WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States will pull two thirds of its ground strength out of Korea in the next few months in carrying out a new military strategy to mount a flexible defense against Communist China and at the same time build up a central strategic reserve at home.

In the largest peacetime redeployment of American forces, announced yesterday, four full divisions will be withdrawn from Korea. Two divisions and smaller units will return to the United

States, and Okinawa and Hawaii will be strengthened by one division each.

Although two fewer divisions will be left in the western Pacific, defense officials interpreted the move as completely in step with President Eisenhower's clear-cut warning Tuesday against any Republic attempt to invade Chinese Nationalist-held Formosa.

OKINAWA

Okinawa, now a major air base, is garrisoned by one Army regimental combat team, about 5,000 strong. The Marine division is "uncommitted" except

Inadequate vision ranks second only to neglected teeth among America's most common health problems, said one of the nation's foremost authorities on the psychophysiological aspects of vision, Dr. A. M. Skeffington. Dr. Skeffington conducted four seminar sessions on vision for optometrists at 30 schools in the United States.

Dr. Skeffington stated that 30 to 40 per cent of all children are handicapped in school by visual problems. Parents should not assume that their child has perfect vision just because he passed the test in the Snellen vision chart in school, he declared. The test is an excellent measure of visual acuity of each eye at 20 feet, he continued, but it does not find the hidden visual problem that can be

Many children with 20-20 vision have binocular problems and other types of visual disturbances at the reading distance that result in poor scholastic achievement.

Dr. Skeffington went on to point out that these uncorrected visual difficulties, resulting in failure in school work often lead to misbehavior and juvenile delinquency. When the child is unable to achieve in school tasks, said Dr. Skeffington, he attempts to gain recognition by becoming unsocial and hard to get along with, both at school and at home.

"My plea," said Dr. Skeffington, "is for the children with the hidden problems which are the unsuspected cause of retarded reading, low grades, or a personality maladjustment. With good teacher observation, an adequate school vision screening program, and community consciousness," he concluded, "our children need not be handicapped in their development. These hidden visual difficulties."

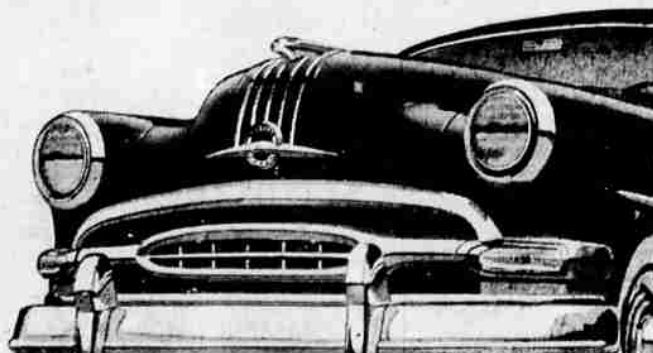
