

# Hollywood Stars Back Into Coast League Lead

The Hollywood Stars are in that familiar spot, atop the Pacific Coast League standings, by way of a wild set-to with the Los Angeles Angels and what Sacramento did to second-place San Diego.

The Stars, tied with San Diego after Friday night's game and a half game ahead as they won Saturday while the Padres were idle, dropped two percentage points behind Sunday, for a brief time, as they lost the first game to Los Angeles, 4-0.

But the Stars came back to take the nightcap, which had many elements like a bar-room brawl, 2-1, and then Sacramento whacked San Diego twice Sunday night, 13-8 and 3-0. This put Hollywood out front by 1 1/2 games.

They have been in front since May 20, except for the weekend goings-on.

In the other Sunday games Oakland won the first from San Francisco 6-1, but the Seals took the nightcap 14-2. Seattle and Portland also split, Seattle winning the first 7-6 and the Beavers the second, 5-3.

At Wrigley Field Bubba Church pitched a two-hitter for the Angels' victory. His mates got 11 hits off three Hollywood hurlers. This was all baseball. In the nightcap, won by Mel Queen with Bob Spicer the loser, each side got only four hits but there was comparatively little else resembling baseball.

The repeated ruckuses started in the fourth inning when Hollywood's Tom Saffel was ejected for debating a called pitch. Saffel, however, went to his center-field post in the last half and had to be tossed out all over again.

A moment later Umpire Jerry Van Keuren asked to inspect the ball. Hollywood pitcher George O'Donnell threw it to the plate but catcher Jim Mangano let it slip past. Van Keuren thumbed Mangano out with a push to help him along. The Stars stormed the field, and fans yelled cushions from the stands.

In the Hollywood half of the seventh, with the score 1-1, two on base and one out, Eddie Malone raised a pop foul near the box seat railing. Los Angeles catcher Al Evans appeared to be about to grab it when a fan deflected the ball.

Van Keuren ruled Malone out, and pandemonium broke out. Hollywood Manager Bobby Bragan, suspended briefly last week for rowing with an umpire, protested the game, arguing until he, too, was thrown out. Before departing Bragan doffed his cap and bowed from the waist to Van Keuren.

The boos and cheers were thunderous. Cushions and even one chair sailed from the stands. Meantime, police reinforcements appeared. Finally, pinch-hitter Jack Lohrer singled in the winning run. There was a final cushion game ended, but no further disturbance.

Sacramento clubbed San Diego in their first game as the teams together batted out 28 hits and five home runs. In the nightcap Rex Jones gave the Padres only two hits in his debut.

Jim Marshall's two home runs, scoring five runs, propelled Oakland to its win, while in the nightcap San Francisco smashed five Oak pitchers for 17 hits. For Seattle Herm Reich whacked three doubles and drove in the winning runs in the eighth of the opener.

# Westhouse's Double Gives Eldorado Win

The Eldorado Lumberjacks bounced back from a certain defeat by Tulelake into the winner's chair as they produced a ninth inning rally for a 14-13 win in their season's final game at Recreation Park yesterday afternoon.

With one away and Miller on first, Art Raymond banged out a double sending Miller to third, setting the stage for the Lumberjacks' deciding blow.

Art Westhouse, the scrappy little catcher from Oregon Tech, promptly tagged the Tulelake pitcher for another double and the winning run for the Eldorado club.

Both teams had big innings, with Tulelake coming from behind in the first of the sixth with a five run uprising against the Lumberjacks.

Lewiston didn't have to look very far back Monday to see four close pursuers in the race for the Western International League's second half pennant.

# Staters Maul City Shriners

PORTLAND (AP) — The State All-Stars, routed a Portland Metropolitan squad 50-6 in the seventh annual Shrine benefit football game here Saturday night.

Mei Gilting, Primeville back who was one of State's leading ground gainers, was chosen outstanding player of the game.

He paced State's opening 63-yard scoring attack with two 14 yard runs and did most of the work in a 66-yard touchdown drive as the second half opened.

Bob Woods of Grants Pass scored the first touchdown and Salem's Herb Triplett plunged over from the one yard line for the first third quarter tally.

The Staters, coached by Mei Ingram, picked up two points on a safety in the second quarter when City's Hal Duffy, punting from his own end zone, struck a teammate with the ball which bounced across the end zone. Later in the period Jim Shanley of North Bend scored on a 41-yard pass play from Triplett to give State a 16-0 halftime lead.

After Triplett's third quarter touchdown Paul Tucharadt of Oakridge recovered a fumble by City's Jimmy Williams of Benson on City's five yard line and carried the ball across.

The Staters added three more touchdowns in the final quarter. Jim Dougherty of Klamath Falls intercepted a pass from Del King of Estacada and ran 46 yards to score; Mike Campbell, Salem, tallied on a five yard plunge; and Jim Coleman, Corvallis, scored on a 46-yard pass from Jack Henkel of Eugene. Steve Bigelow of Marshfield kicked the extra point each time.

The City squad, coached by Harry Scott of Central Catholic, threatened only twice. Early in the first quarter Williams took a 15-yard pass from Jefferson's Bob Gill, moving the ball to State's 46 yard line, and then ran 41 yards to State's five. Then in the second quarter Vince Allenhofen of Central Catholic completed a 41-yard pass play to Williams deep into State territory. Both times State stiffened its defense to halt the surges.

Williams was named outstanding back for the City team. Vern Scott of Grant was chosen best City lineman.

Besides Gilting for the Staters it was Bob Woods of Grants Pass as outstanding back and Jim Bird of North Bend as best lineman.

A crowd of 18,305 saw the game, which gave the Staters a 5-2 edge in the series.

# Thompson Gets Back To Action

MILWAUKEE, (AP) — Bobby Thompson, knocked out of action for nearly five months with a fractured ankle, gets his first starting assignment with Milwaukee against Cincinnati tonight.

Encouraged by his performance in Chicago yesterday after appearing as a pinch runner for the injured Eddie Mathews and hitting a home run in his first turn at bat, Thompson said today he expects to play regularly from now on.

The 30-year-old Scot moved to the outfield for the first time this year after his pinch running chore, and his two-run homer in the seventh snapped a 6-6 tie. The Braves went on to defeat the Cubs 12-6.

"The home run gave me a terrific thrill," he said, "almost as great as the one I hit that won the 1951 pennant for the New York Giants. Not so much because it helped win the game, but because it made me feel for the first time like I belonged."

"It's difficult to describe the lift it gave me. You have no idea how I felt sitting around helpless all year, watching the other fellows batting every day and wishing I could help but knowing all the time I couldn't do anything. It's such a useless, frustrated feeling. Nobody realizes better than I do that the Braves gave up two fine pitchers for me only to have me break a leg and become useless to the club all season."

Until yesterday, Thompson appeared in 14 games, all in the role of pinch hitter. Five times he came through with a hit and twice he walked.

His left ankle still is heavily taped, but most of the stiffness is gone.
