WALL STREET
NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market suffered its heaviest selling wave of the year Wednesday, but showed surprising rebounding powers. Volume topped three million shares in the most active session since January 1951.

Late in the afternoon, prices were generally depressed, but considerably above the depths reached during the morning. Aircraft were firm, but railroads and steels continued to lag.

Ex-General Eyed For German Post

BONN, Germany (AP)—A general from Hitler's Wehrmacht, now engaged in anti-Soviet espionage for the United States, seems certain to win top command of West Germany's intelligence operations as a result of the John scandal.

Since Dr. Otto John, head of the Federal Security Bureau, ousted from Communist East Berlin July 20, Chancellor Konrad Adenauer has turned increasingly for advice and help to former Lt. Gen. Reinhold Gustav Gehlen. The army Chancellor is preparing a drastic shakeup of John's German "FBI" and may replace it with an entirely new office.

Gen. Gehlen is described by competent sources here as the Chancellor's choice to head government intelligence activities as soon as West Germany receives its sovereignty and starts rearming for Western defense.

Gehlen was chief of military intelligence on the Russian front from 1942 to 1945. Captured by the Americans, after a few months he was put in charge of a small staff of captured German intelligence officers to evaluate information that the fallen Nazi regime had collected on Russia.

When the cold war sharpened after his release, Gehlen was handed a more important task—to collect new intelligence on the Soviet Union. He is now reputed to have a staff of 4,000. He maintains a tightly guarded headquarters at Pullach near Munich in Bavaria. German newspapers say the Gehlen organization receives about six million dollars a year from the United States. American officials call Gehlen "priceless."

While Gehlen works for the Americans, he also cooperates closely with the West German government.

Redmond Spud Meet Planned

The Oregon-California Potato Committee, administering federal marketing order No. 59, will hold its annual meeting for organizational purposes, after a few months in the Redmond City Hall, Redmond, at 1 p.m. (PST) August 5. It was announced here Tuesday by Merrill Webb, president of the committee.

Shipping regulations for the 1954 potato crop will be considered at the meeting. Committee officers for the 1954-55 fiscal year will be elected, and committee action will be taken on any other items of business that will be presented.

Committee members and alternate committee members are asked to attend. Other interested parties are welcome, Webb stated.

Iowa Planning Hoover Day

WEST BRANCH, Iowa (AP)—A birthday celebration, the like of which Iowa has never before seen and probably can never duplicate, will be his native state's newest tribute to Herbert Hoover.

Thousands will gather Tuesday, Aug. 10, in this community of 750 population, where the former President of the United States was born to a village blacksmith and his Quaker schoolteacher wife, 80 years ago.

Iowa is going all out to honor Hoover that day.

The livestock tour is an annual event of the club and is held a few weeks before the Rotary-sponsored 4-H Club Fall Fair.

his opinion, would advertise only Klamath and Deschutes potatoes. It is proposed to advertise potatoes from below the state line as Klamath potatoes. He also stated he did not feel that the White Rose certified seed growers of Northern California would receive any benefits from such an advertising program.

Osborne stated he did not feel that it was the problem of the commercial growers to establish a greenhouse, adding that the certified seed industry has on hand \$25,000 with which to start work on a hot-house.

It was evident from testimony received from the majority of growers from both Tulake and Macdoel areas that they believed the passage of the marketing order would help all phases of the potato industry.

At the conclusion of the hearing the following men were nominated for the five producer positions as Advisory Board members and alternates from the Tulake district: Glen Arthur, Ed Osborne, Dan Crawford, C. J. Main, Otto Hayne, Earl Schulz, Woody Chambers, Chet Stonecypher, Wesley S. Peter, Tex Barrett and Webb Staunton.

To fill two producer positions and alternates on the Advisory Board from the Macdoel area the following four men were nominated: W. L. Clement, Don Griffith, Wilford Dixon and Clarence Cross. One potato handler and alternate from each of the two growing districts were named. Nominated from Macdoel were Dick McDougal and Wesley McKaig. From Tulake, George Smith, Tony Steyskal and Vincent Chockney.

From this list the final selection of nine board members will be made by the director of the Department of Agriculture, providing the referendum vote is favorable to the establishment of the marketing order.

Forms for the referendum vote will be mailed out in about one week, Kuhl stated, and a time limit of 30 days has been set in which growers can return their vote either for or against the marketing order.

If and when 65 per cent of the growers who raised 51 per cent of the potatoes last year, or 51 per cent of the growers who raised 65 per cent of last year's crop, mail in assenting votes the director may publish a notice that the marketing order has been favorably voted on and it can become law within one week from that date, Kuhl asserted.

The Northern California growers favoring the order are anxious for it to pass as soon as possible so as to join Klamath and Deschutes in a joint potato promotional program this fall.

Salem Hopes To Get All State Agency Offices

SALEM (AP)—Salem's downtown merchants will meet Thursday to see if they want to bring a suit to compel all state departments to have headquarters in Salem.

The meeting was called after the Washington State Supreme Court ordered 13 state departments with headquarters in Seattle to move their main offices to Olympia. This suit was brought by Olympia merchants.

Many Oregon state offices have headquarters in Portland, including such big departments as the Liquor Commission, Public Welfare Commission, Health Department, and Fish and Game Commissions.

Former Cop Wins GOP Nomination

DETROIT (AP)—Donald S. Leonard, former head of the Detroit and Michigan state police systems, overpowered three rivals to win the Republican nomination for governor in yesterday's primary election.

Leonard, a policeman who came up from state police trooper, will oppose Gov. G. Mennen Williams, Democrat, in November. Williams, seeking an unprecedented fourth two-year term, was nominated without opposition.

Patrick V. McNamara, rough-hewn head of an AFL union and former Detroit city councilman, won the Democratic nomination for U. S. senator. He was actually unopposed, but many "memorial" votes were cast for the late Blair Moody, former U. S. senator who died two weeks before the primary.

Republican Sen. Homer Ferguson was renominated without opposition.

Williams won his fight with the powerful AFL Teamsters Union to select his own running mate for lieutenant governor. Democrats nominated Philip A. Hart, former U. S. district attorney, over George S. Fitzgerald, Teamsters Union attorney and former Democratic national committeeman, whom Williams read out of the party.

Leonard had a vote of 107,744 with 2,619 of the state's 4,783 precincts counted. Well behind were State Treasurer D. Hale Brako with 86,952, Secretary of State Sven J. Cleary with 64,800 and Dr. Eugene C. Kreyes with 49,876.

All 18 Michigan congressmen were seeking renomination but only one—veteran Democrat George D. O'Brien—was behind in early returns. State Sen. Charles C. Diggs held a narrow edge over O'Brien in first returns. Only six incumbents—2 of the 13 Republicans and 4 of the 5 Democrats—faced primary opposition.

House Passes Projects Bill

A House committee report on the bill said the Reclamation Bureau is "concededly not geared" to the development of small projects. Under the loan plan, it said, state and local agencies could receive substantially the same benefits as if the projects were constructed by the government.
