Championship points will be awarded to the winners. Last year's show was held at the Modoc football field with 340 dogs entered, some coming from Mexico and one from Central America. Ranch House Leveled By Fire A seven-room two-story ranch house on the Harold Mallory, Keno Springs Ranch, 15 miles northeast of Bonanza, burned to the ground sometime Wednesday afternoon or evening. Furniture and clothing as well as a woodshed and five cords of wood were also lost. Occupants of the house, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Vaden and family had motored to Klamath Falls, leaving the place about 10:30 in the morning. Upon their return late Wednesday they were greeted by a bed of smoldering embers. The house is a considerable distance from the cutoff road between Bonanza and the Lakeview highway and apparently burned down without anyone seeing the blaze. Cause of the fire could not be determined. There is no electricity on the ranch and fires in stoves were out when they departed, Mrs. Vaden stated. Loss of furniture and personal effects was partially covered by insurance.
