ROUND THE CLOCK and round the world goes Veasmont's tassel-trimmed corde cloche. Non-crushable, it packs in pocket space, can be worn with tiny brim turned up or down and comes in a full color wheel of smart fashion shades — and is available locally.

The man who wants to be a success in business should pick the right wife, says Joseph Weiss, a businessman with an unusual philosophy.

"Most men don't realize how important their wives are in shaping their financial future," says Weiss, president of an auto seat cover manufacturing company with retail outlets all over the country. "I won't hire a representative, or even allow a man to invest his own money in my business, if I don't think his wife can be an asset."

The era of the clinging vine has passed, says Weiss who explains his theory thus:

"Behind every successful man there is a woman who understands at just what point a man needs to be pushed and when he wants to be coddled. She should encourage him when he's down in the dumps and tighten the rein when he shows signs of wandering into aimless pursuits."

"She must be happy and interested in her husband's career, realizing that it's her career too, and that she can make or break it."

"She must be a good mixer, willing and able to meet and entertain her husband's business associates, to make friends with them and to make them believe that friend husband is a routin' tootin' go-getter, even if he's merely a milk-toast."

"A successful wife should keep her own appearance up to snuff, so that her husband will be proud of her and his associates will be impressed."

"She should be able to influence her husband. That doesn't mean she has to henpeck him. It should be done more subtly than that."

"Any wife who wants to see her husband succeed should remember that she entered a partnership with him when they got married, and that she should be a working partner, not a silent one."

The woman who makes a profession of being a "homebody" is no asset to an ambitious man, in Weiss' opinion. She should run her house smoothly and efficiently, but widen her horizons so that she is able to talk intelligently on a wide variety of subjects.

She needs good common sense, a generous dash of ambition and the ability to understand her husband's job.

There are two kinds of wives that automatically put the jinx on any man applying for a franchise from Weiss' company. Says he:

"The woman who is obviously bossy, and who answers every question before her husband has a chance to open his mouth, is poison to a man."

"And I'd never hire a man whose wife is a minnie-girl. A gold-digger can ruin the ambition of the ablest man."

Ordaining Of Women Backed

PRINCETON, N. J. (AP) — The World Presbyterian Alliance voted Tuesday in favor of ordaining women into the ministry by the slim margin of 68 to 66.

Delegates to the alliance's 17th General Council registered their approval of a report that declared in part that sex should be no bar to the ministry "so that the best talent wherever found can be fully utilized."

The final vote followed a long discussion on a report presented by Dr. Paul Calvin Payne of Philadelphia, general secretary of the Board of Christian Education of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A.

It contained a paragraph not to be modified by motion action, calling for a study of the status of women in the church, and declared:

"Many of us feel strongly that all fields of Christian service should be open to all members without distinction as to sex, so that the best talent wherever found can be fully utilized."

Make it from me... Bessy's Dairy Dishes

Klamath Junior 4-H Fall Fair will be here before you know it. Dates this year are August 22, 23 and 24, at Klamath County Fairgrounds.

There just isn't anything I like better than a good, old-fashioned fair unless it is the brand new-fashioned type put on by our young people.

Reading the premium list, I noted some of the contests in the food division.

Poley Manufacturing Company is awarding a food mill, blending fork, pastry frame and a sifter in one division.

Safeway has a contest, too, for an essay of 250 words written on a demonstration.

General Foods Corporation has a contest open to all 4-H cookery or Food Preservation members who have completed not less than three years of club work. That's for the jam and jelly division.

Spreckles Sugar Company has a special canning contest for those under 15 years of age.

Kerr Glass Company also has a canning exhibit.

Of course, there will be cattle, sheep and hogs on display, too. It's mighty interesting to get out and see what the young people have been doing this past year.

Since I promised you a dairy recipe, here is a peach.

PEACH COBBLER
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 Tbsp. cornstarch
3 cups sliced peaches
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Mix sugar, salt, cornstarch, cinnamon and peaches and pour into buttered casserole or baking dish. 1 1/2 to 2 inches deep.

For the crust, sift 1 cup all-purpose flour and 1/2 tsp. salt. Cut in 1/2 cup butter until pieces are size of small peas. Add 3 to 4 Tbsp. cold water a little at a time until mixture holds together. Roll pastry out 1/4 to 1/2 inch thickness and cut into decorative pieces with cookie cutters. Place pieces of pastry over fruit mixture and bake at 450 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes or until crust is browned. Serve warm with cream or ice cream.

Furniture Plant Stockholders To Vote On Closure

PORTLAND, Aug. 5 — Directors of Doernbecher Manufacturing Co. will ask stockholders at a meeting here Sept. 14 to vote on dissolving the big furniture manufacturing firm.

E. S. Beach, secretary-treasurer, said the directors' proposal called for shutting down the plant and liquidating its assets, estimated at more than four million dollars.

The plant houses one of the largest furniture making industries in the Northwest. At one time it was one of the country's largest with 1,500 employees. Today it employs 400 at its plant and 100 at a saw-mill.

Beach said the board had decided not to make public its reasons for recommending closure. However, the company reported a net loss last year. Net earnings for the first six months of this year were only \$9,060.
