Writer To Co-Produce Film Version Of First Novel

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—How to make a fortune out of misfortune in one remarkable lesson.
 Our subject is Joseph Hayes, a bright, lean, 37-year-old writer from Indianapolis. He is well on his way to fame and fortune, and all because his son got sick.
 Hayes had been earning a good living for 10 years. He would write anything—magazine articles, short stories, TV scripts. With his red-haired wife, Marjorie, he wrote 20 plays for high schools and amateur theaters. One of them was based on "Mister Peepers." He even had one play on Broadway, "Leaf and Bough," with Charlton Heston. It flopped in a week.
 Last winter, the Hayes' red-haired son, 9-year-old Gregory, fell ill. He was in the hospital three times with pneumonia. The doctor despaired of his chances if he stayed in the cold climate.
 So the Hayes family picked up their belongings and left for Florida. Hayes decided to use the time to write a book he had been thinking about. He turned it out in six weeks of intensive writing.
 He wasn't happy about the result. As they were packing, his wife noted his slumbers and said, "I won't be able to stand driving all the way to New York with you in that mood. You'd better let me read it."
 She read the story, which concerns three escaped convicts who terrorize a family, and said, "I think it's wonderful. If you don't mail it, I will." The author selected a title, "The Desperate Hours."
 So off it went to Hayes' agent. By the time the family arrived back in New York, it had already been sold to Random House for publication. That weekend, Collier's bought it as a serial. The Reader's Digest Book Club and Literary Guild took it as a selection for their readers.
 And that isn't all. Hayes went to work on a play version of the story. It will go into rehearsals Dec. 15 with Hayes as coproducer.
 Hollywood soon started clamoring for "The Desperate Hours." Virtually every studio in town and a flock of independents bid for it. Some were taken aback by the author's terms.
 "I know a lot of them said, 'Who the heck does he think he is?'" Hayes remarked. "My terms were stiff. I wanted a percentage of the gross—right off the top. Most of the studios wouldn't go for it."
 But producer-director William Wyler did. He met the provisions, including the services of Hayes as script writer. The author is here now to write his baby for the screen.

Japan, Russian Fish Pact Eyed

TOKYO (AP)—Russia is willing to conclude fishery agreements with Japan if the Japanese government offers direct negotiation, the newspaper Asahi reported.
 The paper quoted a cablegram to the Japan-Soviet Friendship Assn. from Yoshitaro Hirano, a member of the association now in Shanghai. Hirano is en route home from Moscow, where he and three other Japanese negotiated with Soviet authorities in fishery matters in northern Japanese waters. Since the end of World War II a number of Japanese fishing boats and their crew members have been seized by the Russians.

54 Missing After Launch Capsizes

MANILA (AP)—The Philippine News Service reported today that 54 persons are missing after a motor launch capsized and sank yesterday in Illana Bay off Zamboanga del Sur province.
 Sixty persons were reported aboard and six survivors were said to have been picked up today.

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Churchmen Declare Against Segregation

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP)—The momentous second General Assembly of the World Council of Churches neared its end today after ringing declarations calling for "the living together" of the East and West and placing the church adamantly against racial segregation and use of nuclear weapons.
 This assembly of church leaders representing 163 denominations from 48 countries ends tomorrow after almost continuous sessions since Aug. 15. The principal major task remaining was that of the "oneness in Christ," or church unity.
 Over the weekend, the assembly accepted reports which:
 - Appealed to Communist and non-Communist nations to recognize they must "live together" in order to head off their march toward a cataclysmic war. "However deep the conflict may be," the council said, "it is not necessarily an insuperable bar to living together. Mankind is sick of it, and wants to be at peace."
 - Urged upon nations of the world the abandonment of "force as an instrument of policy beyond existing frontiers."
 - Tended communism a snare of "false promises" but warned the West against "anti-Communist hysteria."
 - Called on all nations to "pledge that they will refrain from the threat or use of nuclear weapons against the territorial integrity or independence of any state."
 - Urged new efforts for international control, inspection and prohibition of atomic, hydrogen and other mass-destruction weapons to end "an arms race of unprecedented dimensions."
 - Tended racial segregation "an unutterable offense against God to be endured no longer. It is the duty of the church," the report said, "to protest against any law or arrangement that is unjust to any human being or which would make Christian fellowship impossible."
 - Concerning East-West relations, the report to the assembly said that it purposely avoided the term "coexistence" because it first was used by Communist leaders.
 - "We stand against submission, enslavement by or appeasement of totalitarian tyranny and aggression," the report stated. "We also stand against the exploitation of any people . . . and for the basic civil liberties. . . . Christians must continue to condemn totalitarianism as false in doctrine and dangerous in practice. They will be no less firm in continuing to oppose atheistic materialism."
 One section of the international affairs report was critical of some phases of American foreign policy. That section said: "When American foreign policy is determined primarily by the criterion of anti-Communism, it generally strengthens conservative and reactionary political groups in the East Asian scene and tends to weaken the forces of healthy social reform."
