Padres, Stars Win

San Diego and Hollywood are still a game apart in the torrid Pacific Coast League pennant race.

Hollywood kept its lead Tuesday night by snapping sharply out of a bad hitting slump and shading the red-hot Padres of San Diego, 6-5, while San Diego got a slanting performance from Bill Wright in turning back Oakland, 4-0.

Wright scattered the hits he allowed in registering his fourth shutout and his 14th win against three losses. The Padres took advantage of the wildness of Oakland southpaw Don Ferrarese, who gave up 10 bases on balls in the 3-2-3 innings he worked. The walks figured prominently in the scoring, too. It was Ferrarese's 14th setback against 16 wins. The Oaks used four pitchers trying to turn the tide and they yielded only seven hits, all told.

George Schmees, former Hollywood player, was pretty much the whole show for Seattle as he drove in five runs for his team with a bases-loaded double and a homer with one on. Tommy Byrne, Seattle southpaw who was trying to become the Pacific Coast League's first 20-game winner, went the distance but received for his ninth defeat. Lino Donoso won his 17th for Hollywood but was batted out in the seventh.

Mike Baxes' single in the sixth drove in the winning run as San Francisco squeaked by Portland, 1-0. Sal Taormina had doubts when Baxes whistled a line drive over the infield. Frank Miller allowed Portland only five hits and was backed by two double plays. The Seals tried a double steal in the eighth. As Taormina broke for second, Ted Beard, who was on third, started for home. Portland catcher Ron Lundberg rifled a strike to second baseman Ron Jackson, and his relay back nipped Beard.

Hiller's victory was his 11th against six defeats. Bob Alexander held the Seals to six hits.

Marino Pieretti, Sacramento pitcher who had lost six in a row, finally snapped out of his slump as he hurled the Seals to a 4-1 decision over Los Angeles, but Milo Candini had to relieve him in the ninth, when the Angels made some threatening gestures. Pieretti's victory was his 15th of the year. Lefty Joe Hatten retired in the sixth when Sacramento put over a three-run rally. It was Hatten's 16th loss against 11 wins.

LaRayne Harris and Ralph Clough won last night's Sweetstakes Tournament at Lucky Lanes for all Tuesday evening league bowlers.

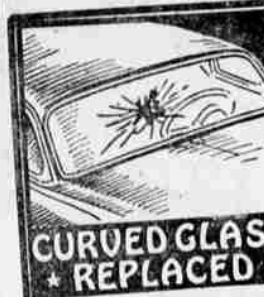

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Hamner Defends Mates

L A Rams To Face Cardinals

PORTLAND — The Chicago Cardinals will unveil what shapes up as potentially the best backfield in the National Football League when they play the Los Angeles Rams here at Multnomah Stadium Saturday night, September 4.

This is true even without the presence of the great Ollie Matson, who is still in the service. It is possible, however, that Matson may be discharged in time to take over his fullback spot against the Rams. He recently scored two 100-yard touchdowns against them for Fort Ord.

Lamar McHan, the Cardinals' first draft choice, has joined the team after playing in the college all-star game. He should answer Chicago's need for a competent quarterback. The "Arkansas Traveler" was second in the nation last year in total offense. He has the pose of a veteran and, together with Billy Wade of the Rams, is rated one of the brightest rookies in the league.

Jim Root, playing his second season, has developed rapidly and will probably get the starting job in leading the Cards to a 27 to 10 victory over the Green Bay Packers in their first game of the season.

Despite the presence of six rookie halfbacks who can run 100 yards in 10 seconds, "Old Pro" Charley Trippi will be back at his familiar left halfback position. In two previous appearances in Portland he has been one of the outstanding players in the field. Trippi can damage the opposition with his punting, punt returns, running, passing and pass catching, a good parlay in any league.

Johnny Olson, one of the best rookies in the league last year, will operate at right halfback for the Cardinals. Last year he carried the ball 108 times for 385 yards and four touchdowns and was a key blocker as well.

Coach Joe Stydahar, commenting on his team's win over the Packers, said the Cardinals showed their best protection for the passer in years and indicated the Cards will rely heavily on their aerial game against the Rams.

Although both teams bring outstanding records into the Portland fray, it figures to be a spectacular ball game without them. This is the grudge battle between Stydahar and Hampton Pool — formerly coach and assistant, now bitter enemies — and it's only as thrilling as their initial meeting here last year the fans will love it.

That is also the "rubber" game — Portland between the clubs, with the Rams 24 to 14 winners in 1952 and the Cardinals 23 to 10 victors last year.

Long Ball Hitter Tops Ex-Champion

DETROIT — Top-flight golfers, just like the fans, like to talk about the long hitters and there's one player here for the 54th U.S.A. amateur Golf Championship who already has been the subject of innumerable locker room debates. He's Dave Smith, a hulking North Carolina automobile dealer who remained in the tournament for today's third round by grace of luck, long drives and a miserable round by two-time former champion Willie Turnesa.

Smith ousted Turnesa, the last of five former champions in the tournament, by a 4 and 3 margin to go into today's double round of 18-hole matches along with such more celebrated golfers as Harvey Ward, Frank Stranahan, Billy Joe Patton, Don Cherry, Jim Jackson, Bill Campbell, Dale Morey and Bob Sweeney.

This list included the runner-up in last year's tournament, Morey, and three players who have captured the British Amateur Championship but never the United States title — Ward, Stranahan and Sweeney.

But when long, wild hitting was up for discussion, there was only one who could give Smith an argument, Savannah's Hobart Manley. Most players who have gone up against both say that big Dave from Gastonia, N.C., has it all over Hobart in that department. Smith is 6 feet 4½ and weighs 235 pounds.
