Red Cruiser Said Rearmed

HONG KONG (AP)—Independent Chinese reports published here today said Red China's only cruiser, the Chungking, has been reconditioned and rearmed and is now in the north China harbor of Tientsin.

The report aroused unusual interest because of Peiping's current campaign of threats to invade Formosa.

Formerly the British light cruiser Aurora, the Chungking was given to the Chinese Nationalists after World War II.

Her crew defected to the Reds from the Shanghai anchorage in 1949 but Nationalist bombers sank the ship at a mooring in Hulutun harbor, Manchuria. Recently there have been reports that the Communists refloated her and took her to Port Arthur for refitting and regunning by the Russians.

US Navy Aids Evacuation

ABOARD FLAGSHIP ESTES (AP)—The mass evacuation of Vietnamese refugees from northern Indochina began Tuesday when the U.S. Navy transport Menard sailed from Haiphong for Saigon with about 2,000 men, women and children.

Six more U.S. ships, arrived at Haiphong Tuesday to take part in the vast humanitarian project which is being directed by Rear Adm. L. S. Sabin, commander of the U.S. Navy's amphibious group, Western Pacific.

Two attack transports began loading the next group of Vietnamese fleeing southward before the Communists take over all of northern Viet Nam.

Two typhoons in the Japan-Okinawa area have delayed the arrival of additional ships which will participate in the operation, but Navy spokesmen Tuesday expressed confidence they will be able to maintain a steady flow of transports into Haiphong.

Army Enlistment Policy Reported

The U. S. Army is continuing its policy of enlisting high school graduates for specific schooling, according to M-Sgt Claude Miller, local army recruiter.

Under this policy the enlistee is guaranteed a school of his choice prior to enlisting. There are over 100 courses for both men and women and they offer a very diversified field. They offer the young graduate who cannot go to college an opportunity to continue his education and at the same time be paid for going to school.

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Youths Held For Terrorism

NEW YORK (AP)—Four youths, who authorities said "got a kick out of seeing blood flow," have been charged with prowling Brooklyn parks at night and wantonly torturing almost anyone they found. At least two persons were slain, authorities said.

Brooklyn Dist. Atty. Edward S. Silver said Tuesday the youths admitted beating and kicking a man to death, horsewhipping teenage girls and torturing a vagrant; and throwing him into the East River.

Tuesday after a passerby told police he had just seen four boys beat a man in Lou Sobel Park. They confessed to the crimes after all-day questioning, Silver said.

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Credit Group Investing Told

SPOKANE—Farmers and ranchers have invested \$7,396,474 in capital stock of the 30 production credit associations in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington and by January 1, 1956 will completely own these short-term credit institutions, E. E. Henry, president of the Production Credit Corporation of Spokane, announced today.

Since opening for business in 1934, Henry said the 30 associations have extended more than \$1,300,000,000 of credit to their borrower members and during the same 20-year period have retired all but \$210,000 of the \$9,214,500 invested in their capital stock by the federal government. Seventeen of the 30 PCA's are already member-owned. As of June 30, this year, the associations also reported \$8,317,783 in accumulated earnings.

The Production Credit Corporation, a unit of the Farm Credit District of Spokane, serves the PCA's in a supervisory capacity.

Army Announces Bonus Increase

The new reenlistment bill announced recently will be a boon to personnel in the U. S. Army, according to information by M-Sgt Claude Miller, local army recruiter.

Under the provisions of the bill men and women reenlisting for the first time will receive a bonus equal to one month's pay for each year of their enlistment. The second reenlistment will receive a bonus equal to two thirds of a month's pay for each year enlisted and the third reenlistment will receive one third of a month's pay per year enlisted.

Stockyard Fire Kills Animals

MONTREAL (AP)—A two-hour fire destroyed a hog and sheep stable in the Montreal Stockyards last night, killing some 2,000 squealing animals awaiting slaughter and causing damage estimated at more than a million dollars.

Firemen feared the heat-madened hogs, sheep and calves inside the two-story brick building would escape and run berserk through the streets but the building collapsed on top of them.
