

Roberts Wins Sixteenth By Stopping Milwaukee

Bannister Has Slight Head Cold

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — Dr. Roger Bannister has a slight cold in the head but says it isn't bothering him and he has prescribed a brisk mile canter in preference to a glass of hot lemonade.

"I never drink lemonade," said the first human who ever ran the mile in less than 4 minutes.

He'll take his preferred tonic Thursday afternoon about 5 p.m. (PDT) in the second heat of the British Empire Games mile trials.

Before his turn comes, John Landy of Australia must qualify in the first heat programmed for 4:50. Canadians enjoy a friendly wager but nobody was friendly enough to bet Bannister and Landy would fail to survive the preliminaries that will cut the field to eight runners for Saturday's grand finale.

There was one casualty, however. Australia's Jim John Bailey was wearing a cast on his right ankle and has been scratched from the first heat. This leaves six men to run with or after Landy, whose 2:58 mile is up for consideration as a world record.

Bailey turned his ankle in training last Sunday but ran Tuesday in the Empire Games 880. He was going along with the leaders for 600 yards, but then the ankle began to ache and he couldn't quite make the finish line. An X-ray later disclosed the break.

Landy says he has never felt better and that he hasn't done any running for three days because he's "just right." But he was hoping he wouldn't be pressed heavily.

"If I have to run faster than 4:08 it will leave me a little tired for Saturday," said the talkative hero of the antipodes. "I figure, I can go that speed with no ill effects."

Although he has only six opponents to Bannister's nine (four will qualify from each heat), Landy might be due for a slight pressing. Victor Milligan of Northern Ireland has gone the route in 4:06.7, and defending champion Bill Bailey of Canada in 4:11. Bill Bailey of New Zealand and Ed Morton of Canada complete the first heat field.

Bannister may choose not to run any faster than necessary to become a member of the qualifying quartet. Another member of England's great distance crew, Dave Law, is in the field to help him with the pace. The main threat here is little Murray Halberg of New Zealand, who loves to set a hot early pace and has a top time of 4:04.4 to rank with the world's best.

Don MacMillan of Australia, John Disley of Wales and Law are around the 4:09 region, which is a very respectable neighborhood they should keep Doc Roger from growing drowsy.

Others in the field are Geoff Warren, Australia's three-miler, John Moutie and Rich Ferguson of Canada, and James Daly of New Zealand.

Few people expect an approach to the 4-minute-mile, even though the forecast indicates ideal running weather—a temperature in the small 70s and an overcast sky.

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Shrine Teams Powerful

PORTLAND—The greatest touchdown parade in the history of the Shrine's Hospital all-star football game is a "distinct possibility," the players here are predicting as time for the seventh annual grid classic nears.

The contest, pitting outstanding 1953 high school seniors from throughout the state against an aggregation of Portland area stars, will be played the night of August 21 in Multnomah stadium here.

The so-called experts base their touchdown forecast on the fact that both teams are blessed with terrific backfield speed and good aerial combinations. The "wise boys" aren't willing to hazard a guess as to which eleven will score the greatest number of touchdowns, however.

The City All-Stars are expected to be considerably stronger than a year ago when they bowed to the Shrine for the third year in a row. For the first time in the game's history, the City roster will include some players from schools surrounding the Portland area. In the past the City team was made up of only Portland high school performers.

Coach Harry Scarff, in charge of City for the second straight year, is the first to admit that broadening of the City's player-selection area will help. "We now have a lot more players to select from and naturally we're going to get a few good boys who in past years would have been on the State team," he said.

Scarff, whose Central Catholic teams have won the Oregon prep crown the last two years has announced that City will stick to a split T formation this year, explaining that "most of the boys are familiar with it." Scarff likes the double wing formation and mixes it with the T at Central Catholic, but believes too many of the players would find it difficult to master in two weeks of practice.

Both Mel Ingram of Grants Pass and Scarff have advised the boys to report "ready for scrimmage." First day of practice will be August 9. However, the players will report August 8 for physical examinations and picture-taking.

Advance ticket sales indicate another big crowd for the colorful contest, according to Eugene W. Ferguson, Portland deputy police chief and the game's managing director. Mail orders at \$3 for reserved seats, are being taken at Shrine game headquarters in the New Heathman Hotel here.

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Roberts shares honors with Johnny Antonelli of the Giants as the winningest pitcher in the majors this season. He and Harvey Haddix of St. Louis lead in strikeouts with 130 each and his amazing total of only 30 bases on balls in 228 innings is by far the best in the National League.

Roberts struck out nine and last night, Bob Morgan's bases-empty homer in the third gave the control artist the run he needed to win after both sides had scored in the first.

The victory moved the Phils into fourth place, half a game ahead of the St. Louis Cardinals who bowed 8-7 to Brooklyn. The Giants shaded Chicago 4-3 in 11 innings and Pittsburgh beat Cincinnati 4-3.

Cleveland evened its current series with the New York Yankees with a 5-2 triumph. Chicago edged Boston 6-5 in 10 innings. Detroit defeated Washington 6-2 and Philadelphia and Baltimore swapped last place as the Athletics whipped the Orioles 6-4.

Cleveland moved 2½ games ahead of the Yankees in the American League. New York stayed five games in front of Brooklyn in the National.

The Giants beat Chicago on an 11th inning single by Hank Thompson that brought in Wes Westrum from second base after two were out. Westrum's single and a sacrifice by winner Don Liddle set up the run which ran the New York Yankees' winning streak to six.

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In Brooklyn the Cardinals grabbed a 7-6 lead with three runs in the ninth only to have the Dodgers pull it out on Jackie Robinson's homer with Jim Gilliam on base in the last of the ninth.

Pittsburgh furnished another dramatic finish. With two out and one aboard in the last of the ninth Gerry Lynch smashed a Frank Smith pinch into the seats for the winning margin.

The Cleveland Indians turned on Allie Reynolds, one of their former Tribesmen, and handed the veteran his third defeat of the season. Bobby Avila's three-run homer in the third inning gave Bob Lemon the cushion he needed for his 14th victory. When Lemon tired after seven innings, Mike Garcia mopped up.

The Chicago White Sox cut into the National League monopoly on last-gasp triumphs as they downed Boston on Matt Batts' bases-loaded single in the 10th after the Red Sox had come from five runs back in the eighth and ninth innings.

Ted Williams drove in three runs Phil Cavarretta hit a grand slam homer for the White Sox in the first. Detroit came from behind to

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
