

### British, Greeks Dispute Over Cyprus Base Status

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — Greece and Britain, outwardly long friends, have come to diplomatic blows in the United Nations over the future of Cyprus, a large Mediterranean island base which Britain has and Greece wants.

After five years of trying to get the British to agree on a Cyprus plebiscite, the Greeks have announced they will come in before the end of the week with a plea for U.N. intervention.

Trading on U.N. declarations about the right of all peoples to self-determination, the Greeks now want the U.N. to vote for an election on Cyprus which they are sure would overwhelmingly favor union with Greece.

The British are pretty sure that the island's preponderantly Greek population would vote that way too. They don't like the idea.

The British have just been forced into an agreement to leave the Suez Canal area. They have been sniped at by Spain, which wants Gibraltar as the western gate of the Mediterranean. They are fearful that Communist influence in Cyprus, as well as in Greece itself, might someday threaten effectiveness of what is now considered an important NATO base, made more important by the promised evacuation of Suez.

The British make no secret of opposing any move to weaken their hold on Cyprus.

"They argue that Cyprus never was a part of Greece, that Turkey opposes any change in island rule because almost one-fifth of the island's half-million population is Turkish, and that any change might hamper NATO defenses."

### Hollywood Movie Theater Shows Only Silent Films

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Here's one movie house that doesn't worry about converting to Superscope, VistaVision or Cinemascope. It hasn't even tried talkies yet.

The place is called Silent Movies, and it is the labor of love for a man named John Hampton. His biggest draws are Clara Bow, Lon Chaney, Emil Jannings, William S. Hart, Harold Lloyd, Mary Pickford, Pearl White, Charlie Chaplin and Douglas Fairbanks Sr.

Hampton is a movie-mad Oklahoman who has been running films since he was 13. At that age, his father gave him a full-sized movie projector. Every week he ran silent movies on a sheet in the parlor of his Oklahoma City home with an audience up to 100 kids.

When he grew older, he took jobs with movie exchanges, but his heart was still with the silents. He tried touring small towns with his shows, but the rural folks wanted only to see the new-fangled talkies. He had to seek another climate for health reasons, so he took his operation to Florida. Patronage proved to be seasonal, so he moved here.

On Feb. 23, 1942, he opened the silent movies on Fairfax Avenue near the heart of Hollywood. It was a fateful night. Los Angeles was gripped by the scare of a Japanese bombing attack.

But Hampton managed to keep the place open during the war and has been in business ever since. His wife takes tickets and he runs

the projection machine and record player. Also hangs the posters, glues the old film together, redevelops it if fading has set in, etc.

"Our biggest problem is getting the pictures," he told me in his work room-apartment over the movie house. "Some of the studios will lend them, and so will those producers and directors who have their old films."

"A lot of them are in bad shape, and I make it a policy of running only whole pictures, not fragments. This can be difficult. I had to piece together five prints of 'Tillie's Punctured Romance' before I had a complete five reels. It's the best copy in existence."

"Tillie" was Mack Sennett's first feature, and it starred Chaplin, Marie Dressler, Mabel Normand and Wally Beery in 1912.

Hampton runs it almost every year, and it's a big draw. So are "Birth of a Nation" (1914), "Phantom of the Opera" (1925) and "King of Kings" (1927).
