

Micka-Cornett Nuptial Rites Summer Event In Malin Church

White daisies and white gladioli with greenery in large basket arrangements formed the background for the summer wedding of Barbara Ann Cornett to Robert George (Bob) Micka, in Malin Presbyterian Church, August 1.

The marriage united two well-known Malin families and a large gathering of friends and relatives witnessed the 3 p.m. candlelight service read by the Rev. Carl C. deMott.

Elizabeth Bunnell, organist, accompanied Mrs. A. B. Herringshaw, vocal soloist.

Bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carlo B. Cornett and bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Micka.

The bride, escorted by her father, who gave her in marriage, wore a gown of traditional white satin, which she had made herself. The low, round neckline of the bodice was seed pearl trimmed; and the long, snug sleeves were pointed at the wrists. The full floor-length skirt featured a chapel train.

A half-cap of satin outlined with seed pearls held the fingertip veil of illusion; which was the "something borrowed" (from Mrs. Philip Blohm). She carried a bouquet of white gladioli and stephanotis tied with streamers.

Barbara's only jewelry was an heirloom diamond bar pin, which had belonged to her great-aunt.

A silver sash was worn in her slipper; and the blue garter she wore was made by a schoolmate from Oregon State College.

Maid of honor, and bride's only attendant, was Elizabeth McVay.

She wore a pale green dress of Chantilly lace, with a full ballerina length skirt. The fitted bodice was styled with a low vee neckline, and brief sleeves.

Best man was Paul Micka, Richard Micka, brother of the bridegroom; and Marshall Cornett, brother of the bride, and namesake of his uncle, the late Marshall Cornett, ushered — and also served as candlelighters.

The bride's mother chose a two-piece navy blue silk to wear to Barbara's wedding. Her accessories were white; and a corsage of pink rosebuds was at her shoulder.

The senior Mrs. Micka wore a light blue silk — also two-piece — with navy accessories and a shoulder corsage of pink rosebuds completing the ensemble.

Guests were received in the basement rooms of the church immediately after the wedding. Mrs. Lewis Kandra was at the coffee service; and Mrs. Joe Micka and Mrs. Frank Micka were at the punch bowl. All are aunts of the bridegroom.

Cake was cut by Mrs. Marshall (Olive B.) Cornett, aunt of the bride; and Mrs. George Micka, another aunt of the bridegroom.

table; and Anne Curry registered the guests.

For going away, the new Mrs. Micka wore a lavender cotton summer dress with white accessories. Their honeymoon destination was unrevealed; but shortly after the middle of August, they plan to be at their ranch home about three miles east of Malin.

Both bride and bridegroom attended local schools and both went to Oregon State College.
