

U.S. Demands Red Payments

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States is reported drafting a new demand that the Chinese Communists pay compensation for six Americans killed and wounded by Red fighter planes.

Diplomatic officials said today a vigorous second note — Red China rejected the first one — would be sent to the Peiping regime in the next few days.

The American note will renew a demand that all persons responsible for the attack be punished and that steps be taken to prevent any such future shootings.

Three Americans were killed and three others wounded when Communist planes shot down a British airliner last July 29 south of Red-held Hainan Island. Ten lives were lost in all.

The State Department dismissed as baseless yesterday a protest by the Communist government of Poland, made last Saturday, that American planes had fired on two Polish ships in the area of Hainan Island. A department spokesman said U.S. planes "have not fired on any ship in that area," and that the Polish note would be formally rejected.

KF Juvenile Problem Told

Since the federal government relinquished its law enforcement authority on the Klamath Indian Reservation, juvenile delinquency and dependency has reached alarming proportions.

This was the assertion Monday of County Juvenile Officers Francis Mathews and Faye Blackner who reported that during the past week, 15 Indian children were made wards of the juvenile court.

Since January 1, the Klamath County juvenile office has had 68 Indian cases referred to it. Of these cases, 48 required court action.

Mathews also said that the influx of Indian cases is over-crowding the county juvenile home and disrupting the normal functions of his office.

"Most of the dependency cases are the result of parents of the children being alcoholics," Mathews explained. "The Indian case load is increasing daily. Unless we obtain additional personnel, both for our office and the juvenile home, we will not be able to efficiently operate."

According to Mathews' report, the juvenile home provided 390 days of child care for Indians during the first six months of 1954.

Adlai Hits GOP In Latest Talk

GREAT FALLS, Mont. (AP)—Unemployment has increased at the rate of 3,000 a day since the Republicans returned to power and there has never been less harmony in the nation, Adlai E. Stevenson told 600 Montana Democrats last night.

"The 1952 Democratic presidential candidate said Americans have a new mood which he called 'gripping realism'." And he said the test of government today is in the governing.

"The prime purpose of government today are our safety and happiness," he said. "Are we safer and happier today than we were 18 months ago? I think not. I say we are less safe abroad."

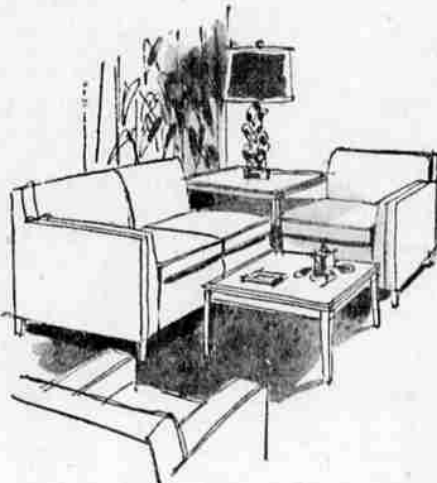
