"Use the Frying Pan," 11. Arrangement in a skillet, 12. Arrangement using vegetables, fruits, flowers (combine any or all), "Right in your own Back Yard," 13. Arrangement in a tin can, 14. Wild flowers in a rustic container for a picnic, "Come into the Garden," 15. Berries or vines in a jug or bottle, "Take these to your sick friend as you go," 16. Arrangements in a basket, "As you Like It," 17. Whatever you have, 18. Novice class (for those entering competition for the first time) Any arrangements, "In Memory of," 19. In a memory container (name in memory of whom), 20. An arrangement using something new you've grown this year.

Section 5. Class 1. Fruits in season, 2. Vegetables, 3. Grain, a "clutch" 3 inches in diameter, Ribbons will be awarded for the best collection, Ribbons will be awarded for the best specimens, Section 6. Ribbons awarded to exhibitors; prizes awarded to contestants, 1. Flowers set to music, arrangement must suggest title of song, 2. Largest variety of named weeds, 3. Grand Finale, "How I Look in my Garden!"

Rules and regulations for exhibitors. Containers for specimens only will be furnished. All specimens exhibits must have been by exhibitor. Exact count of specimens necessary. Specimens should not contain seed pods. Not more than one entry in each class may be made by one exhibitor. All entries and exhibits must follow the classes as specified. The committee in charge shall determine the eligibility for any class. Entries will be received from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. August 13. Judging will begin at 12 noon Standard Time. Commercial displays welcomed, but will not be placed in competition. A sweepstakes prize will be awarded to the exhibitor winning the most blue ribbons in show (in horticulture and arrangement). Ribbons will be awarded in all classes. First place, blue ribbon.

The decision of the judges will be final.

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Priest Rapids Meet Planned

EPHRAATA, Wash. (AP) — First steps toward deciding which agency will build the Priest Rapids power project on the Columbia River will be taken here Aug. 10 in a joint meeting of the Grant County Public Utility District and the State Power Commission.

It will be the first meeting of the two groups since Congress passed legislation authorizing public agencies in Washington state to build the project. Both the Grant PUD and the state commission have applied to the Federal Power Commission for permits to do preliminary planning.

PUD commissioners voted Tuesday to file an official protest with the FPC against the state commission's application. The 3-man board said the state commission filed its application on July 22, two years to the day after the PUD application was filed, "without legal authority for so doing." The commissioners contended, the state's action was in opposition to the PUD's application.

The meeting here next week was requested by Chairman Walter S. Gordon of the State Power Commission. He made the request after

West Yards Get Navy Business

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — West Coast shipyards will build some of the 29 ships the Navy plans to build this year, Secretary of the Navy Thomas said Tuesday.

He declined to say how much work would be allotted the West Coast. Thomas arrived here with GNE. Lemuel G. Sheppard, Marine Corps commandant, on a tour of Marine installations.

Thomas declared the Navy's construction program has "levelled off at about 75 per cent of its Korean War peak."

Cordon Backs Private Use Of Future Atomic Power

WASHINGTON — Reiterating his belief in private enterprise, Senator Guy Cordon said today that he nevertheless believes that there is an obligation on the government to make available to cooperative groups "adequate information so that they may utilize electric power from atomic energy whenever it becomes available or usable."

But he said the time has not yet come, and will not come for some years, when such power will be available, and that in the meantime, there will be adequate time to work out an appropriate program.

Senator Cordon, who is a member of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy, told the Senate during the recent atomic energy debate that in the issue of private versus public power, he believes in private enterprise. But he went on:

"I believe, however, Mr. President, that the people of the United States can still govern themselves, and the majority of them have a right to determine whether they desire service from private sources or whether they desire to serve themselves cooperatively."

"In connection with the future development of atomic energy for peaceful purposes, there are people who have cooperative, self-serving electrical devices, whether for the generation of electricity or for its transmission and distribution without generation. I believe there is an obligation on the government to make available to these people adequate information so that they may utilize electric power from atomic energy whenever it becomes available or usable."

"However when that time comes — and it is not here yet and will not be for years — it will be necessary for the government of the United States, through the Atomic Energy Commission, under the direction of a sound and well-planned and well-thought-out law, to provide for the handling of these new sources of energy in such a way as, first, to protect the source of the energy and, second, to protect the safety of the people in the areas where it is used. Therefore, it will be necessary, to have well thought out and stringent safeguards and rules and regulations."

"... It will be necessary for Congress to give attention to that matter. . . . When the time comes to provide the information, as well as the usability of atomic energy, not only to public bodies but to private enterprise, it will be necessary to create some type of agency of government to enforce the application of the rules and regulations which will emanate ultimately from the Atomic Energy Commission."

"We have adequate time to work out that sort of thing. There should be no hurried effort in that field." (Cordon for U. S. Senator Committee, W. H. Steiwer, Chairman, 234 Imperial Hotel, Portland, Oregon.)

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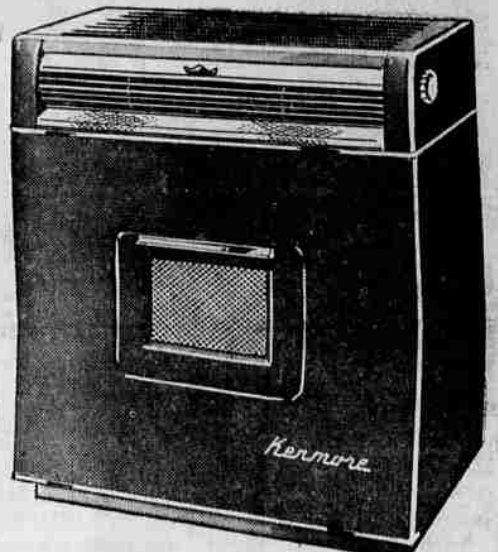
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GOP Policies Alarm Adlai

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP) — Adlai E. Stevenson said Tuesday night he is "alarmed at all of the Republican policies on natural resources."

"We seem to be approaching another crisis in this field," he said.

The 1952 Democratic presidential nominee made his comments after a trip in Lolo National Forest with Forest Service officials.

He planned to visit Bitter Root Valley Wednesday.

Republican power policies alarm him, Stevenson said, because of what he called the GOP's "partnership" approach.

He said he was concerned over Republican changes in the Soil Conservation Service and accused the GOP of taking the important jobs in that agency out of civil service and injecting "the spoils system and political patronage."

Stevenson came here after a tour of the Pacific Northwest and Alaska. He is scheduled to leave by plane Thursday morning for Kansas City, where he will confer with former President Harry S. Truman.

New Law Denies Hiss Pension
WASHINGTON (AP) — The House passed Tuesday a bill to deny government retirement pensions to federal employees convicted of subversive activity or claiming possible self-incrimination in refusing to talk before congressional committees.

The measure would not apply to retired government workers already receiving pensions.

The bill was aimed primarily at Alger Hiss, former State Department employee convicted of lying when he denied associations with espionage agents.

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
