

Indians, New York Keep Win Streaks Alive

Phillies Whipped By Giants

Maybe the American League should let Cleveland and New York go ahead and play the five games they have left with each other and get the pennant race.

The way the Indians and Yankees are playing now they might well win all their other games anyway.

They have to use up their strength playing "crucial" series with teams mathematically eliminated from all possible chance at the title. A slipup anywhere along the line could spell the difference.

Just consider the futility of the chase. In their last 58 games, more than half of their total played to date — the second-place Yankees have gained exactly half a length of the Indians.

Here are the figures: The Yankees have won 9 in a row, 15 of their last 18, 25 of their last 43, and 52 of their last 68. But Cleveland has won 8 straight, 12 out of 13, 17 out of 20, and 51 out of 68.

Everybody with any pennant hopes left in either league won yesterday. Cleveland beat Detroit 4-0, New York defeated Philadelphia 6-1 and Chicago whipped Baltimore 4-1 in the American League.

The New York Giants thumped Philadelphia 6-2, Brooklyn shaded Pittsburgh 3-2 and Milwaukee defeated St. Louis 3-1 in the National.

In the only action not involving a contender, Boston edged Washington 9-8 in 11 innings on Karl Williams' single with two out. Ted Williams went hitless in six times at bat.

Cincinnati and the Cubs were rained out at Chicago.

Cleveland managed only five hits off southpaw Billy Hoelt but two were home runs — by Bobby Avila with the bases empty for the first run and by Al Smith with two aboard for the other three. Early Wynn finally won his 16th game in his fourth try.

The Yankees mopped up on the lowly Athletics for the 13th time in 15 meetings. Whitey Ford turned in his seventh straight victory and his 13th of the season.

Chicago pitching continued to baffle the last-place Orioles, who have scored only twice in their last 27 innings. Sandy Consuegra, lifted in the sixth for a pinch hitter, registered his 15th success with five relief from Dick Strahs and Harry Dorish. Don Larsen was charged with his 15th loss, tops in both leagues.

Another pinch paid off for Manager Leo Durocher of the Giants. He replaced the slumping Monte Irvin with Dusty Rhodes and the substitute outfielder belted two home runs that accounted for five runs. The night before, Durocher inserted Rhodes' roommate Bobby Hofman and he homered twice.

The Pirates' fivegame winning streak ended as relief ace Jim Hughes of the Dodgers retired the side in the ninth after two runs had scored and two men were on base.

Lefty Warren Spain checked the Cardinals on five hits, including Stan Musial's 32nd home run. Harvey Haddix had a one-hitter working until two in the seventh. A long triple by Joe Adcock drove in the first run and he scored a moment later on a single by Andy Pafko.

Gil Turner Gains Win Over Andrews

CHICAGO (U.S.) — Gil Turner, lacking his one-time speed and knockout punch, Thursday hopes he is headed back to welterweight contention following one of the most savage fights of his career.

After campaigning unsuccessfully as a middleweight for two years, Turner tangled with durable welterweight Al Andrews Wednesday night in one of the most vicious brawls in several years at Chicago Stadium.

He weighed 152 to Andrews' 152. Turner had Andrews staggering a half dozen times but failed to finish him off, and by the end both 23-year-old fighters were battered and groggy.

Turner won a unanimous 10-round decision. Referee Walter Brightmore favored the Philadelphia Negro 97 to 58. Judge Jim McManus saw it 94 to 94 and Judge John Bray scored it 95 to 90.

The remaining four positions will probably be filled by "Wee Willie" Dunster in left field, Hatfield in center and either George, Art Raymond or Johnny Niles in the right field position, while Art Westhouse will supply the catching talent for the local semi-pros.

Action in the Oregon-California League continues although the local entry has completed its schedule. Lakeview plays Bend this weekend and Alturas the following weekend. When these two games are played that will leave only a protest game between Bend and Lakeview to be played.

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Hollyw'd, San Diego Both Win

San Diego and Hollywood charge opponents Thursday continuing their steaming battle for the Pacific Coast League pennant with Hollywood a scant half game ahead.

The Stars le into their cross town rival, Los Angeles, at Wrigley Field, while San Diego moves into Sacramento. Hollywood sends ace southpaw, Lino Donoso, against the Angels, who are to counter with Johnny Poyas, a rookie who is improving rapidly.

San Diego rapped four San Francisco pitchers for 15 hits Wednesday night to gain a 9-4 decision. Bill Thomson gave the Seals seven hits, three of them bunched in the fourth and three more in the ninth.

Like earlier, giant San Diego first baseman, blasted a three run homer in the fourth inning off Al Lien, who relieved starter Ken Holcombe. Every member of the San Diego team except Thomson got at least one hit, and catcher Walt Pockay led them all with three.

Hollywood snapped back against Sacramento for a 7-4 decision after losing the first two games of the series. The Solons jumped into a 3-0 lead in the second inning and had a tie as late as the sixth.

But singles by Dick Smith, and Tommy Saffell, along with George Vico's double and Lee Walls' homer turned the tide.

Marino Pieretti went all the way for the Seals although he was touched for 13 hits. Rog Bowman, who started for Hollywood, was in the eighth, George O'Donnell hit by a foul ball from the bat of Vico in the seventh and retired taking over. The Stars ended the season against the Seals with a 13-9 bulge in games.

Los Angeles was scheduled for a doubleheader against Seattle but the rains set in again and the players didn't get a chance to perform.

Oakland and Portland battled 13 innings only to have rain halt their contest in a 2-2 tie after four hours of play.

Trailing 2-1 in the ninth inning on the home field, Portland tied the count as Eddie Basinski greeted reliever Jim Atkins with a run scoring single. Chris Van Cuyk then took over for Atkins.

Fred Besana, a newcomer to the Oakland staff, was the starting pitcher with Jenosis Heard on the mound for Portland. Earl Scheib replaced Heard in the eighth.

NEW YORK (NEA) — Chuck Davey went the way of all weak-chinned southpaws who bump into a stiff right-hand puncher and a little of our modern living hit the canvas with him.

As Davey, the erstwhile pugilistic darling of the living room and pub, took on that rank novice look under Vince Martinez' power punching, the 3000 ringworms in the Chicago stadium pulled stakes and went out into the night. But the millions watching it on television felt sad. Here was the end of a guy who meant, to them, a fresh deal in boxing — TV fights free, gratis and for nothing. Davey symbolized it — right to the hard core.

Handled with consummate care, Davey confused some slipshod opponents. Rocky Graziano obliged in his first video rehearsal of the thinly-thatched Michigan State alumnus went on to the title farce with Kid Gavilan.

When they pulled the Havana Special off Davey, most everybody believed it was the last of the inept collegian, but most everybody doesn't know the International Boxing Club. He was rebuilt with carefully screened audacity to again be pawned off as the All-America solution to the woes of TV pugilism, where you can't tell the effect of punches unless one of the savages knocked down and most anything goes.

Davey couldn't fight a lick, but the IBC and its beer sponsor found he was considerably more formidable on the screen than against any fair kind of an opponent.
