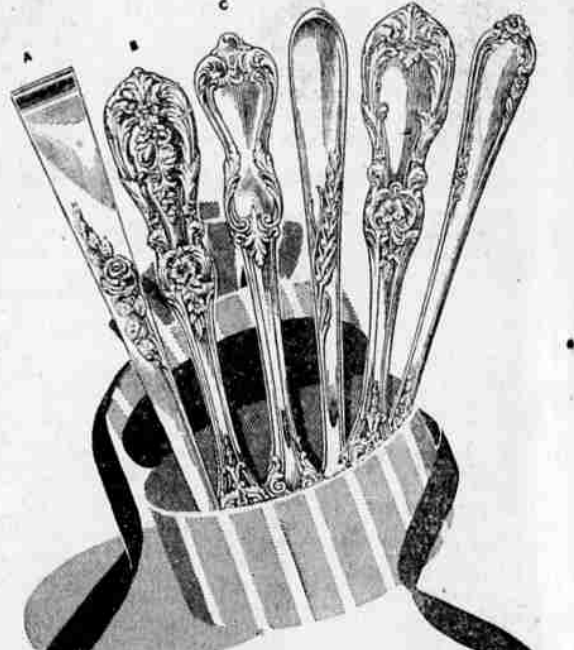
Bride-Elect Frances Eifert Honored at Pre-Nuptial Shower
