## VFW Warned By Navy Commander

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Veterans of Foreign Wars marched down the home stretch Wednesday in their 55th annual national encampment with politics, passage of final resolutions and a giant "pageant of drums" in the spotlight.

They received a warning too from the chief of U.S. naval operations, that the military service is "not attracting and holding a sufficient number of the high type people" required to maintain a peak level of efficiency.

"There is not sufficient pride in the military service nor are the rewards of military service sufficient," said Adm. Robert B. Carney in an address prepared for a VFW business session. Carney said a higher type mentality than ever before is needed to handle the complex machines of modern warfare. He said, as necessities for an efficient fighting machine.

## Tax Revision Law Allows Some Child Care Deduction

WASHINGTON (AP) — An entirely new idea is being imbedded in tax laws: a special break for people who have to pay for care of their children while they work.

This concept goes into effect for the first time in the huge, 1,000-page tax revision bill just passed by Congress.

Experts figure it will cut taxes for about 2,100,000 persons by a total of 130 million dollars a year.

The new bill permits many taxpayers to deduct from their income, before figuring their tax, actual expenses of up to \$600 a year for care of children, but also for any dependent who is mentally or physically incapable of caring for himself.

That means an actual tax cut of \$120 for those in the lowest, 20 per cent tax bracket, a bigger saving in higher brackets.

This is how you can qualify under the child-care provision:

If you file your return as a single head of a household—a widow, widower, divorced or separated person—you can claim the \$600 deduction regardless of your income if you meet the other conditions.

And if you are a working wife, you can still qualify if your husband is incapacitated. You also can benefit if you file as a married couple, where both husband and wife work and file a joint return. If your combined income is \$4,500 or below, you can deduct the full \$600. Your deduction is reduced by the amount of your income above \$4,500.

Thus, if your income is \$4,800, you can deduct only \$300. But if your income is \$5,100 or more, you are not entitled to any deduction.

One very important point to remember—if you claim this deduction, you must itemize your dependent-care expenses and all your other deductions. You can't benefit from this provision if you take the standard, automatic deduction of 10 per cent of your income offered to most taxpayers.

The provision applies to expenses in this calendar year, which start Jan. 1. You can deduct them in your income tax return due next April 15.

So if you qualify, you might want to start now keeping a record of

your deductible expenses. You can't deduct child-care expenses if they are paid to your own dependents. And of course you can't deduct baby-sitter expenses while you are out frolicking.

The theory is to permit a deduction for expenses you must incur to make a living—just as regular business expenses are deductible.

The park naturalist will conduct the tour, which will cover approximately two hours' time.

The first annual tour through the park was hosted by the Cascade District in the summer of 1953 and proved of great interest to a large number of wild flower enthusiasts.

State officers of the federation are expected to be in attendance at Sunday's tour.

Anyone who is interested, whether garden club members or not, is welcome to attend. All who plan to go on the tour are requested to take their lunches and meet at the park camp grounds at 1 p.m.

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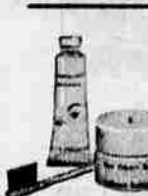
