

North Atlantic Meeting To Discuss Germany Predicted

WASHINGTON (U)—United States officials tend to favor an emergency meeting of the North Atlantic Allies' foreign ministers at New York late this month to seek agreement on West Germany's role in the defense of Western Europe.

The most workable solution now available, in the opinion of top officials here, is for the 14 members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization to make Germany a member with some safeguards to prevent a revival of German militarism along with German rearmament.

Capitals of the Western nations have thrown out a series of suggestions for dealing with the German problem since the French Assembly buried the European Defense Community project under a heavy vote Monday. Out of this widespread diplomatic upheaval several points are coming clear:

HOPE—The U.S. and British governments both hope for German membership in NATO, which requires unanimous approval of the 14 members. Press reports said the Churchill Cabinet so decided at London yesterday, and Secretary of State Dulles had indicated a U.S. position to that effect in calling Tuesday for an emergency NATO session to deal with the problem.

2. French Premier Mendes-France would like some kind of solution which would amount to an EDC substitute or "Little NATO" arrangement, or possibly second-class status for West Germany in the full NATO organization. American and British officials feel, however, that in letting EDC die, Mendes-France lost his last opportunity to impose any such long-time restraint upon Germany's future position and behavior.

3. French rejection of EDC pro-

duced a demand from the West German government for complete independence from the Allied occupation and a new Western defense arrangement "without discrimination against German troops." In its communique yesterday bidding for equal status with the Allies, Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's Cabinet pointedly excluded France from the nations it said should negotiate the new military alliance.

4. Washington has acted with deliberate slowness in some respects to encourage the European nations, particularly France, to come up with new ideas for dealing with the aftermath of EDC's defeat. They are hoping that some line of action will develop clearly in Europe within the next two weeks.

MEETING—The British government reportedly wants a meeting with leaders of the United States and the six EDC countries before the proposed NATO session. American officials indicated they would study the British suggestion, but they wondered whether such a meeting could be fitted in. The EDC countries are France, Italy, West Germany, the Netherlands, Belgium and Luxembourg.

6. There is no thought in Washington, and apparently none in London, of making any effort to revive EDC. Nor is there any real interest here in trying to put over some watered-down version such as Mendes-France might suggest. The urgent problem of the moment is regarded here as being to bolster the position of Adenauer by granting the Germans sovereign equality at the earliest possible time—within a few weeks at the latest. Officials here say a German contribution is essential to the successful defense of Western Europe, and that every necessary step must be taken to prevent West Germany from reorienting its policies away from the Western Powers and toward Russia.

SESSION—Plans for an emergency NATO session are just being developed. Dulles' Tuesday statement specified neither time nor place. However, Washington officials think that New York late this month should prove convenient to NATO ministers. Many of them are expected there for the Sept. 21 opening of the United Nations General Assembly.

Ambassador John C. Hughes, U.S. member on the Permanent NATO Council at Paris, has been instructed to arrange a prompt meeting of that body to work out time and place.

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Indian Meet To Be Held

KLAMATH AGENCY — Employees of the Indian Affairs office and several members of the tribal executive council will attend a meeting at the Indian service area office in Portland September 9.

The meeting has been called to enlighten all persons who will have a part in assisting with the termination bill releasing the Indians from government supervision as set forth in Public Law 557 passed recently by Congress.

Attending the meeting from here will be W. W. Palmer, superintendent; E. R. Wilcox, forest manager; Matt Spencer, head of the land operations branch, and Mrs. George Shorey, head of the really branch. Several members of the tribal council will also attend.

From Washington, D. C. to assist at the meeting will be a Mr. Lindsey, special coordinator for the commissioner of Indian Affairs and a proponent of the Klamath termination bill.

Israeli Leader Backed By Vote

JERUSALEM, Israeli Sector (U)—Prime Minister Moshe Sharett won a sweeping parliamentary victory of confidence on his foreign policy yesterday after sharply denouncing British-American arming of Israel's Arab neighbors.

The vote was 54-9 with 7 abstentions.

Neuberger Aides Named

J. W. 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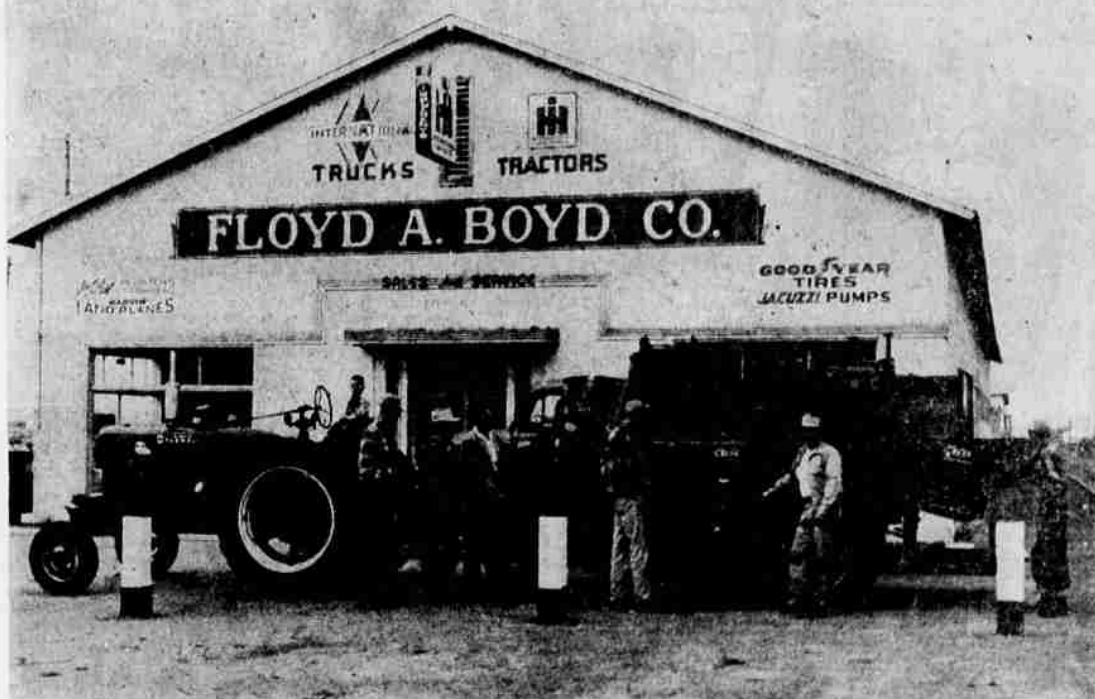
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
