The drop followed receipt of more rain in parts of the Midwest over the week end and a government estimate of a slightly higher cotton crop than expected.
Toward the finish wheat became quite weak, particularly the distant contracts. Some selling apparently was based on prospects for a lower government support

CHICAGO LIVESTOCK

CHICAGO (U) — Butchers and sows sold steady to 25 cents higher in active dealings Monday. The market was helped by receipt of only 6,500 salable head, a rather small number for Monday.

Cattle 180 to 270 pound butchers sold a \$22.75 to \$23.75 with several loads; 10 lots bringing \$24.00, the top, this was unchanged from Friday. Most 280 to 300 pound butchers moved at \$22.00 to \$22.75. Sows were steady to 25 cents higher at \$23.75 to \$25.25 for a few prime loads and \$23.00 to \$24.00 for most choice kinds. Heifers also were steady to 25 cents up.

Cows sold steady to 25 cents higher, topping at \$12.00, while bulls were steady to 50 cents up at \$12.00 to \$14.50 for utility and commercial. Vealers sold strong to \$1.00 higher, topping at \$2.00.

Salable receipts in the sheep section totaled 800. Good to prime native spring lambs sold at \$18.00 to \$20.50.

New Motel Going Up Along Main Street Near Second

The two-story motel under construction at 75 Main Street, just south of the Willard Hotel, is expected to be completed by the first of the year, according to the owners, Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Nelson. Excavation of the site, which was purchased from W. D. Miller, began around the first of August. Plans were drawn by Fred Foulton, draftsman for Basin Building Materials, and have been filed with the city building inspector, Nelson is doing the building himself.

The structure is estimated to cost from \$150,000 to \$200,000. The motel is to be finished exteriorly with Roman brick on the first floor; vertical cedar siding on the second floor, will include 24 units averaging 22 by 12 feet with one bedroom and bath; living quarters for the owners and office space.

The western design establishment will be L-shaped, with a circular drive in back and parking space for upstairs units; additional space facing Main for off-street parking for first floor occupants. The main section will be 126 feet long, two stories; the 89 foot wing on First Street, one-story high will house a basement for laundry and heating facilities and storage space. The Nelsons formerly built and operated Green Lake Motel in Seattle. They chose Klamath Falls for their next motel venture because of its location halfway between San Francisco and Portland; one day's drive from Seattle.
