French Still Debating On Fate Of EDC

PARIS (AP)—With a little less than two weeks to go before the French National Assembly is scheduled to start debate on the European Army, Pierre Mendes-France's Cabinet has made no progress toward funding the compromise solution the Premier proposed.

Soon after he took office, Mendes-France appointed two of his ministers to work out a formula which might be acceptable to a large majority of the Assembly. They were Pierre Koenig, defense minister, and Maurice Bourges-Maunoury, minister of industry and commerce. Koenig is against the European Army, Bourges-Maunoury favors it.

The two ministers quickly found there was no way of reconciling their views, and their meetings have been mostly a matter of form. This inability to reach a compromise is certain to be the basis for their report to the Premier.

Mendes-France is believed to be working on a timetable which calls for the scheduled Brussels meeting of the six foreign ministers of EDC nations the latter part of next week, and Assembly debate during the week of Aug. 22. That would permit Parliament to start its vacation by Sept. 1.

Other nations in EDC—led by West Germany, Belgium and the Netherlands—originally asked that the Brussels meeting be held in July. Mendes-France said he was too busy then with the Geneva conference.

The other nations have impressed on the French premier that they are not disposed to reopen negotiations on the EDC treaty, and that any changes in it will have to be made after ratification. The Premier is believed to be reconciled to this point of view.

West Germany, Luxembourg, the Netherlands and Belgium have ratified the EDC treaty; Italy and France have not. The Italian Chamber of Deputies recessed Wednesday for summer holiday without reaching a vote on the pact.

Tito Plagued By Old Custom

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP)—The centuries-old practice of a tiny Albanian minority in Yugoslavia—selling girl brides—poses the government one of its toughest social problems.

President Tito's Communist regime has been trying, principally through education and propaganda, to stamp out the practice, but it is slow business.

The difficulty was pointed up recently in a report from the district of Orhovac in the southern Yugoslav province of Kosmet. Young girls still are being sold to husbands there for as much as 300,000 dinars (\$1,000). Even worse, said the report, greedy fathers are selling their daughters to old men who can pay the highest prices.

Bride selling is a custom of Moslem Scipians (Albanians), a custom as old as the opposite practice of a girl taking a dowry to her husband. To this day many young Scipians leave their native villages to find jobs in more rewarding areas. Often they even go abroad. They live frugally, save their money and then go home to buy a local girl as a wife.

The report on the present situation said that in recent months fathers in the district sold 45 girls to husbands and that 261 girls under 14 had been unlawfully pledged to potential buyers (engaged).

But there are some good signs too, said the report. Thirty girls recently sought protection of the law because they did not want to marry old men.

Dairy Plant Rules Adopted

New rules and regulations governing the sanitary operation of dairy products plants have been adopted by the Oregon State Department of Agriculture and become effective August 1. These regulations apply to all dairy products plants under a single code. They replace five previous department orders.

The main departure from earlier regulations adds the vacuometer continuous flow pasteurization at 194 degrees F. as an optional method of pasteurizing fluid milk and cream.

Other subjects covered in the regulations include buildings and equipment construction and sanitation; cooling, packaging and storage; personnel health and cleanliness; weighing, sampling and testing of milk and cream; milk and cream grading, including equipment, procedure and grades; pasteurization methods and equipment and thermometer charts and examination of applicants for dairy operator licenses.

These regulations should not be confused with another new set of rules which cover fluid milk. Both sets were the subject of a recent public hearing in Salem. The new regulations on fluid milk will be released within a few days.

Copies of the new regulations, as well as the 1953 dairy products plant act, may be obtained from the Division of Poods and Dairies, Oregon State Department of Agriculture, Salem.

Slot Machine Causes Arrest

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Jack Kreake, owner of a Columbus plumbing supply firm, told police it was all his wife's fault.

"Every time we'd go out, she'd play the slot machines. Finally, I said, 'look, honey, I'll buy you one.'"

Kreake said he bought an "old, broken-down machine for her, figuring we could fix it up and she could play it. She's the only one that's put a nickel in it since and it's been in our basement all the time."

Police, embarked on an anti-pin ball drive, confiscated the machine from the recreation room of Kreake's home yesterday. Now he faces a \$50 to \$200 fine and six months in the workhouse for possession of the one-armed bandit.

Police Chief Fined By Judge

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—George W. Scholer was named Columbus chief of police a few weeks ago.

Two weeks later his automobile and that of a patrolman crashed at an intersection.

The chief was arrested for failing to yield the right-of-way. The patrolman was not held.

Judge Charles R. Peirce found the chief guilty in traffic court yesterday and fined Scholer \$10 and costs.

The chief paid it, then congratulated the officers who had investigated the case on their fair and unbiased reports.

Eight Killed In Highway Smash

MEADE, Kan. (AP)—A passenger car and a pickup truck collided at a highway junction near here last night killing eight persons and injuring two.

The collision wiped out two families riding in the passenger car.

Killed were Mr. and Mrs. Gene Elliott and their two children and their two children, all of Plains, Kan. Two men in the truck were injured seriously.

The accident occurred at the junction of U.S. Highway 54 and U.S. 160.

State Produce Totals Shown

Fresh fruit and vegetable inspections under federal-state shipping point certification in Oregon during 1953-54 totaled 36,322.9 cars. This is the second highest movement out of the eight Oregon shipping districts in the 32 years of this service, according to the state department of agriculture. The 1950-51 inspections of 40,936 cars still holds the record.

Certifications for the year closed July 1, were 95 cars ahead of the 1952-53 season, which represented the 1952 crop harvest. The figures for last year do not include 443.6 carloads of brine cherries, handled under state inspection rather than under federal-state activity. This deal brings the total fresh commodity movement under inspection in Oregon the past year to 38,746.3 cars.

For the 21st year in a row, potatoes topped the list of commodities inspected for shipment. Potato shipments for the '53 crop were 20,876.4 cars, as compared to 19,865.8 for the '53 crop.

The department maintains shipping point district offices in Klamath Falls, Medford, Hood River, Portland, Salem, Redmond, Ontario and Milton-Freewater.

Beetles Invade Klamath County

Blister Beetles have become very numerous throughout most of Klamath County and have invaded many of the yards and gardens as well as a few field crops, reports Ray Peterson, county agent.

There are two kinds of Blister Beetles. One is a black, shiny beetle that measures about one half inch in length, and the other is an ash-gray insect that measures about three quarters of an inch long.

Both species are very vigorous feeders, and it takes only a short time for an infestation to completely defoliate a plant. They thrive on lilacs, privet hedge, and honeysuckle, but will also feed on other plants.

Peterson stated that this insect can be eradicated by using Malathion or one of the lead or arsenic compounds. The latter compounds act somewhat slower but are effective in destroying this insect. The insecticide may be either sprayed or dusted on the plant.

Radio Station Meeting Held

Included in the business agenda was the nomination of a new board of directors which revealed all former directors with the exception of Chester L. Edgerton, Adm. who resigned under press of personal business. The board is now comprised of Jackson Tutser, president; Orrin Commins, vice president; Russ W. Edgerton, secretary; Treasurer; Dale Williams, managing director; and Everett Caldwell. The stockholders agreed to proceed with plans for direct wire service to the Lakeview studios of KCOO, as well as greatly expanded services by the two studios. Arrangements will also be made for a direct broadcast of the Modoc County Roundup parade, August 14, and the Lake County Roundup parade on Labor Day in Lakeview.
