Corporation Stockholders Benefit From New Tax Law

 WASHINGTON (AP)—More than seven million corporation stockholders will share in the most controversial tax cut in all the 1,000 pages of the new tax revision bill.

After talking about it for years, Congress finally has restored a special tax benefit on dividends. It will reduce revenues an estimated 204 million dollars the first year, up to 263 millions in later years.

Dividend income received special treatment under tax laws until 1936, when Democrats struck it out in the heyday of the "New Deal." The new tax cut is a symbol of the return to power of Republican tax philosophy.

It is far less than recommended by the Eisenhower administration, but it is still substantial and it establishes the principle.

The tax cut is two-folded: First, you pay no taxes on the first \$50 of dividends received each year. You can automatically exclude this \$50 from your income for tax purposes.

Second, you get a "tax credit"—a further direct tax cut—of 4 per cent of your remaining dividend income.

The timing is important this year. The \$50 deduction applies to dividends dated Jan. 1 or thereafter. The 4 per cent credit applies only to dividends received after last Saturday—July 31.

There is a limit to the amount you can claim under the 4 per cent dividend tax credit.

On your 1954 tax return, due next April 15, you can't claim dividend credit totaling more than 2 per cent of your "taxable" income, which is your income after all deductions and exemptions—the final figure on which the tax rate is applied.

In future years, you can't claim a dividend tax credit of more than 4 per cent of your taxable income. So if most of all your income is from dividends, you probably won't be able to get the full 4 per cent credit.

And you can't get any tax cut on dividends received from mutual savings banks or building and loan associations, life insurance companies, foreign corporations, non-profit cooperatives, or mutual insurance companies. These firms already are either tax-free, or not taxed as heavily as most corporations.

If a husband and wife both have dividend income, and they file a joint return, they can deduct dividends received by each of them up to \$50, for a total deduction of \$100. But if the wife receives \$35 in dividends and the husband \$65, they can deduct only \$85—the \$50 maximum for the husband and the \$35 for the wife.

Here are examples of how all this adds up on tax returns:

Say you have a family of four with \$9,500 regular income and \$1,000 income from dividends—a total of \$10,500.

Both husband and wife have more than \$50 in dividends, so first you subtract the \$100 dividend exclusion, leaving \$1,400 in income.

Then you subtract your \$2,400 in personal exemptions and the standard personal deduction of \$1,900, leaving taxable income of \$9,700.

Your regular tax rate would run to a tax bill of \$1,460. But now you take a 4 per cent of the \$900 in dividends left after your exclusion. This is \$36, which is subtracted from \$1,460 to leave a final tax payment of \$1,424.

The dividend provision saved you \$36—\$22 on your \$100 exclusion, and \$36 on your 4 per cent credit.

The administration argues all this will encourage public investment in stocks, and that this will help business expand and create more and better jobs for everybody.

Opponents argue 80 per cent of the dividend tax cut, or 290 million dollars, will go to only six-tenths of 1 per cent of American families. They say this is an unjustified special benefit to wealthy persons.

Sea-Going Trout Caught

Game commission fisheries agent Ralph Swan recently responded to a call for assistance in identifying a fish, that revealed a rather unusual happening in the annals of fisheries in Oregon.

Swan, upon observing the fish in question, identified it as a brown trout that had migrated up the Columbia River from the ocean. Examination of the brown revealed that it had spent four summers and three winters in the ocean, was 20 inches long, and weighed 3.38 pounds. The fish was picked up in a commercial catch near Clatskanie.

According to John Rayner, chief of fisheries operations for the game commission, this is the first observed instance of an anadromous brown trout in the waters of Oregon. Rayner continued that, "There is a small run of these fish on Vancouver Island, B. C., and they are common in the coastal streams of the British Isles and adjacent European countries."

"Though we cannot tell if this is the fore-runner of future migrating browns, this possibility exists, and only further observations will give the answer."

Machine Halts Phone Service

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP)—An earth-moving machine operating near the Mountain States Telephone & Telegraph Co. office here cut through a multicircuit cable late yesterday, disrupting telephone and telegraph service for about 90 minutes.

A company spokesman said transcontinental telegraph and teletype service to many Western points was disrupted. Included were the facilities of the Associated Press and other news services.

A micro-wave transmission service was pressed into use during the emergency.
