

Grow, Price Tangle On Armory Ring Card

Tonight at the Armory, George Price will get an answer to his big "return to the ring" question as he tangles with one of the top fighters in the Northwest, Jimmy Grow, of Lewiston, Idaho, in the 10 round main event.

Price, just out of the Navy, is making his first appearance in the armory ring since he left for the service, better than four years ago, and will also be making his first 10 round start of his career.

Manager Roy Drake indicated that this will be a tough battle for his fighter, but stated that Price is in excellent shape and might be more than the Idaho State Lightweight can handle.

While in the service, Price racked up 52 wins in 60 fights, 25 of them were by the knockout route compared to 10 fights in the armory before entering the service, and only once was he beaten.

Grow, who is after a fight with Bobby Woods, the Northwest lightweight champion, will enter the ring tonight with an edge in the experience department, but will have to spot Price a slight weight advantage.

Included in Grow's outstanding record are wins over Ernie Davis, Johnny Salkeld, Woody Willetts and Willie Boyd. He has also held Kid Augilar to a six round draw.

In his last fight, he met Little Papa Brown in an eight round bout at Boise, Idaho, where he flattened the Seattle battler in the seventh stanza.

A slight change has been made in the supporting card, but it might have added more action to the already loaded menu of boxing.

Little Papa Brown has been replaced by another Seattle boxer, George Dixon, to meet Ralph Weiser in the six round semi-windup to the evening's main event.

Dixon, who is a stable mate of Brown's, was selected to meet Weiser, when Bob Wark, manager of the two Seattle fighters, decided that Brown's broken nose, suffered in the fight with Grow, last month, was not sufficiently healed to meet the blistering punches of Weiser.

In the two other six round bouts that Promoter Mack Lillard has lined up for tonight's card, Darrell Harrington and Eddie Brown have been rematched in what should be a continuation of their knockdown-drawout battle that was staged on the last fight card, while Bobby Barney will trade leather with another one of Wark's fighters, Frankie Sharp.

Barney has a string of four straight knockouts in his last four armory fights, and will be going after KO number five, to a fight against the hard hitting Seattle boxer.

Duane McDaniel of Chillicothe will meet Dale Mingo in the four round opener of the 31 round ring program in another natural for both fighters, who pack solid blows, in both hands.

Doors open at 7:30 and the curtain raiser will get started at 8:30, according to Lillard.

Challenger Shows No Signs of Title Beating

NEW YORK (AP) — Everybody watched Ezzard Charles closely for signs of wear and tear after the 15th round, beating the look from Rocky Marciano six weeks ago. The ex-champion was in town the other day to sign for the Sept. 15 rematch and there were those present who thought he might not last as long next time.

The egg-shaped lumps on his face had melted away long ago with most of the other traces of battle. If you looked real close you might see a mark here or there but he seemed more confident than ever.

In the hours after their June 17 battle, Ezzard was saying Marciano was not the best man he ever fought—that Jersey Joe Walcott was tougher and hurt him more than Rocky.

"I know what I'd do the next time," he muttered then. "I'd go out there and punch with him. I thought I beat him and I'll prove it if I get another chance."

Now it was six weeks later and he had signed for the second fight. He still talked much the same way, although apparently convinced he had lost.

"I believe I can beat him," he said slowly, thinking out each phrase. "I would have beat him last time if I hadn't had a little accident and hadn't made a couple of mistakes I won't make again."

Everybody knew he meant the blow to the Adam's apple in the eighth round when he talked about his "little accident." He claimed the blow was the turning point in the fight for he led in the early rounds and to use his own words, "blew up down the stretch."

About the "couple of mistakes" he was vague. Under questioning he said he thought he did wrong in doing the same thing

Out Of Doors With The Sportsman

Even with the little bit of chilly weather that has hit the Klamath Basin the last couple of days, fishing should continue to be from fair to good on nearly every stream in the vicinity this weekend.

By all indications, the Williamson River has been the best and should hold the lead for the best fishing area, for trolling or spin fishing. Bait fishing with night crawlers has been fairly productive also.

Last Sunday afternoon, Andy Anderson and his wife, Mary, were trolling the Williamson between the lower bridge and the mouth of the river when they picked up five trout ranging between 20 and 26 inches in length.

The Andersons were using a number four Andy Reeker, nickel and brass in color when they made the nice catch from the troll.

Other catches were reported from the Williamson also. Last week, L. F. Baldwin caught two fish that weighed eight pounds 12 ounces and six pounds eight ounces while fishing with worms. Later this week, Carl E. Boyd of Dorris, managed to hook and land the largest rainbow reported this season, as he brought home a 14 pound three ounce cleaned fish.

Boyd was using the Lucky Lady while trolling. The monster was 32 inches long and had a girth measurement of eight and one half inches long.

The Combo Lure, a locally made fishing lure, both the Wobble Rites and Lure Jensen Lures and the Daredevils have been producing very well for spin fishermen on the river.

Word from the Wood River also indicates that some nice catches are being taken. Kimball Park at the head of the ice cold stream yielded some nice catches of rainbow and easternbrooks according to one of the local sporting good dealers.

The Sprague, Chewaucan, Dairy Creek, Long Creek and other streams in the Bly and Gearhart area have been fairly good the past week for the medium sized trout, just good for the frying pan.

Wally Moss, a well known resident of the area, had very good luck while fishing Dairy Creek, the Chewaucan and several of the other small creeks in that region. His

best argument for the fish was a Woolly Worm.

Up in the other direction from the Basin fishing holes, Crescent Creek and the Little Deschutes are still producing some nice catches, but from all evidence, it is spotty. Near the town of Crescent will probably be the best spot to try the angler's luck.

Also up north in the Bend country, East and Paulina Lakes are still good to very good fishing spots. Both lakes have been producing on troll and still fishing.

The Rogue River, from Grants Pass to the headwaters has been fairly productive in the last couple of days. Some nice limits have been taken by the valley stream's fishermen.

Agency Lake and the Upper Klamath Lake are two other bodies of water that should be doing good by most anglers who troll.

Near the mouth of the Williamson River, the Lucky Lady and Andy Reekers, number four or five, have been doing very well, while on the other side of the lake at Rocky Point, other nice catches have been taken on just about the same lineup of lures, with the Daredevils also working.

The Skyline Lakes, and the other high lakes should continue to be very good for those who care to hike into their fishing spots. Fly fishing in the late evening and lure-bait fishing should be good during the day.

Frank Snider won Poole's Big Fish Contest last week with his 9 pound two ounce trout taken at Rocky Point while he was fishing with a Flat Fish. Baldwin's fish were the second largest, and Boyd's fish is currently leading this week's contest, which will not end until Monday.

Three arrests were made by the Oregon State Police for game violations this past week. Two were for false application for angling licenses and the third was for fishing without an angling license. The two false application charges were made at Lakeview and Four Mile Lake, while the no license arrest was made at Crump Lake in Lake County.

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Tank Record Broken By Ohio State Star

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Ford Konno and Carolyn Green entered a couple of sprint events at National AAU swimming and diving championship Friday after showing two different ways to set records in the 1500-meter freestyle races that opened the four-day show Thursday.

Konno, Olympic and American citizen champion at the distance, was pushed by William A. Yorzky of the New Haven (Conn.) swim club and George Oneke Jr. of the Hawaii S.C. to a new AAU record of 19:07.1.

All three broke Konno's year-old mark of 19:20. Yorzky splashed in at 19:11.7 and Oneke a at 19:15.2.

The tireless, 20-year-old Miss Green, University of Miami student swimmer for the Ft. Lauderdale (Fla.) swim club, had no close competition and made a couple of mistakes that probably added four or five seconds to her time.

She swam a couple of slow lengths midway in the race, then lost count of her turns and swam an extra 50 meters before officials got her stopped. She said she could have stepped up her pace considerably on the last 100 meters if she'd known it was the last. Her time of 21:08.5 broke her

own American and AAU record of 21:20.8, set three years ago. Second place Carol Tait of the Santa Clara, Calif., swim club was 50 meters back at the finish. Konno, who won three events 800 meter relay team.

for Ohio State in the last NCAA meet, was entered in a late afternoon 300-meter freestyle event Friday with two of his teammates on the U.S. Olympic championship 800 meter relay team.

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
