### ALOHA SOCIAL CLUB

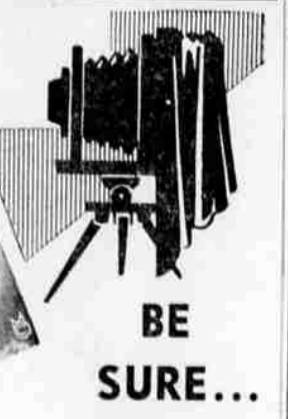
