Nesting Islands To Be Built

The Summer Lake ducks and geese will soon have additional space for their home building activities.

Realizing the limited nesting area now available, the Oregon State Game Commission at their August 20 meeting, authorized immediate construction of a series of nesting islands within the flat marshlands of the management area.

The islands will vary in size from small mounds to one-half acre. All will be flat topped, rising about a foot above the water level of the marsh. When construction is complete, they will be planted with 3-square bullrush to provide food and nesting cover.

U.S. Flood Aid To Be Marked

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP)—Hungary has agreed that the aid the United States is sending to the 40,000 to 50,000 flood victims in this Communist country will bear Red Cross markings and the label: "Gift of the American People."

An agreement was signed last night with the International Red Cross for distribution of the food medicine and other supplies offered by President Eisenhower on July 20.

The Hungarian Red Cross, handling the distribution, promised to give out the aid without regard to race, religion, nationality or political views. An International Red Cross team will be on hand to observe.

Prisoners Pack Chicago Jails

CHICAGO (AP)—Chicago's City Jail and Correctional Farm are jammed with prisoners, Warden Frank Sain said today.

The farm near suburban Hinsdale is so overcrowded, Sain said, that prisoners have been sleeping on floors "and wherever they could." The farm, with a capacity of 500 prisoners, now houses 674. Sain said the overcrowding at the farm is the result of an overflow of inmates at the Bridewell, the city's house of correction. It has a capacity of 1,800 prisoners and houses 2,426.
