."

"I've been doing some thinking about the first fight, too. I wasn't exactly satisfied. This time I hope to do a little better."

Lewiston, Yakima Both Win

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. Lewiston and Yakima still were running neck-and-neck Friday for the Western International League lead. Both teams posted victories Thursday night. The Braves salvaged the final game of their series with Salem, 3-2, to snap a five-game losing streak, and Yakima nipped Vancouver, 5-4.

That left the two teams virtually tied for the top spot. Lewiston leads by one-half game, but in the percentage column—the one that counts—the Braves have only a .004 advantage.

In other games Thursday night, Tri-City topped Wenatchee, 11-5, and Victoria manhandled Edmonton, 18-4.

Lewiston pushed across all three of its runs in the first inning. Singles by Don Hunter and Eddie Bockman, a double by Larry Barton and a walk and an error accounted for the scoring. Salem's rally came late in the game, Bill Ogden singling in one run in the seventh, and Harry Warner hitting a ninth-inning homer for the final tally. Joe Orrell, who went to Lewiston from the defunct Calgary club, gave up eight hits in pitching his second victory for the Braves.

At Yakima, three Vancouver hurlers held the Bears to just four hits but the effort went for naught. After losing the lead to the Capelinos in the eighth frame, Yakima rallied to take the game in the ninth. The winning run came when Len Noren singled in pinch runner Elmer Clowe. Two conversions by starter Charley Cumbre for seven runs in the first three innings and that was the ball game. The Chiefs' Tom Munoz had a good night at bat, driving in three runs. He homered in the fifth with one on and doubled in the seventh, also with a man aboard. Ross McCormick also homered for the Chiefs. Playing manager Edo Vanni and Bob Moniz drove in three runs apiece for Tri-City.

The heavy clubs were swinging at Victoria where the T-Yees jumped on two Edmonton hurlers for 17 hits. The issue was settled early as Victoria piled up a 13-0 lead in the first three innings. Don Lundberg hit two home runs for the winners and Neil Sheridan had two bases-loaded doubles to his credit. Johnny Tierney held Edmonton to three hits until the eighth when he eased behind his huge lead to permit three runs on a trio of hits.

The teams change opponents Friday night. Lewiston is at Tri-City, Edmonton at Salem, Victoria at Yakima and Vancouver at Wenatchee.

Empire Games Underway

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP)—The fifth British Empire Games, the Commonwealth's own "Olympics" came into being Friday with some of the world's top athletes including two men who have broken the four-minute mile—ready for fresh assaults on world standards.

Climaxing months of preparation in all parts of the world, track and field men, swimmers and fencers were set for nine days of competition in what was conceded to be Britain's greatest sports spectacle since inauguration of the games 24 years ago.

Royalty was in the reviewing stands. The royal family was represented by the Duke of Edinburgh, and Field Marshal Lord Alexander, former governor-general of Canada, was here to take part in the official opening ceremonies.

An unofficial American representative was to be Adlai Stevenson, 1952 Democratic presidential candidate, who was scheduled to stop over on his way back from a tour of Alaska.

The competitions, from fencing to the more glamorous deeds in track and field, were still 24 hours away. Colorful full-dress uniforms, bands, pageantry and the parade of 775 athletes from 24 countries will open the games officially tonight.

For the ritual of the opening ceremony, Sir Arthur Porritt, chairman of the British Empire Games federation, will mount a tribune of honor. Upon his request, Field Marshal Lord Alexander will declare the games open.

Bill Parnell of Vancouver, winner of the British Empire games mile four years ago in Auckland, New Zealand, will take the oath on behalf of all the athletes.

The last few days have marked a tapering-off in the practice work of those who seek to better what the athletes of 1930 to 1950 accomplished.

There is at least one exception man who wrote into world records an almost unbelievable 3:58 for the mile is perhaps the most arduous of all in training.

A week from Saturday thousands of persons in Vancouver's new Empire Stadium—and millions throughout the world—expect to find out what happens when Landy meets England's Roger Bannister, the man who first smashed the four-minute mile with 3:59.4.

Bannister has worked largely in secret but Landy has galloped in full view of hundreds of spectators over the UBC cinder track. The Australians have made no secret of Landy's time. They expect to clip off a few days ago in 2:59.4. The next day it was 2:04.

Over the same practice track Thursday he put on a show of endurance. He ran a quarter-mile in 58 seconds, took a rest and then coasted along the full mile in 4:14.4. Another hour's rest and he whipped through the three-quarters in 2:59.5.

The track and field events get under way Saturday, a three-hour show from 3 to 6 p.m. PDT. Five finals are carded—the 100-yard sprints for men and women, the six-mile run and the men's high jump and women's shot put.

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Out Of Doors With The Sportsman

Fishing seems to be at its peak now, and should continue to be good to excellent for most anglers who fish the streams in this area. Fly fishing seems to be picking up all over the Basin and nearby

streams, as the season gradually passes by the calendar, but some of the spin fishermen are continuing to bring home the nice trophies that have been taken in quantity so far this year.

Williamson River, which has been slow to trolling so far, should begin to pick up near the mouth of the stream, while fly fishing near Collier Park should also be coming into its own.

As far as spin fishing is concerned, the Williamson has produced some very good catches, both in size and number this past week to many local anglers.

The Woolly Worm, Black Drake, Gray Hackle or any of the Mosquito flies should produce some catches for the fly enthusiast, while the M-Barr Spoon, any of the Wobble-Rites, Wobble Lures and the Freak Wobblers have been working good for most spin casters.

Wood River has slowed down in some departments, but fishing for fly anglers should continue to be fairly good with other catches also being made by spin fishermen and those who prefer to use single eggs or night crawlers.

Both Forks of the Sprague River, are also remaining in the run-off for top fishing areas, as fly fishermen have been having a paradise in most sections of the stream, with the usual number of catches reportedly taken on worms and lures.

The Super-Duper along with Wobble Rites and the other spinning lures seems to fit the bill for spinning, while any of your Gray Hackle or Coachman flies should tell the story for fly fishing.

The Sycan and Chewaucan, in the Bly area, are still producing

some nice fish, but only to those that care to work for their catches. Two other streams in the Bly area that should be good again this weekend are Dairy Creek and Long Creek. These two creeks have been hot as a fire cracker the past couple of weeks and this weekend shouldn't show any signs of slackening.

Lake fishing on the Upper Klamath and the Agency Lake waters

checked Baltimore on five hits in a 5-0 triumph.

In other action Chicago defeated Brooklyn 6-5; Milwaukee won its seventh straight, 5-3 over Pittsburgh in 10 innings and Detroit took a doubleheader from Philadelphia 4-2 and 7-3.

Today is Casey Stengel's 44th birthday but he's going to have to wait awhile longer for a present from his athletes.

The New York Yankees didn't quite make it to first place in time for the celebration. In fact, they haven't made it to first place any time this season although they've won more of their first 100 games than any Yankee club Casey has managed.

When they whipped Chicago 10-0 yesterday, they ran their record for the year to 67 won and 33 lost. None of the past five New York pennant winners has done as well.

New York trails Cleveland by a game and a half and the day-to-day question is how long can the two clubs keep up their sizzling pace.

During the last seven weeks the Yanks have won 37 out of 49, a .755 clip. The Indians captured 35 of 49 over the same period for a .714 mark, exactly equalling the best winning percentage ever compiled by an American League champion.

Who'll crack first? The man with the answer wins the jackpot. In 10 consecutive games with Cleveland and third place Chicago the Yankees won seven times. But two of the losses were to the Indians.

Yesterday, however, it was no contest. While the Yankees were routing the wishful White Sox, Cleveland collapsed before a Boston onslaught, bowing 10-2. The Red Sox had lost 15 out of 16 to Cleveland before turning on the league leaders.

Of the nine games played yesterday, four ended in shutouts. Whitey Ford held the White Sox to four hits in the Yankee victory. Vic Raschi, the ex-Yankee star now working for the St. Louis Cardinals, beat the New York Giants 8-0 on three hits. Corky Valentine of Cincinnati pitched a four-hitter against Philadelphia, winning 3-0 and Chuck Stobbs of Washington

E. J. Watkins, of Hanford, California, was the vacationing fisherman who landed the trophy catch this week. The 31 inch trout was taken on a Freak Wobbler. Watkins' fish took the top prize in Poole's big fish contest for the past week. Second place went to Edna Dakin, of Klamath Falls, with her nine pound eight ounce catch from the Williamson River on a silver Wobble-Rite.

The High Lakes are producing just about the best that they have ever done according to all the reports that can be collected. Island, Burt, and a few of the Skyline lakes have been very hot for anglers who hike into these fishing spots.

Crescent Lake and the Little Deschutes, to the North, were also reported as fair to good fishing. Fly fishing with the McGinty after clipping the wings was the hottest report from the Little Deschutes near Crescent.

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Raschi is in complete control of the league-leading Giants. He gave up two bases on balls and struck out a pair. The only New York hits were singles by Willie Mays, Bobby Hofman and Don Mueller. Ray Jablonski's bases-loaded double in the fifth was the big blow for St. Louis.

Pinch hitters flopped for Brooklyn as the Dodgers lost a chance to shave their two-game deficit. Manager Walt Alton used five and not one got the ball out of the infield. The final failure was George Shuba who grounded to first with the bases loaded and two out in the ninth. Hank Sauer and Ernie Banks homered for the Cubs.

The Braves had a close call in Pittsburgh. They tied the game in the ninth on three straight singles and added two more, including Hank Aaron's 13th home run, in the 10th.

Valentine not only pitched a shutout for the Redlegs, he was the batting star as well. He doubled twice, singled once and scored two of the four runs against the Phillies. The loss dumped Philadelphia into sixth place behind the Cardinals and Reds who are tied for fourth.

In the first game a two-run triple by Frank Bolling followed by a squeeze bunt by George Zverink put the Tigers in front in the fifth inning. In the second game the A's jumped ahead 3-0 but were caught and passed in the third inning when Bob Nieman hit a grand slam home run.

A pitching experiment failed for the Baltimore Orioles. Bonus rookie Bill O'Dell was given his first starting assignment but couldn't get past the first inning. Two doubles, a single and a walk brought Lou Kretlow to the rescue but it was too late since Stobbs was in shutout form for Washington.

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
