Pearson Hearing To Be Held

A preliminary hearing for Leon Pearson, 30-year-old Klamath Reservation Indian, charged with the first degree murder of Gene Erick, 29-year-old moulting plant employee, will be held Wednesday at 10 a.m. before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor.

The accused slayer was arraigned Monday morning. Attorney George C. Reinmiller of Portland, counsel for Pearson, asked the court to expedite the hearing as much as possible.

The shooting occurred after Erick and two other men went to the ranch seeking Jackson's permission to fish on his property. According to Police Chief Lewis Jones of Chiloquin, who arrested Pearson, the accused killer is alleged to have taken a 30-30 rifle from an automobile parked in front of the ranch house and shot Erick in the stomach.

The defendant appeared in court Monday on a broken ankle. He said he suffered a broken ankle a few days before the shooting. Pearson is held without bail in the county jail.

Union Turns Down Mill Wage Offer

The Pacific Northwest lumber strike entered its 64th day Monday with Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. negotiations attracting major interest.

The firm, which employs about 8,000, offered a 2 1/2-cent hourly increase last week to striking AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers and CIO Woodworkers.

A number of AFL workers indicated they would accept the offer which would bring their minimum wage to \$1.90 an hour.

The CIO, however, turned down the offer which later was withdrawn by Weyerhaeuser negotiators. The company Sunday cancelled a negotiation session tentatively scheduled for Tuesday and announced that it now has no settlement offer before the CIO union.

Weyerhaeuser was paying five cents more than other major Douglas fir operators in the Pacific Northwest when the two unions began their strike June 21 to back up demands for a 12 1/2-cent hourly pay increase.

Some 600 AFL workers at Weyerhaeuser's Snoqualmie Falls, Wash., operation and 200 more at the firm's plywood plant at Longview, Wash., will vote on the 2 1/2-cent offer Wednesday.

At Coos Bay, Ore., where 600 are employed at a Weyerhaeuser plant, AFL woods and mill workers were to return to work Monday after approving the increase.
