Milk Market Meets Planned

PORTLAND (AP) — A series of 11 hearings over the state will be conducted next month by the Oregon Milk Marketing Administration.

William S. Weidel, administrator, said milk producers and distributors will be invited to give their views and submit figures bearing on possible changes in milk price and pooling regulations. Among matters to be considered are proposals for a differential on gallon jug sales.

Main Canal Repaired

Repair work on the A canal, the main canal out of Klamath Lake, was completed Wednesday and the canal had reached capacity by Wednesday evening.

Bureau of Reclamation crews were on the job constantly from 5:30 a.m. Tuesday when they were alerted by city police that a leak had occurred in the canal about 500 feet east of the Main Street bridge. Authorities attribute the leak to a hole in the sewer line under the canal. The hole was discovered before the bank broke.

Charles Wamstad, irrigation manager on the main division work, said that no property damage had been done except for partial flooding of a few yards.

The canal was shut clear down for a few hours Tuesday but water was back by early Tuesday evening.

Senate Backs Forest Funds

WASHINGTON — Senator Guy Cordon this week announced Senate appropriations committee approval of a \$6.5 million supplemental appropriation for forest roads and trails, bringing this appropriation up to its full authorization of \$22,500,000 — the first time the full authorization has been voted since 1947.

"The action of the Senate committee, which I am certain will be ratified by the Senate itself, will provide the Forest Service with its greatest working fund in history for this vital program," Senator Cordon said.

The additional funds will serve to open up new access roads to stands of over-ripe timber needing immediate harvesting to protect its commercial value.

In 1947, a full authorization of \$12,500,000 was appropriated for forest roads and trails. Since that year, the appropriation has lagged behind the authorized figure by from \$1 million to \$8 million in the budget for the fiscal year just ended.

Senator Cordon pointed out that the additional funds will permit the Forest Service to blaze new access roads into areas where epidemic insect infestation has created an urgent need for a timber salvage program. In other areas of the Pacific Northwest there is a need for access roads to reach stands of timber which have passed full maturity.

A condition of the record appropriation, Senator Cordon explained, is the wiping out of carry-over authorizations from previous years, starting the Forest Service off on a clean ledger page for this budget item.
