Hay Protein Content Raised

TULELAKE — Scientists have produced hay containing 16 times as much crude protein per acre as ordinary hay by employing extremely high nitrogen fertilization on mountain meadows, says Ken Baggett, Tulelake farm adviser.

Baggett says the new "super hay" was produced in Colorado after researchers applied 400 pounds of nitrogen per acre. They obtained hay with as much as 2,400 pounds of crude protein per acre. Hay raised in the same area averages about 150 pounds.

Feedlot tests of the hay are set for this fall.

In Missouri, meanwhile, animal husbandmen have found that a ton of early cut timothy hay is worth two tons of mature timothy hay as a wintering ration for calves. They found that calves fed the early cut timothy made a daily gain of almost twice that of those fed the late cut timothy.

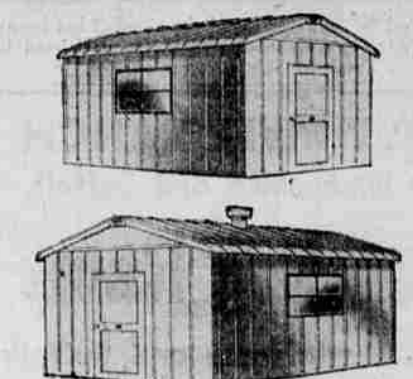
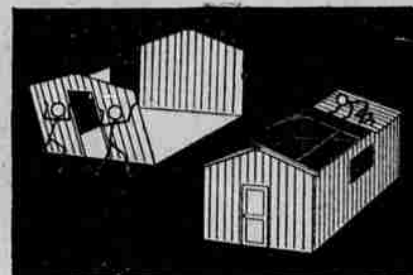

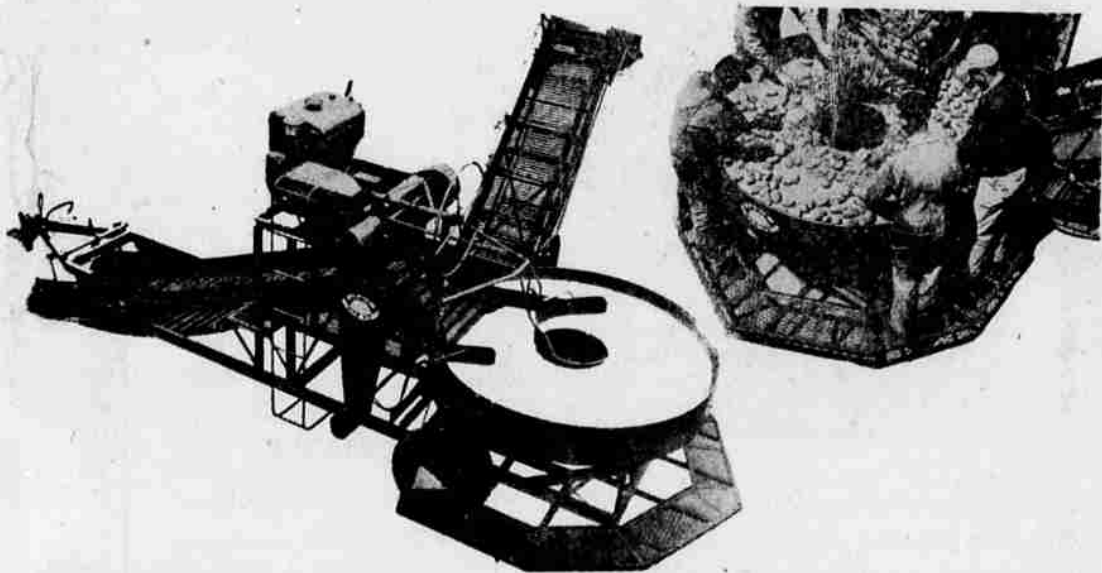
