as legal, according to City Attorney Henry Perkins, who explained the situation this way: "The city charter, now 40 years old, at first required that candidates file 30 days before the election. Later state legislature required that cities with more than 2,000 population hold their elections the same time as county and state elections."

"State law also requires that city officials certify names of candidates with the county clerk not less than 65 days or more than 70 days before the general election (November 2)."

"Candidates to city offices may file by petition or by paying a fee. If they file by petition, the city must have time to check the signatures; therefore each year the city sets a date by which time it expects all candidates to file (August 20). If candidates file by fee, however, and the city can certify the names within the 65-70 day period, the city must file that name with the county clerk."

"In counting days, state law excludes the first day of filing, Saturdays, Sundays and holidays and includes the day of election. It seems probable, therefore, that this candidate will be accepted."

The last candidate to file raises to three the number of contestants from Ward 4, represented now by Frank Tarr. Voting for the post, the only ward in which there is competition, are Robert F. Mead, automobile dealer; Lawrence Slater, insurance agent; and Holland.

Holland has been in business in Klamath Falls since 1936, operating Holland Sheet Metal. He has been a resident of Klamath Falls a total of 19 years.

The council aspirant is a native of Washington where he attended grade, high and vocational schools. During the war he worked for the Navy in Bremerton.

The Hollands have three children, all students of Sacred Heart Academy. Holland is a member of the Elks, Knights of Columbus and the Exchange Club, through which he has served as a Boy Scout leader.

His election platform is "improvement of city parks and playgrounds; clean city government."

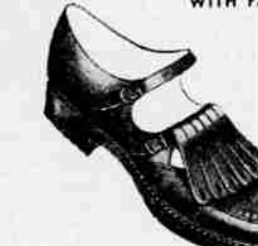
