

### 'Bly Frolics' Plans Told

**BLY** — The organizations of the Bly community have completed plans for the "Bly Frolics" to be held Saturday and Sunday, August 14-15.

The program starts with a street dance Saturday evening, beginning at 8 p.m. Music for the dance will be by the Lorella Three-Notes.

A barbecue is planned for the Sprague Canyon recreation area on Sunday. Numerous concessions and activities have been planned for the entertainment of old and young. Fishing and swimming are also on the program.

Highlight of the day will be the coronation of the queen. Entered in the contest are Carol Lee Bender, Shannon Briley, Lee Ann Rennie, Robyn Smith and Susan Zikkanen.

All proceeds from the frolics will go into a united fund to buy playground equipment for the Bly school. Proceeds from the 1953 frolics were used to build a tennis court on school property. The frolics is to be held annually according to present plans.

### Anti-Marketing Suit Filed

**PHILADELPHIA** (AP) — An 81-year-old Pennsylvania poultry farmer has asked the U.S. District Court to declare unconstitutional the price and acreage control features of the Federal Farm and Marketing Administration Act.

In a suit filed with the court yesterday, Joseph Blattner of R. D. 3, Norristown, claimed that acreage controls on his wheat crop will put him out of business and deprive him of a living.

Blattner, claiming he requires all his land to raise feed for his chickens, seeded eight extra acres and refuses to pay \$178.20 in penalties imposed by federal farm agents.

In the suit, Blattner contends that the government, by serving the penalty notice, is taking his property without due process of law and that by limiting acreage, the government forces the plaintiff to buy at U.S. supported prices extra grain needed to keep his poultry.

### Detroit Milk Prices Reduced

**DETROIT** (AP) — Union employees of six Detroit dairies have approved an agreement to cut the price of home-delivered milk by three cents a quart — in lieu of a pay raise.

Brunson Gilbert, president of Local 156 of the AFL Milk Drivers and Dairy Employees Union, said the workers first sought a \$12-a-week pay increase.

But they decided to forego it, he said, if the dairies would cut prices the equivalent of a \$12-a-week pay raise.

The three-cent reduction would benefit all customers who use more than 30 quarts a month.

### Paroled Burglar Seizes Payroll

**NEW YORK** (AP) — Eleven years ago Albert Dorsey was paroled on a burglary sentence and given a job by a Brooklyn shoe factory.

The 54-year-old Dorsey became the firm's "most trusted employee."

Yesterday, as paychecks were being handed out at the plant, Dorsey suddenly grabbed \$3,750 in payroll envelopes from a woman book-keeper and fled.

Factory vice president Samuel Dones said: "I would have trusted him with anything. I even let him keep a set of keys to this place. Why did he do a thing like that?"

### Nation's Hay Crop Lowers

The estimated yield of the nation's hay crop dropped over six million tons within the last 30 days, according to crop estimates released by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Tuesday.

Estimated tons as of August 1 were 101,216,000 compared to an estimate of 107,494,000 tons on July 1. Last year the hay crop amounted to 105,300,000 tons and the 10 year average stands at 101,959,000 tons.

Pasture conditions averaged only 59 per cent of normal compared to 72 per cent a year ago and 82 per cent of the 10 year average.

These lower estimates coupled with the severe drought in the

South and Central states could have some effect on local hay prices this fall in the opinion of local county agents.

Klamath Basin farmers harvested a below normal crop of first cutting alfalfa due to early frosts, but with continued good weather the second cutting should be above normal, farmers believe.

With pastures in the drought area continuing to dwindle it is apparent cattlemen will be forced to turn stock onto grass that would normally have been cut for hay. This condition could result in a still lower estimate in the next 30 days, crop authorities state.

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### Anti-Red Bill Faces Battle

**WASHINGTON** (AP) — Administration leaders trying to strengthen the Anti-Communist flavor of their legislative record had a fight on their hands today from senators protesting the approach of a bill aimed at ridding labor unions of Red influences.

A first test of strength shaped up on a substitute proposal by Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.) to set up a 12-member commission to study the whole problem and report its findings by next Jan. 15.

Magnuson said he had made no vote count but "wouldn't be surprised" if his proposal carried after debate which the Senate agreed to limit to one hour today.

The substitute was offered for a bill of Sen. Butler (R-Md.) under which labor unions found by the Subversive Activities Control Board to be "Communist-infiltrated" would lose the right to be certified by the National Labor Relations Board as bargaining agents.

Butler told the Senate last night that "the Attorney General approves this bill" and Senate Republican leader Knowland of California told newsmen the administration is supporting it.

The measure is along the lines of a bill Atty. Gen. Brownell had asked, providing for the dissolution of Communist-infiltrated labor unions and business firms, as part of the administration's anti-communist program.
