Eddie Stanky's chances of sticking as manager of the St. Louis Cardinals appear to be growing slimmer day by day.

Unless there is a sudden change for the better in the Cardinals' fortunes — and none is in sight — owner Gusle Busch is going to have to decide how much longer he can stick with Stanky in face

of mounting opposition.

The source of Stanky's present difficulties is his pitching staff. He talked hopefully about his mound corps during the spring, especially after the purchase of Vic Raschi from the Yankees. But it hasn't been good, even at the start, and the staff has gone from bad to worse.

Raschi took his lumps last night in an 11-0 trouncing by the Milwaukee Braves. It was the seventh loss for the veteran righthander, who has won eight. Cardinal pitchers have completed only 27 of 110 games and only one this month.

The Cards sank to sixth place with the loss. Eight of the 10 Milwaukee hits went for extra bases. Del Grandall, Hank Aaron, Joe Adcock and Eddie Mathews all hit home runs.

Even with another two years on his contract Stanky must be mighty uncomfortable.

There was a lot of good pitching last night, too. Jim Wilson of the Braves gave St. Louis only three

singles in winning his eighth game without a loss.

Johnny Antonelli and Marv Grissom combined in a three-hitter as the New York Giants shaded Pittsburgh 2-1. The Giants got only four safeties off Dick Littlefield and Johnny Heikl.

Lefty Mel Parnell of the Boston Red Sox scattered four hits in beating Washington 4-0. Ned Garver spaced five singles in Detroit's 4-0 triumph over Cleveland.

The Braves gained a game on second place Brooklyn, which lost to Philadelphia 6-3, but stayed 7½ behind the Giants.

The New York Yankees defeated the Philadelphia Athletics 5-2 and moved within three games of the Indians.

Baltimore whipped the Chicago White Sox 3-1 and Cincinnati edged the Chicago Cubs 2-1.

Cleveland's pennant drive was stymied temporarily by Garver, who lowered his earned run average to 2.21, lowest in the league.

Wayne Belardi's 11th homer, in the fourth inning, provided the only scoring until the eighth when the Tigers ran wild on the bases.

Bob Grim gave up 10 hits to the Athletics, but kept them scattered in becoming the first rookie to win 15 games this season.

Parnell's victory for the Red Sox was his first this season. The left-hander has been sidelined with a broken wrist most of the year. Ted Williams had a perfect night with two singles and two walks.

A day game between the Senators and Red Sox was rained out.

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U of O Ducks Win Second In Far East

SEOUL, In—The touring University of Oregon basketball team Wednesday whipped an all-star Korean college team, 49-38, for its second straight victory over a South Korean team.

The Oregonians rallied to take a 20-19 halftime lead after trailing by two points at the end of the first quarter.

Forward Jerry Ross of Oregon was top scorer with 10 points. A crowd of about 5,000 watched the game.

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Optimism Hangs Over All-Star Grid Camps

PORTLAND, Aug. 11—There's optimism in both camps as the State and City all-star teams get ready for the 7th annual Shirner's Hospital all-star football game — "football's finest hour" — the night of August 21 in Multnomah Stadium.

Even the rival coaches, Harry Sourff of City and Mel Ingram of Grants Pass, appear confident of victory, but they, of course, are very cautious when it comes to making any predictions.

Both squads are engaged in twice daily workouts and these will continue until just a few days before the annual classic.

Sourff, seeking his first win as an all-star mentor, thinks this year's City squad is stronger than the one he piloted a year ago, but asserts at the same time that State looks even better than the team that upset City, 21 to 12, in 1953.

Since both squads are blessed with excellent aerial combinations and back that can ramble on the ground, there is every reason to believe that this year's tussle might see a record number of touchdowns scored.

State boasts such talented quarterbacks as Don Graham of North Bend, Jack Henkle of Eugene and

Herb Triplett of Salem, and these signal callers are backed up by such halfbacks as LeRoy Hanley of Hermiston, Jim Shanley of North Bend, Bob Woods of Grants Pass, Mike Campbell of Salem, Jim Pifer of Baker and Duane Fournier of McMinnville.

In the fullback slots, State has Mel Gillett of Prineville, Don Korns of Grants Pass and Jim Dougherty of Klamath Falls, either one of whom is capable of going all the way.

Capt. Eugene W. Ferguson, managing director of the classic, says there appears to be more interest this year than ever before, possibly because of the fact there were so many outstanding high school performers in the state last year. All of the players were high school seniors last fall.

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
