CHICAGO LIVESTOCK

CHICAGO (AP) — Hog prices dropped to the lowest level in more than a year Tuesday on receipt of 10,000 salable head. Butchers were down 50 cents to \$1.25 and sows 50 cents to \$1.00.

Choices 190 to 250 pound butchers sold at \$19.99 to \$20.50, the latter price being the top. This was the lowest top since Feb. 10, 1953. Sows sold within a \$1.50 to \$19.25 range.

A few loads of prime steers moved at \$23.75 to \$27.00 with the bulk of choice to low prime kind \$23.50 to \$25.50. Cows averaged about steady, topping at \$11.00.

Good to prime native spring lambs moved mainly at \$18.00 to \$19.50.

Salable receipts were estimated at 410,000 hogs, 6,500 cattle, 209 calves and 2,503 sheep.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains sank on the board of trade Tuesday under moderate selling pressure. Losses weren't large except for rye, which was reduced to profit taking following its recent sharp advance.

Main reason for the market's general weakness was lack of support from commercial and export interests. In addition, wheat met a little hedging while corn and soybeans sank on a private report emphasizing improved prospects for these crops.

Wheat closed 1 to 2 cents lower, Sept 2 1/2-3 1/2, corn 1 1/2 to 2 cents lower, Sept 1 1/2-1 5/8, oats 1 to 1 1/2, lower, Sept 74 1/2-78; rye 2 1/2-3 1/2, lower, Sept 1.29 1/4-1.4; soybeans 1/2-3/4 lower, Sept. 3.02 1/4-3.04, and laid 10 to 40 cents a hundred pounds lower, Sept. 15.50.

AGES OF GOLF CHAMPIONS

DETROIT (AP) — Golf champions, like movie queens, are more than a little shy about confirming their true ages.

When Gene Littler won the 1953 United States Golf Association crown in Oklahoma City he was 23 years old. The champion displaced was Jack Westland who had won the title the year before in Seattle at the age of 47.

And Westland had won the USGA crown from Billy Maxwell, who was 22.

Westland, at 47, was the oldest title holder. But he ran into youth-age problems on the golf links. He was only 26 when he was the beaten finalist in 1931. That was when Francis Ouimet won the title at the age of 38, the oldest champion until Westland later came a 10-year win the title at the age of 47.
