

Britain Rejects Polish Demand

LONDON (AP)—Britain today rejected Poland's demand for the return of a Polish sailor who stowed away on a freighter to escape his Communist homeland and was granted asylum here.

Eighty British police rescued the seaman, 21-year-old Antoni Klimowicz, from the Polish freighter Jaroslaw Dabrowski July 31. He hid on the ship when it left Poland. Crewmen caught him before he could escape in London and were hauling him back to his homeland.

The British note turned down Poland's demands for compensation for alleged damage resulting from detention of the ship and the police action. The British also denied Polish charges of police brutality.

Airline Resumes U. S. Flights

NEW YORK (AP)—The first American Airlines plane to fly in 25 days took off from La Guardia Field at 7:09 a.m. (EDT) Wednesday for Rochester and Buffalo, N. Y. Other flights followed.

American's planes were grounded by a strike of the line's 1,243 pilots. The strike was called in protest of new non-stop coast-to-coast flight schedules which sometimes took more than the regular eight-hour work period.

The airline and the AFL Pilots' Assn. finally agreed to submit the dispute to arbitration. The line expects to be able to resume full flight operations by next week.

Play Festival Ends Tuesday

ASHLAND — The 14th annual Oregon Shakespeare festival will end here Tuesday, August 31, closing the most successful month-long season in the event's history.

As the final week of plays begins, season's attendance figures indicate an increase over last year's record of almost 25 per cent. Whether or not the total will reach the 20,000 predicted for the current year depends, festival officials believe, on the weather.

The final two rounds of plays began Tuesday with "The Winter's Tale," followed by "The Merry Wives of Windsor," "Henry VI, part 2," and "Hamlet." The cycle begins for the last time Saturday and runs for four nights in the same order, closing with "Hamlet."

The famous tragedy has drawn larger houses than any other tragedy ever done here, despite a battle with the weather on two occasions. It still runs second to "The Merry Wives of Windsor" for individual drawing power, however. "Merry Wives" set a new mark for the festival with 946 in attendance on August 7, then broke its own record on August 20, when it attracted 1,032.

The two "unknown" plays of the season—"The Winter's Tale" and "Henry VI," have drawn less than the other two, but would themselves have been record-breakers two years ago. Both received excellent reviews and both drew far better than expected.

Experts Hunt For Unexploded Shells

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. (AP)—It is expected to take two or three days to gather up unexploded 100-mm live shells scattered here in an explosion of an ammunition-loaded freight car.

Ordnance disposal experts from Ft. Sheridan, Ill., and Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo., are picking up the shells.

Capt. L. J. Blazer, conducting the cleanup job, estimated that from one-fourth to one-third of the 1,820 rounds of ammunition in the car did not explode in Tuesday night's blast.

Souvenir hunters were warned not to pick up the shells.
