Archery Permits To Be Issued

Archery hunters of the state will have to obtain their free permits at one of the game commission offices this year instead of at the widely scattered distributors of last year.

The problem of distributing permits to all of the license agencies of the state is great since more than 25,000 must be printed to insure equal allotments. This means that in order for less than 5,000 archers to receive permits, five times that many must be sent out. Since these are free permits, there is no source of income to defray the expense of such a large operation.

Permits will be issued at the offices of the commission at Portland, Roseburg, Bend, La Grande, Hines, and the E. E. Wilson area near Corvallis. Also permits will be supplied by mail from these offices, providing the archer sends in his name and address when applying.

All archers are required by law to have one of the permits in possession when hunting in an archery area and to send in the attached report card at the end of the year.

Annual Shrine Circus To Thrill Basin Audiences

The sixth annual Klamath Falls Shrine Club-Polack Bros. Circus is being installed at the fairgrounds today, in preparation for performances to be given Tuesday and Wednesday at 2:15 and 8:15.

The circus arrived Sunday from Reno, where it ended a record four-day run Saturday night, following a 16-week tour of the leading cities of California. After its two-day engagement in Klamath Falls, the show will play two days in The Dalles and then proceed to Seattle and Vancouver, B. C.

Setting up the circus is like fitting together the irregular pieces of an enormous jigsaw puzzle.

Miles of wires and ropes are involved in the complex aerial rigging that goes aloft for the Alamas, the Sikorskas, La Norma, Norma, the Nine Ward-Bell Flyers and the Aerialvelles. Performers, working alongside the circus technical crew, check the installation of their own equipment and test its safety.

Countless objects of vast variety, classified in the parlance of the circus merely as "props," are to be unpacked and assembled for use in the animal acts and such acrobatic features as the Fredi Troupe, the Bolano-Ivankos, Melitta & Wilsons, the Haslevs and Jacqueline Hurley.

A major project this year is the erection of a 30-foot steel-barred arena in which Prof. George J. Keller presents seven varieties of jungle cats. With characteristic circus efficiency, this big cage will be dismantled at the conclusion of Keller's act during each show, only to be put up again before the start of the next.

Keller's animals and the movie chimpanzees of Al Antonucci have portable quarters that are placed conveniently to the performance area. Temporary stables and corrals are provided for the Bessalou Baby Elephants and other footed performers of the circus, including Nelson's trained pigs, Janet's ponies and dogs, and Andre's precision palmponies.

Amid the orderly confusion that attends the installation of the circus, the clowns, unrecognizable as such without their makeup, busy themselves with the gymnastics used for their goofy acts. From dozens of trunks, wardrobe mistresses, Mamie Ward brings forth glittering costumes to be worn by the performers and the dancing Spanglettes. Musical Director Bee Carney sorts out the music of some 130 selections played during the 21-hour program for the acts and the songs of Gunny Lowry, Ringmaster Arthur Springer checks his loud-speaker system and light cues with the electricians.

Popcorn is popped, cotton candy is spun and toy balloons are inflated in readiness for the clowns; call: "The show is on!"

The Mt. Laki Garden Club presents its second annual flower show in the I. E. Campbell home located on the Lakeview Highway about two and one half miles east of the junction, August 12, from 4:30 to 5 p.m.

Theme—"Color in our farm homes."

Exhibits will be received until 10:30 a.m. and from 7 to 8 p.m. on August 11. Judging will begin at 11:30 a.m. No exhibits to be removed until 5 p.m. There will be a Silver Tea from 2:30 p.m. until 5 p.m.

Only one entry in a class is permitted an exhibitor, except where class is divided as to color or other definite quality, when entries may be made in each division.

In arrangement classes, foliage and accessories are permitted, unless so stated. Flowers need not be grown by exhibitor. Naming the material used will be appreciated. Management uses all protection possible for the exhibits but will not be responsible for containers and other properties which should be plainly marked with adhesive tape on the bottom.

Stickers denoting 1st, 2nd and 3rd place will be awarded and only in the junior division will a small cash prize be awarded.

All flowers must be arranged by the exhibitor, and she may accompany her entry for a final touch, as it is placed by the committee.

Containers for the specimens will be furnished by the garden club.

All horticultural specimens must be grown by exhibitor and in his possession at least two months.
