Red Vietnam Free Valiant Dien Bien Phu Commander

HANOI (AP)—Brig. Gen. Christian de Castries, commander of the fallen Indochina fortress of Dien Bien Phu, reached freedom today. The Communist prize prisoner was visibly worn but still buoyant and "hard to kill."

De Castries was brought to Hanoi from the exchange site where the Reds freed him at Vietri. He was met in Hanoi by Gen. Rene Cogny, commander of the withdrawing French forces in North Indochina.

At the exchange point, De Castries leaned on a cane as he was turned over but would not allow himself to be put in a stretcher.

He rode to the exchange site in a Communist command car, accompanied by a Vietnamese colonel and a Communist correspondent.

His first request was for French fried potatoes and something different from his prison diet which was mainly rice.

(The French News Agency reported De Castries stood for a few moments before a number of cameramen and emphasized to them the white flag of surrender had never been raised at Dien Bien Phu.)

told one of his officers died only three days ago.

De Castries, highest ranking officer captured by the Communist rebels in the eight-year Indochina War, won world attention for leading the French stand at Dien Bien Phu. He was captured when the encircled North Indochina position finally fell last May 7 after three months of siege.

The general's wife Jacqueline awaits him in Paris. She had been in Hanoi during the battle of Dien Bien Phu.

De Castries, a dashing six-foot cavalry officer, was reported buoyant, until the end at Dien Bien Phu. He wore a red cavalry cap instead of a steel helmet and brandished a riding crop as he directed the desperate defense.

His last radio message, as the Vietnamese were charging down on his command bunker was:

"We will fight to the end. Vive la France."

He won his promotion from colonel to brigadier general in mid-April while the Dien Bien Phu battle raged. President Eisenhower had remarked a couple of weeks earlier that if he had a colonel in the field conducting such a fight, that colonel already would have been a general.

The general is a son of one of France's oldest military families. Eight of his ancestors were generals. One was a marshal of France and minister of the navy under Louis XVI. Another fought under LaFayette against the British in the American Revolution.

Hitchcock At Work On Movie Thrillers

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Along with his new waistline, Alfred Hitchcock has a new schedule for himself. He's working like a beaver.

With scarcely a chance to catch his breath, the mystery master

has moved from one picture to another. Having just wound up "To Catch a Thief" with Cary Grant and Grace Kelly, he moves right into "The Trouble with Harry." The story, he explains, is not about Truman. It concerns a corpse that turns up and nobody wants to claim. He'll film the farce entirely in New England.

Hitchcock said he hopes to get back to the picaresque or rambling type of melodrama he used to do. Examples: "Saboteur," "Foreign Correspondent." He even has a fanciful plot like the kind he wants to do.

"The picture would have little rhyme or reason," he mused. "It would open at the United Nations, where the Russian ambassador is talking. He says, 'I won't continue if the delegate from Peru continues to sleep through my speech.'"

"They try to awake the Peruvian delegate. But he is dead. And we see a hand come in and tear off a scratch pad with some doodling on it."

"The picture would move in a generally northwest direction. The next scene would show the first of a new line of cars coming off the assembly line in Detroit. There's a body in it."

"Then we go to Alaska, where men are stripping off the layers of fat from a whale. A body

falls out of one of the layers. The final chase—we need a fast last reel—takes place over the ice. The villains are in Eskimo hood, so we can't tell their nationality."

Sounds like another hit for Hitchcock. I suggest he get Charles Adams for technical adviser...

Irving Berlin seldom gets agitated about anything, but it's out to get one law changed. It's the compulsory license fee section of the Patent Act of 1908. It's an obscure law to most people, but a thorn in the side to Berlin.

"Song writers can collect a fee from phonograph firms for use of their songs," he explained, "but we can't control what is done with them."

"For example, I wrote a song called 'White Christmas.' Bing Crosby recorded for Decca, with another song of mine, 'Let's Start the New Year Right.' When Decca took my song off the other side and put on 'Silent Night,' for which they pay no royalty."

So Berlin gets half the royalty he would have gotten. That comes to quite a figure, considering the eight million sales of "White Christmas."

Air Officer Sentenced

TOKYO (AP)—Far East Air Forces said today that Maj. Thomas Pate of Los Angeles, was convicted by court-martial last month of stealing \$200,000 in military property.

He was sentenced to dismissal from the service and seven years at hard labor.

FEAF's belated announcement said the court-martial took place "about Aug. 21," but that its headquarters had not been informed of the trial and verdict by Pate's unit, the Far East Air Materiel Command. The two organizations are about 20 miles apart in the Tokyo area.

No reason for the mixup was given.

Pate pleaded guilty to 21 counts of larceny that together involved theft of checks, money orders, military paymaster's certificates ("GI money") and U.S. currency, the Air Force said.

The major, formerly finance officer at Tachikawa Air Force Base just outside Tokyo, was arrested last March 24.

The Air Force said he had conspired a "fraudulent scheme" to sidetrack worn out military currency that should have been destroyed.

The sentence is subject to review by higher headquarters here and in Washington.
