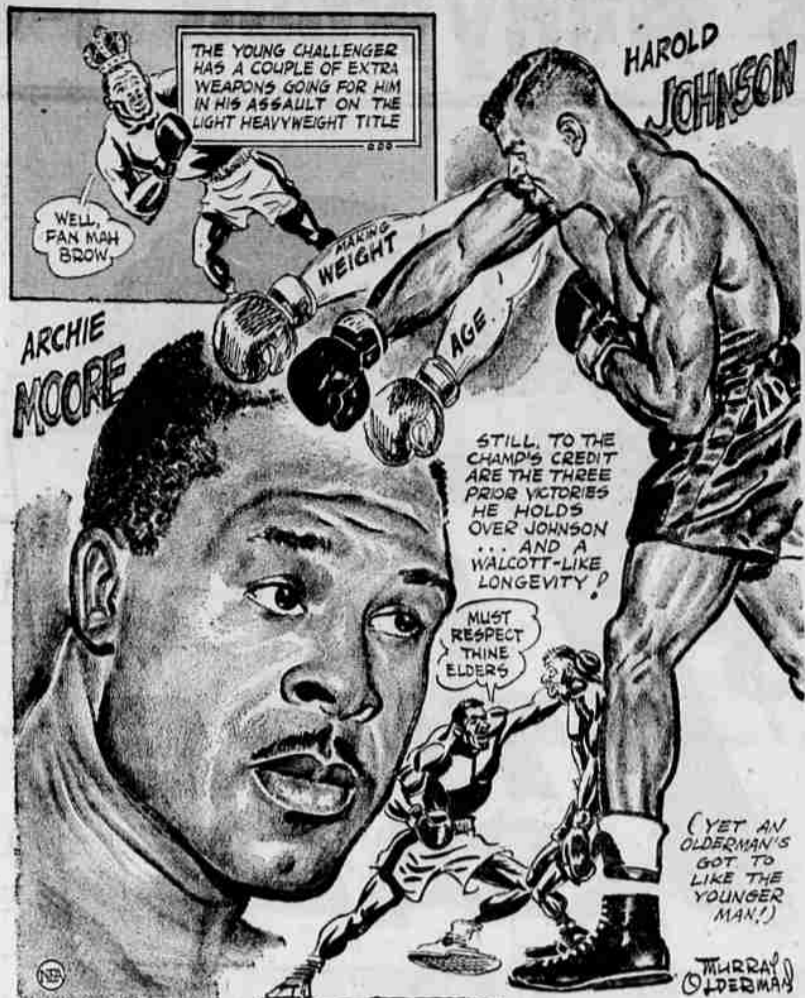

Offers Made For Athletics

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—A board of directors meeting of the Philadelphia Athletics is faced today with two offers to buy the American League baseball club. One comes from a Chicago businessman who wants to move the team to Kansas City. The other was presented yesterday by a syndicate seeking to keep the A's in the Quaker City. Today's meeting follows talks between the Philadelphia group and Roy Mack, executive vice-president of the A's. The "basis for settlement" by a group headed by financier Albert M. Greenfield and drug store executive Harry Sytk is the second offer for the club within a week. Chicagoan Arnold Johnson recently said he would buy the club for a reported \$4 million dollars and move the team to Kansas City. The exact nature of the local syndicate's offer was not disclosed—possibly to allow Earle Mack and his father, Connie, now 91, to weigh the two without the pressure of public opinion. Roy wants to keep the club here and maintain an active part in its affairs. Earle and his father have indicated they want out soon and that the club's financial situation is too precarious to continue operating much longer. It has been indicated that the Johnson offer probably would mean a two million dollar cash split for the three Macks. Greenfield, on the other hand, has estimated that it would take about \$4 million dollars to "salvage" the club, of which only a million would go to the Mack family.

John Landy Admits To Foot Injury

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP)—John Landy admitted yesterday he accidentally cut his left foot the day before he and Dr. Roger Bannister ran the "Miracle Mile" and said he tried to keep the injury secret so it could not be construed as an alibi. After a day of denying published reports, the Australian miller reluctantly acknowledged the stories were true. He told reporters he stepped on a photographer's discarded flash bulb, inflicting a cut that required four stitches. The accident occurred at 3 a.m. Friday. Landy said yesterday the cut "didn't bother me in the slightest." Despite the injury, Landy paced the field in the mile until the closing yards when Bannister spurred him to win in 3:58.8. Landy was clocked in at 3:59.6.

Joey Maxim Missing In Tonight's Battle

NEW YORK (AP)—Somehow it doesn't seem legal; Archie Moore defending his light heavyweight title and Joey Maxim not in the other corner.

Pal Joey and Archie the gypsy had a lock on the 175-pound division for so long that Doc Kearns almost—remember, I said almost—ran out of new cities for the tour. They started in St. Louis, moved west to Ogden, Utah, and closed temporarily in Miami. At one stage, the good doctor was talking nonsense about a "fight to the finish" in Las Vegas.

While Joey and Archie fiddled, young Harold Johnson burned. For years, Moore played the role of the neglected warrior. Once he got the title, he had eyes only for Maxim. Johnson's screaming for a Moore bout fell on deaf ears. Now it may be that Johnson, too often a reluctant warrior on the big time, will rip and tear into Archie with the pent-up fury of a fighter scorned. More likely, he will try to outbox him, banking on the champ tiring down the stretch.

The four previous bouts between these two men do not suggest that Moore's title is in too much danger. Archie won three of the four, dropping Johnson twice in the first bout. The last three were close but the old master seemed to have the youngster's number.

In light of past experience, it should be noted that Archie hasn't been weakened by other weight-making bouts. Last January he had legal trouble with his wife too. He walked the streets in a plastic jacket, trying to sweat it out, and had to peel off five pounds the day of the fight. Then he went into the ring and put on one of his superior performances.

Johnson, Moore In Title Meet

NEW YORK (AP)—Light heavyweight champion Archie Moore, still a great fighter as he nears his 38th birthday, is a 5-4 favorite to whip stolid young Harold Johnson in a 15-round title bout tonight.

The globe-trotting 175-pound ruler, now a Miami resident, will be seeking his 19th straight victory when he steps into the Madison Square Garden ring at 9 p.m. (EST) against the muscular, 26-year-old contender from Philadelphia. It will be the fifth scrap between the two Negroes in a series dating back to April 26, 1949. The first time the clever and experienced Moore floored the ex-sailor twice and won decisively. The next three were all close with Moore winning two and Johnson one.

Johnson's ten round triumph on Dec. 10, 1951 was Archie's last defeat. The strong-armed Moore edged the Philadelphia Jan. 29, 1952 and went on to sweep 17 other fights, including three title contests with Joey Maxim.

In building up a 12-fight victory streak of his own, Johnson, son of a former heavyweight boxer, defeated Ezzard Charles and Nino Valdes, the two leading heavyweight contenders. Although the match between the two leading light heavies has been long awaited, the promoting International Boxing Club probably will be satisfied with a crowd of 8,000 and a gate of \$30,000 at a \$10 top. The telecast and the local radio broadcast will bring in another \$50,000. Moore will get 40 per cent of the net gate and radio-TV money while Johnson is given for 30 per cent. If Johnson wins, he'll have to give Archie a return fight within 90 days at a 20-30 split of the purse.

Although he's been fighting 18 years and has had 141 scraps, this will mark Archie's debut as a Madison Square Garden contestant.
