

Forestry Meet Slated

PORTLAND — Several hundred foresters, industry representatives, and others interested in conservation of the nation's natural resources will convene September 6 through 9 for the 79th annual meeting of the American Forestry Association. This is the oldest citizens' conservation organization in the country.

The Portland meeting, first ever held in the Pacific Northwest by the AFA, is expected to attract conservationists from every part of the nation, according to Lowell Besley, AFA executive director-forester.

Delegates from the East, South and Midwest will make the trip to Portland on AFA's "Conservation Caravan," a special train that will make a grand circle tour of the West, with stops at Glacier National Park in Montana, Yosemite National Park in California, the redwoods section of California, the Grand Canyon and other points of interest. About 150 persons are expected to be aboard the train which leaves Chicago August 30 and returns September 17.

A feature of the four-day meeting will be the field trips to tree farms, private holdings, national forests and parks, and industrial operations that surround Portland. One day, September 6, will be devoted to business sessions and the remaining three days will offer conducted field tours.

Keynote speaker at business sessions will be Charles A. Sprague, former governor of Oregon, whose theme will be "Multiple Use for Maximum Utilization." Banquet speaker will be Governor Paul F. Patterson.

Stewart Hobcock, well known author and historian, will be luncheon speaker.

Calm Hostess Aids Passengers

BLACKBUSHE AIRPORT, England (AP) — A calm Irish hostess held the door of her burning airplane open here yesterday as all 37 Britons aboard fled out to safety. A few minutes later all but the tail section of the plane burned.

The chartered Viking airliner, belonging to Airwork, Ltd., crashed-landed after one engine failed following takeoff. A wing and an engine snapped off as the aircraft belly-landed short of the runway and caught fire.

Nine passengers were taken to a hospital at nearby Oxford for observation.

The hostess, Beryl Rothwell, discounted her own role in the crash, paying tribute instead to the passengers. "They behaved as coolly as though an air crash were an every-day incident," she said.

Former Legion Commander Dies

PORTLAND (AP) — Alfred P. Kelley, 61, former state commander of the American Legion, died at a hospital here Sunday after a year's illness.

Kelley, a Portland attorney, was president of the Multnomah County Bar Assn. in 1935-36, and was commander of the Legion in 1940-41. Since 1947 he had served as legal advisor to the State Racing Commission.

Survivors include the widow, a son and a daughter.

It was announced here today by the National Rifle Association of America.

The above-named competitor joins a field of the nation's top 1,000 civilian and military high-power rifle marksmen from all 48 states and U. S. territorial possessions who will shoot against the defending national champions, Staff Sergeant Don L. Smith, USMC, present owner of the national service rifle crown.

The smallbore rifle and pistol national matches also will be held on the world famous Lake Erie shooting site during the same period.

Yangtze Flood Hits New High

TOKYO (AP) — The rampaging Yangtze River, which has flooded hundreds of thousands of square miles of China's farmland and dealt the Red rulers of the land a serious economic blow, hit a new all-time high of 97.18 feet yesterday. The broadcast, heard here, admitted the surging Yangtze had washed away houses and farm land in the central China area.

The broadcast said 2,700,000,000 yuan had been doled out to flood victims who were "safely evacuated" from the outskirts of the tricity complex at Wuhan.
