Play Festival Records Set

ASHLAND — Despite the worst weekend weather-wise, in the 19 year history of the Oregon Shakespeare festival, the famous theatrical event is still setting a new record at the box office.

Last Monday evening's performance of "The Merry Wives of Windsor," following two days of rain and a cold, damp Sunday evening, still drew well over 800 patrons, by far the largest first-of-the-week attendance in history.

The performance of "Henry VI, part 2" on the previous Friday evening was rained out completely, and the Saturday showing of "Hamlet" was driven from Ashland's outdoor theater to a large auditorium in Medford. Although a house of over 1,000 had been assured for the tragedy in Ashland's theater, still 740 of the faithful traveled to Medford to see it indoors. With temperature in the low 40's, some 500 blanket-wrapped patrons went back to the outdoor theater Sunday evening for a performance of—appropriately—"The Winter's Tale."

With the return of warm, sunny weather this week, ticket orders rocketed and the chances of over 20,000 total attendance at the event this season seemed certain again—barring more unexpected bad weather.

An overflow house is assured for several nights in the season, with August 28 slated as perhaps the largest. In addition to the appeal of "The Winter's Tale" and a Saturday night audience, the festival association will play host to a number of distinguished guests, among them Governor Paul Patterson, Senator Guy Cordon and Rep. Harris Ellsworth.

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Big Parade Planned For Modoc Fair

With more than 30 trophy awards available to 1954 entries, the annual Cedarville Fire Department Fair Parade promises to be one of the highlights of the three-day Modoc County Fair in Cedarville, August 27, 28 and 29.

Dean Wylie, parade chairman, said today more entries have been received to date than any other fair parade in the 29 year history of this Modoc County event. With such a large amount of interest being displayed for this year's parade, Wylie said the deadline for entries will be extended until 9:30 a.m. Sunday, August 29. All entries must be at the fair parking area by 9:30 a.m. Sunday morning to be eligible for awards.

A color guard representing all county service organizations will lead this year's parade, followed by the parade marshal and the SUHS band under the direction of Herman Johnson.

Following in the parade will be the school floats, individual floats, juvenile organizations, juvenile horsemen under 16, adult organizations, individual horse entries, business entries, industrial entries and horse groups.

First and second prizes will be awarded to the best juvenile organization floats; first, second, and third place awards will be presented to the best business and industrial floats; awards will be presented to the largest group of horsemen, the best equipped group, best equipped cowboy and cowgirl, best juvenile cowboy 7 to 16 years; best juvenile cowgirl 7 to 16; and special awards to both boys and girls in the children six years or under class.

Special awards are available for other floats and groups not under the above classification. A grand prize sweepstakes trophy will be awarded to the finest entry in the parade.

All members of the Cedarville Fire Department are working on the parade, with Dean Wylie, general chairman, and sub-chairmen are Heath Stanley, Bob Sweet, Grandon Russell and Walt Hussa.

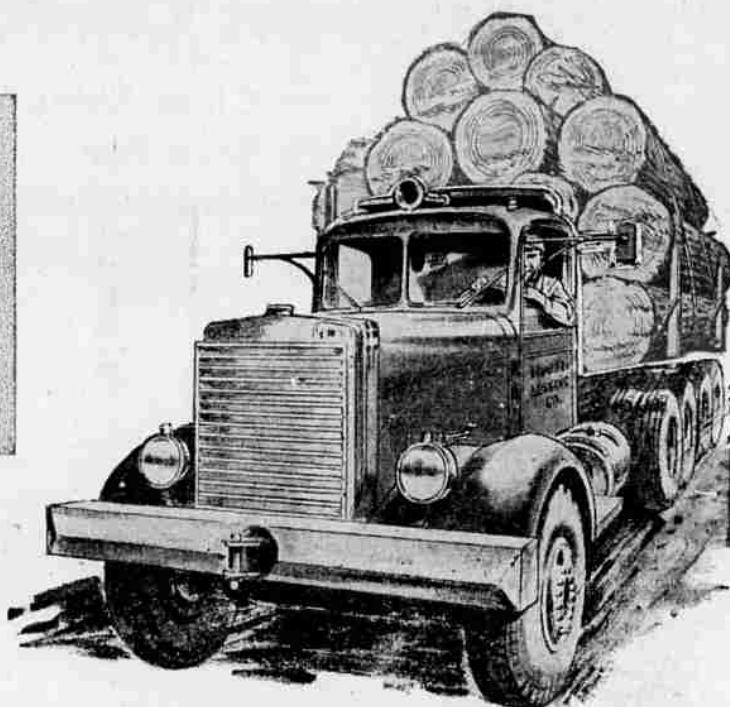
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
