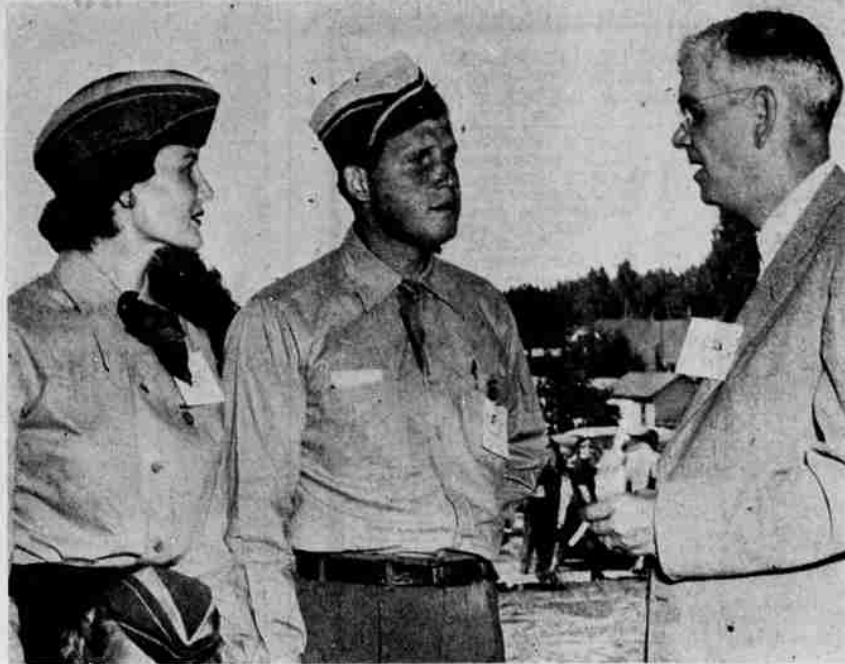

California Health Expert Addresses Teachers Group

Bertha S. Mason, M.D., addressed teachers attending the Lake - Klamath County Institute on "Creating a Good Educational Climate" at the Thursday morning session.

Dr. Mason, member of the child health program board, San Jose City Health Department, evidenced in her talk a wide background of experience in mental health and parent education work. She reiterated the charge to be a "person," relaxed and human, in urging teachers to create a good educational climate.

The mental health authority compared an educational climate to meteorological conditions — generally good days with intermittent bad days and occasional storms. She introduced the following principals as basic to a good educational climate and hence to better teachers and better learning:

(1) Awareness, understanding and acceptance of feelings, good or bad, which will result in better human relations; (2) Acceptance of the premises that all behavior has a cause and that (3) Every person is a human being.

"Learn to be yourself: you cannot be a good teacher unless you are a person first," the doctor said in emphasizing that teachers relax, accept themselves and children the way they are and work from that reality.

She pointed out, however, that a good educational climate can only be achieved where there is an understanding administration.

General discussion on the speaker's topic followed.

The afternoon was devoted to a general session with Anne Sprague, superintendent of Lake County schools presiding.

Today is "Business Industry Education Day," with small groups of teachers visiting 35 business establishments in Klamath Falls.

The tour was arranged by R. Frank Tucker, manager of the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce who spoke briefly to the instructors at Mills School before

start of the tour.

Payment From Tribal Funds Arouses Klamath Members

An unauthorized trip to Washington D.C. by Wade Crawford, defeated candidate for tribal delegate to Congress with expenses paid from tribal funds, has aroused the ire of members of the Klamath Indian tribe, according to a story appearing in Friday's Oregonian.

The payment of \$3105 to cover Crawford's wages and expenses was ordered by Interior Secretary Douglas McKay, the Oregonian states, quoting McKay as saying in a telephone interview "it was a borderline decision in one of those cases where you have to decide on one course of action, pick one and go ahead with the feeling that while this looks the best, you may be wrong."

The controversy started about a year ago when threats of a recall movement against Crawford were heard. At the suggestion of Boyd Jackson, tribal delegate, both delegate positions were declared open and an election date set for the naming of two new delegates, the story continues.

After several persons had been nominated and declined the nomination, only three names remained. Boyd Jackson, Wade Crawford and Crawford's wife Ida Miller Crawford. Jesse Kirk, chairman of the tribal loan board agreed to run as a write-in candidate, and subsequently Jackson and Kirk defeated the Crawford for the two delegate positions. The Crawford was proponents of an immediate liquidation program while Jackson and Kirk favored a long term terminations program.

When Congress reconvened Jackson and Kirk were sent to Washington as tribal delegates, while Crawford made the trip on money gathered from among his supporters in the tribe. He also appeared before a congressional committee to give his views on the proposed termination bill and also asked the Indian bureau to pay his expenses from the tribal trust funds, held by the government.

U.S. Indian Commissioner, Glenn L. Emmons advised Secretary McKay that the tribe should pay Crawford's expenses and the

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Greece and Russia have signed a one year barter trade agreement, with each country to buy five million dollars worth of goods from the other.

Record Salmon Catch Made

SEATTLE (AP) — A record catch of 475,000 sockeyes in a single day by American fishermen was made Wednesday, the Washington State Fisheries Department reported Thursday.

The fish are worth about \$2 apiece to the fishermen. A good catch continued Thursday as the salmon sockeye run headed for British Columbia's Fraser River system. But fishermen officials expressed the belief the peak is past.

The Canadian caught about 150,000 Wednesday, making a total of 625,000 for the two-nation fleets for the day. It lifted the two-week total to about seven million fish.

The Canadian fleet expects to catch up with the American catch as the run nears the Fraser mouth through Canadian waters.

Under an agreement between the two nations, the catch is evenly divided.
