Frantic Son Slays Mother

DETROIT (AP)—A 33-year-old man who told police he beat and kicked his mother to death last night "because she was possessed of the Devil" was held as a police prisoner today in a hospital mental ward.

The occasion will be the International Congress of Folklore, and the seventh International Conference of Folk Music, to be held in conjunction here beginning Aug. 16.

Delegates from 24 nations are scheduled to attend the two meetings, which will be a part of Sao Paulo's fourth centennial celebration.

Beside the formal study sessions of the congress and the conference, special exhibitions of folk dancing and folk arts are planned.

The organizers as yet are uncertain just what the foreign delegations will offer. But from Brazil proper there will be schools of samba, and "capoeiristas" from Bahia. The last are specially trained men who stage a dance-fight to the music of the berimbau, reco-reco and tambourine. It was brought to Brazil by slaves from Angola, Africa.

Among the congress themes are folklore and basic education; folklore in South America; the definition of folklore music and its preservation; and the mutual influence of folklore music and artistic music.

Prof. Ralph S. Boggs of the University of Miami will represent the United States.

Glenn Green told Detective David Harris that he assaulted his mother, Mrs. Alice Green, 70, of Vicco, Ky., as she lay in bed "because she was possessed of the Devil and the Bible says the only thing to do is to beat the Devil out of them."

Mrs. Green was visiting her son, his wife and two children.

She died shortly after admission with a fractured skull and internal injuries.

Green's wife Ollie Louis, 21, told police her husband pulled his mother from her bed, beat her, threw her to the floor and stamped on her.

Mrs. Green said her husband first showed signs of a mental strain while training with the Army reserves at Ft. Eustis, Va., last June. He is a veteran of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

She said he had been admitted to Valley Forge (Pa.) General Hospital, where doctors said he was a violent mental case. She said she had checked him out of the hospital against the Army's wishes.

As Green was being locked up, he asked police, "Is my mother dead?" When told she wasn't, (police had not yet learned of Mrs. Green's death) he remarked: "That is too bad, because if she lives the Devil will leave her and get into me."

The friendly atmosphere of AA does much to help persons who cannot control their drinking," the pastor declared. "Alcoholics Anonymous deserves a great deal of credit for its accomplishments."

One hundred representatives of AA groups from Grants Pass, Medford, Ashland, Tulelake, Yreka and Camp White attended the meeting which was held in the new Klamath Falls AA Center in Maple Park.

Hiram K. 75, of Klamath Falls, oldest active AA member in Southern Oregon, set the pace for the organization when he said:

"For 55 years I battled John Barleycorn. Most of that time I was an uncontrolled drinker. If AA could bring me sobriety, I don't see any reason why anyone who wants to quit drinking can't do it through Alcoholics Anonymous."

There will be balloting on new candidates and an interesting lecturer's hour, starting at 9 p.m. Refreshments will follow. All Grange members are urged to attend.

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Five State River Pact Meeting Held

PORTLAND (AP)—The Columbia Interstate Compact Commission opened a two-day meeting here Monday at which a draft of a proposed five-state water development compact is to be discussed.

Five states have been authorized by Congress to form the compact. They are Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming.

Oregon and Washington representatives were expected to continue their opposition to a proposal advanced at the commission's last meeting in May—which reserved electric power produced at a dam site for the state in which the dam is built.

Doctor To Face Trial

CLEVELAND (AP)—Dr. Samuel Sheppard, accused of killing his pregnant wife Marilyn, leaves his tiny jail cell today for at least one court appearance.

The handsome 30-year-old osteopath goes to the court of Common Pleas Judge Frank J. Merrick for a hearing on an affidavit of prejudice filed by his attorney against Bay Village's acting mayor, Gerstman M. M. Barber. The attorney, William J. Corrigan, declares that Barber is unfit because of prejudice to hold a preliminary hearing on a first-degree murder charge against Dr. Sheppard.

If Judge Merrick rules Barber is prejudiced, the preliminary hearing will be shifted to a municipal court in some other Cuyahoga County community.

Barber, who is also the suburb's Council president, has said if the affidavit is denied he will go ahead with a preliminary hearing, bringing the doctor into Bay Village court.

Barber signed the arrest warrant against Sheppard, whose 31-year-old wife was killed July 4.

Barber has been acting in the absence of Bay Village Mayor J. Spencer Houk, friend of the osteopath and an expected material witness in the case.

Union Labor Unit Picks Candidates

FOREST GROVE (AP)—Democratic candidates for Congress were endorsed Sunday by the Labor League for Political Action of the first congressional district.

The league, a union labor organization, urged election of Richard L. Neuberger, who is opposing Republican incumbent Sen. Guy Gordon, and Donnell Mitchell, who is opposing Republican incumbent Rep. Walter Norblad.

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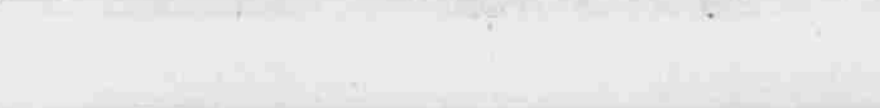
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
