

49 DEAD IN EASTERN HURRICANE

Western Pine Employers To Vote On Peace Proposal

Meetings in Spokane and Portland Wednesday may decide the outcome of the Pacific Northwest's 71-day-old lumber strike.
Pine industry employers in the Spokane area will meet to vote on whether to join fir belt employers in accepting the peace proposal advanced last week by the governors of Washington and Oregon.
The AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union said pine operators would have to okay the proposal before the regional strike can be called off.
At Portland, top CIO union officials also were to consider acceptance of the peace proposal.
The governors' plan calls for the unions to return to work while a fact-finding board seeks a solution to the dispute that began June 21, when the two unions went on strike in demand of a 12 1/2-cent hourly wage increase.
Meantime, at Hoquiam, Wash., the Rayonier, Inc., pulp and paper mill is moving toward steps to shut down operations after Tuesday evening shift workers stayed away from their jobs.
Some 500 pickets massed at the entrance of the plant Tuesday following a breakdown of contract talks between Rayonier and CIO Woodworkers representatives.
The dispute involves the timber-cutting operations for the pulp plant.
PULP WORKERS
Workers of the non-striking AFL Pulp, Sulphite and Papermakers union refused to pass the pickets. Later the company announced it would suspend operations—a process normally taking 12 to 24 hours.
A similar mass demonstration last week led to closure of the plant and resulted in issuance by Grays Harbor County Superior Court Judge Mitchell J. Kalin of a temporary injunction against mass picketing.
All available Grays Harbor County Sheriff's officers and Hoquiam police were called out when the pickets appeared, but no immediate arrests were reported.
Two transport trucks loaded and ready to leave at the time the pickets appeared were turned back into the plant, but were permitted to leave after they had been unloaded.
STUMBLING BLOCK
Judge Kalin, who presided at Tuesday's meeting, asserted afterwards company officials had placed a "stumbling block" in the way of further talks.
He did not go into details as to what occurred at the talks, but said:
"I cannot help but conclude that Rayonier, Incorporated, through its representatives, has not kept faith with me or anyone else involved in the meeting."
In a statement Tuesday night, company officials said they felt Rayonier's position was changed by announcement of the IWA that it was considering the fact-finding committee proposal of the governors.
In view of the proposal, the company felt it could not continue negotiations on the local level unless the union and its northwest regional committee would agree to negotiate at the company level, the statement said.
DELEGATION
James E. Fading, Western Washington IWA district president, chairman of the union delegation, said the IWA went into Tuesday's conference prepared to start negotiations.
He added the union took the position that the mass demonstration of last week had been ended by court order and that the company negotiation plan, even though contrary to union policy, would be accepted as an emergency measure.
Fading said the company last week asked that the mass picket line be removed from its plant and said the firm would negotiate on a company-wide basis.
He declared Rayonier Tuesday tried to return to an industry-wide negotiating basis, which both the judge and the union refused to acknowledge as proper.
Elsewhere, a few more lumber mills reopened Tuesday.
A number of AFL-affiliated mills went back into operation Monday after local unions voted to accept the governors' peace plan, and then went back to work, apparently in anticipation that the pine employers would accept the pact, and AFL headquarters would terminate the strike officially.
AFL workers at one mill voted Tuesday, however, to impose a 90-day limit on the return to work. The 247 men at the Pope and Talbot mill at Oakridge, Ore., decided that work after that would depend on whether the governors' fact-finding board reaches a satisfactory solution.

Educators Hear Oregon Trail Talk

One of the most comprehensive educational and entertaining picture stories of the southern route of the old Oregon Trail was presented by Buena Vista and Harold Ashley to Klamath and Lake county teachers during the teachers institute in session this week.
Entitled "Pioneer Highways and Byways of Klamath County," the educators presented the story of the southern route illustrated with numerous slides. Narrator was Mrs. Stone, authority on early Klamath history and member of the faculty of Fremont School. Ashley is clerk of school districts 1 and 2.
The project, initiated several years ago, represents more than a year of concentrated effort by Mr. and Mrs. Ashley, Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Stone, Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Gralapp.
Through story, poems and pictures, Mrs. Stone took teachers on an imaginary trip with the discoverers of the southern route and subsequent short-cuts. She showed briefly the founding of Linkville, now Klamath Falls, and remarked that then, even as now, it was a distribution center.
Early pictures of transportation when the Klamath country was settled showed the wagon trains, stages, excursion boats; present day slides showed the country today and the disintegrating remains of yesterday.
Mrs. Stone and Ashley's contribution to the Wednesday session of the institute followed an address by Rex Putnam, superintendent of public education in Oregon.
Putnam contradicted criticism made by some that schools today are not showing proper respect to the nation, symbolized by the flag and national anthem. He also defended the statement "Oregon is peculiar," by quoting statistics which rank this state third in the nation in education.
A. L. Gralapp presided at the evening meeting of the Lake-Klamath Institute. Members of Boy Scout Troop No. 8 presented colors and led the flag salute. Organ music was by Violette Moore; Fred Dallas, accompanied by Mrs. Dallas played two violin solos.
The Rev. Dale Hewitt, First Presbyterian Church, gave the invocation; Garry Robertson the welcome from the planning committee for the institute.
Sectional meetings followed the opening session. The afternoon general session today featured Dr. O. Meredith Wilson, president of University of Oregon, as speaker.

Nixon Predicts Republican Victory In Fall Election

CINCINNATI (AP) — Vice President Nixon said Wednesday Democrats have lost their only big political issue because an economic recession has failed to appear and the Republicans stand to retain control of Congress.
Nixon, here to speak at a workshop session of the Republican National Committee, told a news conference he does not see any compelling issue by which the Democrats can take over the Senate and House in the Nov. 2 election.
"I don't see any issue that the Democrats have which can be used effectively," Nixon said.
"The one they relied upon—an economic recession—has been pulled out from under them."
In response to questions, Nixon said that he recognizes there are some states in which the economic situation is spotty. He said that where such depressed areas find Republicans now in office there is a chance the GOP will lose seats in the House.
In the overall, Nixon said, he expects the Republicans to match their record-breaking turnout for the 1952 presidential election, but believes the Democratic and independent vote will fall in this non-presidential year battle for control of Congress.
