Word has been received here of the death at Medford, Thursday, August 19 of a long-time former Klamath County resident, Fred Roy Stephenson. The family left here 24 years ago. Mr. Stephenson farmed for several years near Merrill.

He was born at Woodlawn, California, March 2, 1880 and was 74 years old at the time of his death. He was a member of the Merrill Presbyterian Church and a long-time member of the Odd Fellows Lodge. The family home at Medford was at Route No. 1, Arnold Lane.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Augusta Stephenson, Medford; four daughters, Mrs. A. C. Funeral services will be held from the Perl Funeral Home, Medford, Monday afternoon, 1 p.m. with the Rev. Elmore G. G. G. Christian Church officiating. Final rites and interment will be in Memory Gardens Cemetery in Arnold Lane.

GOP To Hold Annual Picnic

Elmer Lemler, is chairman of the central committee. William Lorenz, Chiloquin, is chairman of the picnic. George Proctor, Klamath Falls is co-chairman.

Members of the committee will be in charge of parking with space reserved for distinguished guest cars.

Coffee, ice cream, melons and soda pop will be furnished free. Those attending are asked to take picnic lunches and food enough for one extra guest.

The program will include numbers by the Ground Observer Corps, the Klamath Falls American Legion Drum Corps and a barbershop octette.

KF Doctor Lauds AA Program

If the general public had a better understanding of the Alcoholics Anonymous program, many uncontrolled drinkers could be rehabilitated who otherwise may never attain sobriety.

This was the assertion of Dr. George H. Adler when he addressed a capacity crowd at the Alcoholics Anonymous Center in Maple Park Friday night. Lee M. of Tulelake acted as chairman.

After his talk Dr. Adler said there were several long-standing members of AA in the audience whom he treated for alcoholism unsuccessfully before they joined AA.

"In my opinion," the doctor said, "the program of AA is the best known means of combating the disease of alcoholism. I would prescribe it for any person who has a sincere desire to quit drinking."

Dr. Adler devoted most of his talk to the physical effects of alcohol on excessive drinkers. He said that in his capacity as coroner of Klamath County he found that alcohol was a factor in almost 90 per cent of traffic fatalities.

"You can almost be certain," he said, "that in any fatal automobile accident that occurs on Saturday night, liquor was a factor."

The doctor produced records of some 40 blood tests taken on fatal accident victims picked at random from his files. All but six of them showed some degree of intoxication in the victim.

Dr. Adler also blamed cocktail parties for starting many persons on the road to compulsive drinking.

"It usually starts very innocently with a couple of casual drinks at a cocktail party," he added. "From these two drinks there is a build up to acute alcoholism. Patients I have treated for delirium tremens said their trouble started at a cocktail party. It seems these days, it is almost impossible to stage successful entertainment without liquor."

"However," the doctor concluded, "I see people here at the AA Center having just as good a time with coffee as any person I have ever seen at a cocktail party."

Chairman Lee M. said the public should be informed that two meetings are held each week at the AA Center, 120 Riverside in Maple Park. On Tuesday at 8 p.m. there is a closed meeting for alcoholics only. This is the meeting persons with an alcoholic problem are urged to first attend. On Friday at 8 p.m. there is an open meeting to which anyone interested in the alcoholic problem is invited.

Anti-Weed Drive Planned in Bly

Wrong-Way Pilot Lands In Ireland

SHANNON, Ireland (AP)—A former U.S. Marine jet pilot flew into Shannon Airport from Newfoundland—via Paris—Saturday after starting off on what he insisted was a one-hour hop in Canada in a single engine plane.

Thomas H. Danaher, 30-year-old uranium miner from Wichita Falls, Texas, wouldn't say much about how he happened to extend his flight, but he did say emphatically: "The trip added ten years to my life." He said he encountered bad weather 1,000 miles off the Irish coast.

Danaher, a six-footer in a ten-gallon Texas hat, a leather jacket and fawn trousers, said he always wanted to see Paris. He Marine reservist flew in the Pacific in World War II and in Korea.

So, fitting out his Beech Bonanza with additional fuel tanks, he notified authorities in Canada he was off on a short hop. Some crossings that prohibit uncertified planes from taking off from Canada.

CORRIGAN REMINDER Danaher's eccentric journey reminded air enthusiasts of Douglas (Wrong Way) Corrigan of Los Angeles, who started the world back in 1931 when he piloted a second hand crate from New York and landed in Ireland on an unauthorized ocean hop.

Corrigan, who had been refused permission to try the ocean hop, ostensibly took off for California. Once in the air he headed out over the Atlantic. He later argued slyly that his compass was wrong.

Danaher had been reported trying in vain to persuade Canadian officials to permit him to take off across the Atlantic. Regulations there forbid small craft from flying beyond gliding distance from the seashore.
