

Local All-Stars Enter In Tourney

Klamath Falls' entry in the state Women's Softball Tournament, being held in Portland starting tomorrow, will leave some time tomorrow and play their first game Friday evening at 7:00.

The all-stars are composed of girls from five different teams in the league and boast two all-state players, one of whom has been named to the mystic team twice.

Ruth Hagelstein, the stars' first baseman, has been selected to the state all-star team twice, once as an outfielder and last year as the team's first baseman. T. E. Walker of Malin is the other all-stater that will make the trip to the tournament with the local team, she was selected as the all-state catcher last season.

Another outstanding performer who will undoubtedly help the local entry in the weekend tourney is Mickey Hayman, the team's leading pitcher who has been beaten only once this season, that time by the Elv Lind Florists of Portland.

Couch Bob Mathias of Oregon Woolen will take a traveling squad of 13 players with him including three pitchers, in hopes of bringing home the first place trophy that they lost by a 1-0 score in the final game of last year's tournament to Oswego.

The pitchers include Mickey Hayman of Gino's, Margaret Scilla and Sally Urbans of Midland, catcher Teddy Walker of Malin and first baseman Ruth Hagelstein of Gino's.

The remainder of the infield consists of Mary Taylor, Malin, at second base, Sandy Barron, Gino's at shortstop and Sherry Larson of Gino's at the hot corner of the infield, third base.

Maxine Johanson of Oregon Woolen, Darlene Gordon of Malin, and Pat Barron of Gino's comprise the outfield.

Ruff Hurls No-Hitter For Suburban

Mel Parnell Confident After Shutout

BOSTON (AP)—A more confident Mel Parnell, injured nearly four months ago, took a new lease on life today and so did the Boston Red Sox after his four-hit shutout against Washington.

"I was afraid that I was all washed up—that it was too late for me to start over again," admitted the 32-year old lefthander.

The one-time ace of the Sox foundered, making only his sixth appearance since his wrist was broken by a pitched ball against the same club April 24, allowed only two runners to get as far as second base in giving up three singles and a double for a 4-0 triumph last night.

"My arm had been worrying me for a long time," Mel said. "I was worried before this game. But once I got started I felt great." The victory was Parnell's first of the season against three losses and his first complete game. A two-time 20-game winner for the Sox since arriving here in 1947, Parnell was hit by a pitch thrown by former roommate Maury McDermott in Washington a scant 11 days after the current campaign began.

Since that time he had tossed a total of only 8 1-3 innings in five appearances before last night.

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San Diego Blanks Hollywood 1-0

San Diego's challenging Padres grabbed the opener of their important Pacific Coast League series with Hollywood Tuesday night, 1-0. The win shaved the Star's lead to 3 1/2 games. The Padres picked up the winning counter in the first inning as Al Federoff was safe on an error and scored on Earl Rapp's single.

Bob Spicer buried Los Angeles to a 3-1 decision over Portland, although Dick Fiedler, former University of Southern California hurler, yielded only three safe blows. Spicer managed to scatter the hits and that was all important.

Two of the Angel hits and their runs came in the fourth inning. Bob Usher was hit by a pitched ball and scored when Bruce Edwards doubled. Edwards then tallied on Don Robertson's single.

Southpaw Tommy Byrne notched his 16th pitching victory as Seattle turned back Oakland, 8-4. Byrne not only pitched himself out of several jams but contributed a home run in the Seattle cause. The blow came in the eighth inning, with the bases empty, Oakland used three pitchers trying to halt the Seattle attack, which produced 14 hits. Chris Van Cuyk, who took over for Bill Atkins in the fifth, was the loser, although George Bamberger worked the seventh and eighth.

San Francisco second baseman Jim Moran hit a double in the seventh inning that drove in three runs and gave the Seals a 5-3 decision over Sacramento. Two walks, Will Tiesiera's double and Moran's clincher pinned the defeat on the hard working Marino Pietrelli. Bill Bradford was the winning pitcher.

San Diego southpaw Bob Kerrigan held the Stars to three hits after Rapp's single before getting into trouble in the ninth and giving way to Al Lyons.

Lyons got out of a bad jam. With the bases loaded and two down, Frank Kelleher, the aging Hollywood Flyhawk, smashed the first pitch far into center field. Off with the crack of the bat, Dick Fieber raced almost to the fence and pulled in the line drive by a back hand stab.

It was that kind of ball game all the way. Carlos Bernier made the same kind of grab on Luke Easter's smash in left center in the fifth when there were runners on first and third and two down.

Jim Walsh, trying for his fifth straight win, pitched creditably for the Stars and fanned eight. Lino Donoso, who was operated on for appendicitis July 17, pitched the ninth.

The game drew 6,961 at Hollywood's Gilmore Field.

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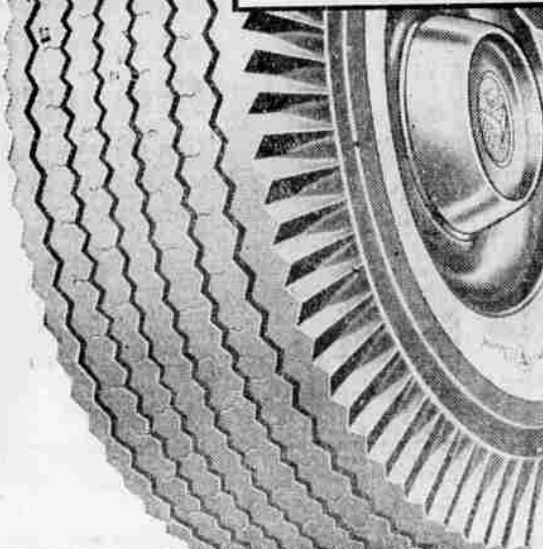


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
