

Loggers On Picket Line At Capital

SALEM (AP) — Thirty lumber workers from Sweet Home picketed the Oregon State Capitol Monday in a demand for Gov. Paul L. Patterson to intervene in the lumber strike.

At the same time, acting Gov. Eugene E. Marshall was given petitions signed by 296 Lebanon and Sweet Home businessmen, asking that he bring employers and employees together in an effort to end the crippling strike.

The pickets are members of the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union at Sweet Home. They carried banners saying "Governor, We Want Arbitration," and "Governor, Where Is Your Committee?" Dale Adkins, business agent of the local, told reporters:

"We want the governor to submit the dispute to the State Board of Conciliation, which now doesn't even exist. We want him to help us get arbitration, which the employers won't give us."

The State Board of Conciliation is a three-man board which is set up to investigate the causes of labor disputes. However, the board now has only one member.

Dave Epps, Sweet Home furniture dealer who presented the petitions to Marshall, said they were signed by businessmen of Lebanon and Sweet Home, who "are unable to pay their bills because of this terrible strike."

Epps was accompanied by John O'Malley, Sweet Home insurance man; and W. Gordon Allen, operator of radio stations in Lebanon and Salem.

Gov. Patterson is in Washington, D. C., for a conference with President Eisenhower on the President's proposed highway program. Sen. Marshall, McMinnville, is acting governor.

The pickets appeared at 11:30 a. m. Adkins said they would remain here for two or three hours. They spent their time walking around the Capitol.

Epps said that his group had no connection with the pickets.

Marshall said they would refer the petitions to Gov. Patterson, who will be back Thursday.

Actress Faces Damage Suits

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A fatal traffic accident which resulted in charges of manslaughter and hit-and-run driving against former actress Lynne Baggett has been followed by three damage suits.

The latest, for \$25,000, was filed yesterday by Joseph Silvers on behalf of his son Dennis Silvers, 10, a passenger in a vehicle which collided with the machine driven by Mrs. Baggett last July 7. Another passenger with Dennis, Joel Wainick, 9, was killed.

Earlier suits were filed by Mrs. Lillian Wainick, mother of the dead boy, for \$50,000 and by Thomas J. Sanderson, 28, driver of the vehicle in which the youths were riding. Sanderson was joined by another passenger, John C. Beasley, 22, in asking \$32,000 damages.

Mrs. Baggett is due in court Thursday to enter pleas on the charges.

Smokers Cause 66 Forest Fires

SALEM (AP) — Careless smokers have caused 66 forest fires in Oregon this year, State Forester George Spurr reported Monday.

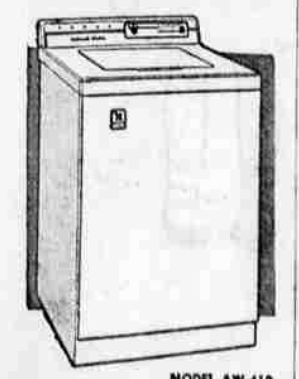
There have been 246 forest fires on state and private lands this year, of which 216 were man-caused, and 33 were caused by lightning.

The fires have burned over 1,165 acres, which is 500 acres more than in the same period of last year.

There have been 49 fires caused by debris burning, 26 by logging, 13 by camp fires, 8 by arsonists, and 3 by railroads.

Ike Host To Children On Boat Ride

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower had promised his grandchildren a boat ride.

Kids never forget a promise like that. So last night he took them on a 4 1/2-hour cruise down the Potomac River to George Washington's historic home at Mount Vernon.

When the trip ended at 10 p. m., grinning grandfather Eisenhower led the three small and sleepy children ashore, looking every bit as though he had as much fun as they did.

Five-year-old Barbara Anne walked across the gangplank at the Naval Gun Factory pier wearing a nightgown under a robe. A maid carried tired little Susan, 2.

David, 6, had more spark left than his sisters. When the 64-foot Navy cabin cruiser pulled to the pier, David and the President were perched side by side on a deck cushion in the bow. They watched the mooring operation with interest.

The cruise got under way in the late afternoon in perfect weather after a torrential rain had threatened to wash it out.

On board in addition to the President and Mrs. Eisenhower and the children were the youngsters' parents, Max and Mrs. John S. Eisenhower; the First Lady's sister and her husband, Col. and Mrs. Gordon Moore; and the two Moore children, Marlene, 13, and Ellen, 12. The party had dinner aboard, 12.

As the craft cast off, the President—a big smile on his face—was with Susan on his lap. David sat alongside with a life preserver around his shoulders. Barbara Anne scanned the horizon through a pair of binoculars.

"All right children," their grandfather called, "here we go."

The President promised the boat ride when his grandchildren were three weeks ago. They had been after him ever since to make good.

Man Held For Extortion Try

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Mrs. Maude Christiansen's \$10 in antiques, which she values at \$5,000, are still missing but police are holding a man who, they say, tried to capitalize on her loss.

Mrs. Christiansen said she got a phone call yesterday from a man who said:

"Meet me in the Pacific Electric station at 1 p. m. I have a red rose so I'll know you. Bring \$500 in a manila envelope and I'll tell you where your antiques are."

Mrs. Christiansen notified police and kept the date. Officers arrested a man who approached her and hooked her on suspicion of extortion. They identified him as Joseph A. Swafford, 34, of Portland, Ore., an ex-convict, and quoted him as saying concerning the antiques:

"Now, I didn't take them. Haven't any idea who did. I just thought this might be a good way to pick up a fast \$500."

Chiang's Ships Sink Red Boats

TALPIEH, Formosa (AP) — The defense ministry said Monday eight Nationalist warships in undisclosed strength sank eight Communist gunboats at Formosa Strait in the darkness early Monday.

It was described as the biggest naval engagement ever to take place in the strait.

An announcement said the Nationalist warships returned to base undamaged after the battle off Tungshan Island, 180 miles west of Formosa.

Central News reported four other Red warships were damaged in the 75-minute engagement.
