

Fire Danger Warning Given

Though many Oregonians agree that this has been one of the wettest summers in recent years, the danger of fire in our out of doors still is acute.

Fishermen and other persons utilizing the recreational aspects of the out of doors have a tremendous responsibility in preventing fires. An incident that happened Sunday, August 22 is a good example.

A fire, presumably caused by a fisherman at the mouth of the Deschutes is being carried on to the Deschutes to be posted against en-

try. The fire, which occurred about three-quarters of a mile above the mouth of the river burned over 250 acres from the river bank to the rim above, and only a fortunate wind shift aided firefighters in preventing the burning of some grain fields above.

The Miller property has been the principal access point for steelhead fishermen at the mouth of the Deschutes, and further investigation is being carried on to try and ascertain the exact cause of the fire.

The high fire danger that exists on the Deschutes is common along many of the streams in the eastern part of the state at this time of the year. Though not as spectacular perhaps as forest fires, range fires are a serious threat to the livelihood of landowners, the above being an example.

Sportsmen can help insure future access to privately owned lands by helping prevent range fires and generally conducting themselves in a manner befitting a true sportsman. The Oregon State Game Commission urges all persons using the out of doors to respect the property and rights of others and guard against the repetition of incidents such as the one on the Deschutes last Sunday.

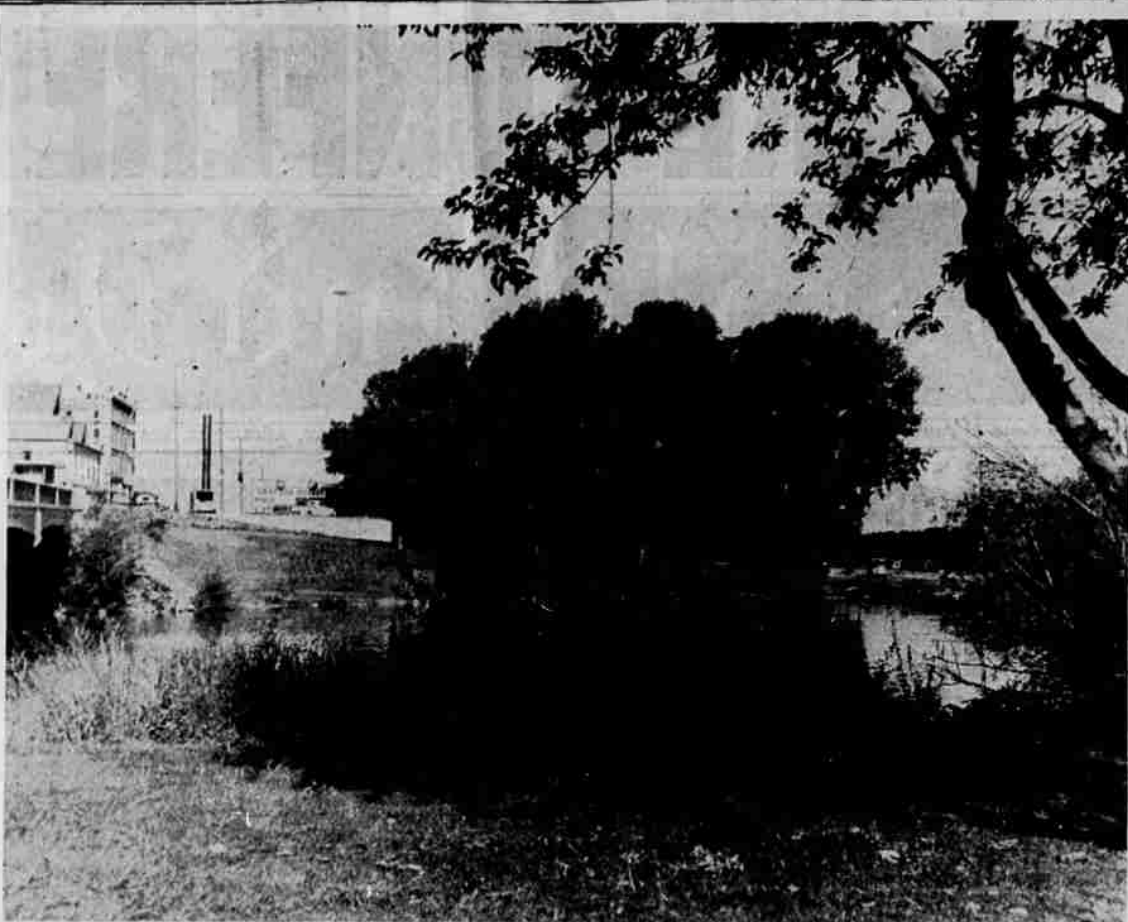
