

Lowell Retains Men's Title In All-City Net Tournament

Brooks Places Second

Top seeded Ron Lowell retained his men's singles championship as he racked up his second straight All-City Tennis tournament title by whipping Earl Brooks in the finals yesterday afternoon at Moore Park.

The University of Oregon net star, played some of his best tennis as he claimed 6-3 and 6-1 set scores in defeating Brooks. Lowell made the finals with wins over Mike Hayden by 6-0 and 6-0 set scores. Dr. Raymond Tice, 6-2 and 6-4, and then his two out of three win from Brooks.

In the men's doubles division, Brooks and Lowell also retained their crown from last year as they blanked the team of Denny Todd and Dr. Tice by 6-0 and 6-0 scores.

Both teams advanced to the finals with opening round wins over Bill Benson and Bud Karmes by 6-0 and 6-0 scores, while Todd and Tice were drumming Gene and Shannon Oldham.

Another title holder from last year's meet, Ruth Hagelstein, reclaimed her title in the women's singles competition of the week long tournament that was sponsored by the Moose Lodge.

Miss Hagelstein whipped Jo Widness in three sets, taking the first one by a 2-6 decision and then coming back to win two straight by 6-3 and 6-1 counts to stop any hopes that Miss Widness may have held.

In the mixed doubles action, Lowell and Hagelstein teamed together to take the crown with two straight set wins over Gertrude and Earl Brooks by 6-4 and 6-2 set scores.

In the semi-finals of the mixed doubles division the Lowell-Hagelstein combination whipped Bud Case and Nye Patterson by 6-4 and 6-2 scores, while the Brooks-Brooks team was whipped by Todd and Widness by 6-4 and 7-5.

Lillian Mahan and Denny Todd captured the junior women's and men's titles as they both registered wins in the finals over Marg Shreve and Mike Hayden.

Mahan tripped Sandra Barron in the semi-final matches by identical 6-1 set scores, while Todd blanked Don Turner in the first round by 6-0 and 6-0 scores and then added a 6-1 verdict to work his way into the finals against Hayden.

The next big tennis tournament to be held at Moore Park will be the annual Herald and News Invitational meet, which will draw some of the biggest net names in the Northwest into competition. Earl Brooks is the tournament chairman.

Lou Fageol Ends Career With Splash

SEATTLE (AP) — Lou Fageol closed out a brilliant career as a speedboat pilot Saturday as he sent two new records rippling across Lake Washington in gunning the Slo-Mo-Shum V to victory in the 40th renewal of the Gold Cup classic.

It was the second Gold Cup conquest for the Kent, Ohio, driver at the wheel of the Slo-Mo-Shum V. He won the 1952 race. In addition, Fageol was credited with an assist—he drove one lap—as Joe Taggart won the granddaddy of speedboat races last year in Slo-Mo-Shum IV.

The Slo-Mo V, twin of Stan Shapiro's gold dust, swept the 90-mile Gold Cup course at an average speed of just a shade more than 90 miles per hour. His best 3/4-mile lap time was 1:04.73.

Fageol's performance established new records. The IV set the old record for the 90 miles last year at 1:21.61. Fageol's lap record beat the time of 1:04.21 turned in by the IV last year, the first time the laps were set at 3 1/2 miles. The previous lap distance was an even 3 miles.

Stepping from the V at the end of the grueling race, Fageol said: "Well, this was wonderful for me because it was my last race. I really retired last year, so this was one extra. It was my way to go out with a bang and you couldn't ask for a better one."

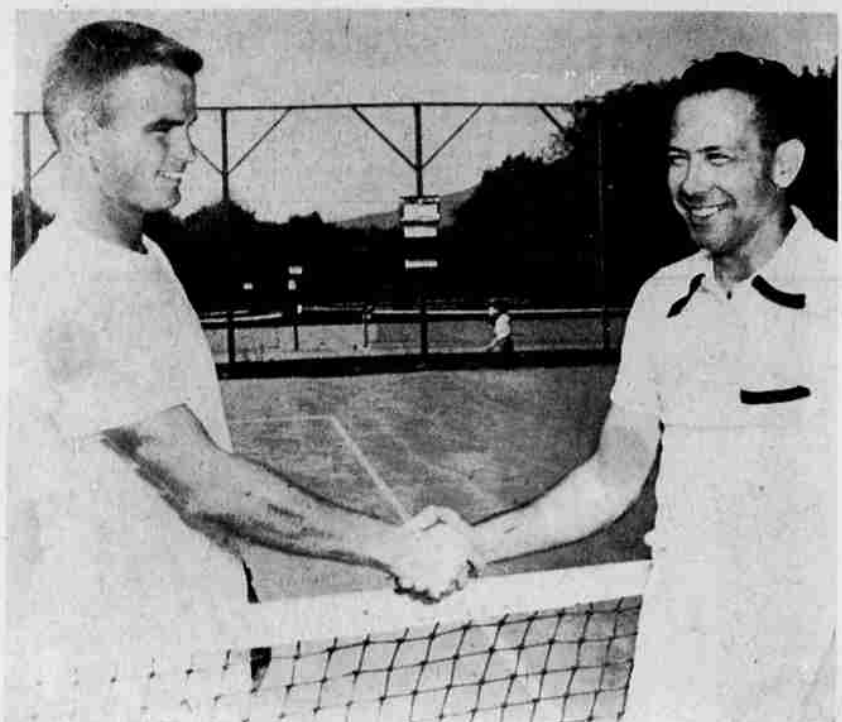
It was the fifth straight Gold Cup victory for the Sayre, Calif., driver. The IV ended Detroit domination of the Gold Cup in 1950 and the Slo-Mo haven't relinquished the cup since. The V won it in 1951 and the IV followed with two straight victories, preceding Saturday's race.

Fageol won all three heats and wound up with the maximum 2,000 points. He got 400 points for each heat victory, 400 for the fastest heat and 400 for the fastest 90 miles.

A Detroit boat, the Miss U. S., owned and piloted by George Simon, was second with 769 points. The Gile V, another Detroit boat driven by Lee Schenith, was third with 694. The Slo-Mo IV ended up in fourth place with 450 points. Miss Cadillac of Detroit, the only other point winner, had 169.

Bill Terry Returns To Accept Honors

COOPERSTOWN, N.Y. (AP) — When Bill Terry played ball and managed the New York Giants, they used to say he was the "what's in it for me" type. Maybe he was, but Old Memphis Bill, at 55, has mellowed.

He was back at Cooperstown today to accept in person his election to baseball's Hall of Fame and to be inducted into the Hall.

"At first I used to get a little disgusted at the way they took personalities into consideration," he admitted. "I got so I almost didn't care if I ever did get elected. When I was named I had to sit down and think it out and realize what it really meant. I don't know of anything more important that has happened to me."

Terry, of course, had his worst feud with the writers after he succeeded John McGraw as manager of the Giants. There are some alive, who, in this very day, will not say a kind word about him.

"If I had it to do all over again, I wouldn't do anything different," he said. "I had a good ball club all the time. They thought a lot of me and I thought a lot of them. I did things for them and they for me."

"Maybe there is one thing I'd do different," he said. "I probably would have gone to Cleveland when I had the opportunity, before I signed my last five-year contract with the Giants. If I had gone to Cleveland, I probably still would be in baseball."

Did the last 400 hitter in the National League ever have a harder time to return to the game? "Definitely yes. But I probably never will. Every time I start talking about it my wife, two sons and daughter start screaming. I was offered two shots at Brooklyn — last year and the year before Charles (Dressen) took the job."

"Years ago I had another opportunity in Chicago with the Cubs. I almost bought the Pittsburgh club for \$1 million dollars, but the money and all, before McKinnley and Galbreath bought it."

"I'm ashamed to say I seldom see a ball game any more, just the World Series. I did see the playoff game in which Bobby Thomson hit the home run in '51. One reason is because I don't like to go to the stadium. I think it would be a grand idea to start playing a little more in the daytime."

How about his famous crack "Is Brooklyn still in the league?" "Is that dead?"

WIL Leaders Take Two From Stars

A team of All-Stars made its debut in the Western International League Sunday by dropping a doubleheader to the league-leading Lewiston Broncos.

The All-Stars, assembled to pinch-hit for the defunct Victoria Ties, will help fill out the playing schedule of the seven remaining teams. Individual statistics will count in the WIL record book, as will the won and lost records of teams playing the newly-formed team.

Lewiston's double triumph, by scores of 9-6 and 10-3, increased the Broncos' lead over Yakima to 4 1/2 games, the largest margin they've enjoyed since moving into the top spot. Yakima dropped a Sunday doubleheader to Edmondton, losing the first game, 2-1 and the second one, 4-3.

One other double bill was played Sunday at Wenatchee where the home-town Chiefs took both games from Tri-City, by scores of 5-0 and 4-1.

THREE STRAIGHT In Saturday's activities, Vancouver made it three straight over Salem, 4-3; Tri-City topped Wenatchee, 5-1 and Yakima defeated Edmondton, 7-5. Vancouver, by sweeping its series with Salem, moved to third place in the league standings. The Senators dropped to fifth, just behind Edmondton.

Although the All-Stars lost both games of the Sunday bill at Lewiston, they provided the big hitter in rightfielder Dick Greco of Vancouver. He hit two-for-three, one a home run, in the opener, and added a mighty five-for-five with one homer in the evening game.

Lewiston put on a four-run rally in the fourth inning to take the win in the second game. Tied at 2-2, the Broncos pushed across the runs on three doubles, a walk and a pair of sacrifice flies. They added another four in the seventh to clinch the game.

In the first game, the Broncos got off to an 8-2 lead after the fourth inning and were never threatened by the All-Stars.

Yakima's pennant hopes suffered a severe setback as the Bears dropped both games to Edmondton. John Cenani limited the visitors to only five hits in the ten inning opener, but a third inning home run with none aboard by Herman Lewis was the only score. The Bears could muster. Edmondton tied the count in the seventh, then won the game in the tenth when two successive walks forced in Roy Parlee. Parlee had singled and was advanced to second on Don Giel's base hit.

THIRTEENTH In the second game Yakima

trailing 4-1 going into the last of the eighth when the Bears threatened to tie the count. But they rally fell short after they had scored two runs on successive singles by Don Pries, Herpin Lewis, Lou Stringer and Lou Summers. Ted Edmunds was the losing pitcher.

Wenatchee got some of its best pitching of the year as the Chiefs two-timed Tri-City. Billy Joe Waters gave up only six hits in the seven inning opener and Ted Shandor held the Braves to a like number in the second contest. Pumpay Green was the big gun in the first game. He scored one of the Chiefs' two runs in the first inning and lifted a homer out of the park for the third tally in the third.

In the second game, the Chiefs opened their end of the scoring in the fifth inning when four hits, including doubles by Tony Rivas and Tommy Munez, gave them two runs. A hit and two Tri-City errors gave the Chiefs a couple of more counters in the sixth.

Tri-City scored its solo run in the second, when Ted Shandor is sued a bases-loaded walk to losing pitcher Walt Clough, forcing Len Tran home.

Monday's schedule has Vancouver at Tri-City, Yakima at Salem and Wenatchee at Lewiston.

Stars Awaiting San Diego

The Hollywood Stars await this week's series with second place San Diego, probably a pennant decider, with a cushion of a 4 1/2 game lead in the Pacific Coast League.

The Stars maintained their lead Sunday with a split at Sacramento, winning the first 7-1 but dropping the nightcap to the Solons, 1-0. San Diego also split, San Francisco taking the first 8-6 and the Padres the nightcap, 3-1.

In the other Sunday games Los Angeles took two from Seattle, 6-2 and 6-1, and Oakland swept a pair from Portland, 5-4 and 9-5.

Seattle's only runs came on a two-run, bases-loaded single in the first inning of the opener, but Turk Lown took over and blanked the Rainiers the rest of the way as his mates whacked 10 hits. In the nightcap Angel Bubba Church, who pitched a no-hitter against Portland last Tuesday, stretched his no-hit string to 12 1/3 innings before Lloyd Jenney hit a double.

The league record is 12 2/3 hitless innings by Dick Ward for San Diego against Los Angeles in a 16-inning game in 1938. Sunday Church allowed only three hits and contributed a homer and a double to his cause.

Oakland simply overpowered Portland, making it a five-game sweep from the Beavers and running a victory string to nine games. The Oaks had two four-run surges in the first and fourth innings of the nightcap.

Hollywood, winning the Sacramento series 4-1, got five-hit pitching from George O'Donnell in Sunday's opener and he also was responsible for two runs with triples. He shut out Sacramento until the ninth inning when a double error by Hollywood shortstop Dick Smith gave the Solons their first run in 23 innings.

In the nightcap Ken Gables of Sacramento and Red Munger had a pitching duel in which the Stars outthrew the Solons 5-3. But in the sixth Ronnie King walked, was struck by Hank Schenz who went to third on Nippy Jones' single and scored on Nanny Fernandez' fly.

Home runs splattered all over the place at San Diego, Luke Easter hit four for the Padres, three in the first game to produce four runs. However, Dave Melton also went in four runs with two homers for San Francisco but the Seals' pitcher, Frank Tiller, managed to keep San Diego at bay. Easter and Earl Rapp walloped homers in succession in the nightcap.

Jerry Johnson Wins Main Event

Jerry Johnson of Yreka became the first California driver since Rusty Phillips to win a Gent Speedway main event as he edged out three local drivers to cop last night's racing prize.

Johnson, who was driving M-14, took the lead over the field of 18 starting cars in the eighth lap of the 25 lap event and held on despite several challenges by Bob Crawley, Johnny Hiltson and Matt Christian.

The race was fairly wide open during the middle part of the event with Johnson holding a good sized lead, but the local drivers took turns in pushing Johnson for the lead as the time grew short.

As all four cars approached the final turn, Johnson kept his lead, but Crawley and Hiltson were right on his tail, while Christian made it a four car finish, one of the few very tight A-mains registered this season.

Crawley placed second to Johnson after passing Hiltson on the last corner before the checkered flag, while Christian and Bill Shannon placed fourth and fifth.

In the B-main, Bud Brown took home the honors in the 15 lap event, while driving K-90. Neil Mayfield in K-14 placed second and Gene Stratton was third in K-9. Ray Brackman in K-22 was fourth.
