

B. Morrison, J. Hitson Claim A-Main Wins

Benny Morrison and Johnny Hitson added to their hardtop racing point standings over the weekend as Morrison piloted his K-8 hardtop to the win in Sunday's main event and Hitson won yesterday afternoon's special 50 lap main event at Gem Speedway.

Yesterday's 50-lap special was one of the best races witnessed on the local clay track, and several drivers were in position to take home the win, but Hitson came from behind after a minor tangle with Al Rossi to win the elongated A-main.

Coast League Teams Split Holiday Games

It was strictly give and take in the Pacific Coast League's Labor Day doubleheaders. Everybody split, and there were four shutouts. The torrid pennant race between Hollywood and San Diego Tuesday shows Hollywood still one game in front with seven games to play.

San Diego crushed Oakland in the opener of a doubleheader, 10-0, but the Oaks returned the compliment in the afterpiece, 3-0. Al Lyons, the handyman who cavorts in the outfield and pitches when needed, hit a grand slam homer for the Padres in the opener. San Diego had a seven-run rally in the third inning and knocked out Fred Besana, rookie Oak starter.

Chris Van Cuyk limited San Diego to five hits in the second game, as the Oaks pecked away at Theophilus Smith for eight hits.

Hollywood learned something about the force of high winds that blow over Slick Stadium in Seattle, where the Stars began Tuesday, 7-3, and lost the second, 1-0.

The Seattle run in that second game was quite freakish. George Schmees walked a long fly to center in the first inning. Tommy Saffell of Hollywood raced back toward the fence to make what appeared to be an easy catch. The wind caught the ball and it dropped quickly about 20 feet in front of him. Artie Wilson scoring from second. Gene Bearden held the Stars to five hits while Seattle got six off Mel Queen and Lino Donoso.

Hollywood teed off on Steve Nagy in the first game for three runs in the first inning and coasted to a double steal in this frame with Del Greco scoring.

Milo Candini, who was the winning pitcher in the first game helped along his cause by driving in three runs with a double and a single.

Bob Spicer came through with a four hitter after the intermission and he was backed by home runs by Bob Usher and Fred Richards.

Kramer Looking For Work

NEW YORK (AP)—When a professional promoter goes looking for work, things are bad. Jack Kramer, the tennis tycoon, says his racket is so dead for the time being that, with a fourth child coming soon and one thing and another, he's open to any reasonable offers.

"I've found that the public does not just want to see the best," the former world's champ said glumly. "It's got to have a new young player to get excited about every so often, and there isn't one of that kind around now or even in sight. I've got to find something else to do."

"Tony Trabert asked me for advice and I gave it to him. I told him to forget about turning pro now or any time soon. Of course, if he should help win back the Davis Cup this winter and then win both Wimbledon and our National Championships next summer, that would be different. He would be an attraction then, but I couldn't use him or anybody else now. There's nobody with any record."

So the immediate pickings look lean for Pancho Segura, Frank Sedgman and Pancho Gonzales, whose pockets Kramer has thickly lined with his tours the past two winters. No one disputes that they are the greatest tennis players in the world today—and that's the trouble. Nobody wants to see them prove it again until another amateur with muscles comes along.

Looking to the distant future, perhaps, Kramer has spent the past six weeks chaperoning and coaching a group of promising kids from all over the country. He volunteered to do this last January, and a lot of folks thought the big guy was just looking for some publicity for his pro troupe. If he was he got a surprise, because the Lawn Tennis Assn. took him up on it.

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Seixas Tops Foes In National Tennis Meet

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (AP)—Vic Seixas' victory in the National Tennis Championship after trying for 14 years didn't seem to impress anyone. But it accomplished one end. There wasn't a word today about the handsome Philadelphia not playing singles on the Davis Cup squad this year.

Until he whipped Australia's Rex Hartwig in the final 3-6, 6-2, 6-4 yesterday, Seixas' name seemed to be an anathema with the moguls of the United States Lawn Tennis Assn. They agreed Tony Trabert would be the No. 1 man, but a half-dozen different names were mentioned for No. 2. None was Seixas.

It no doubt was at least partially deserved, Vic was unimpressive in the Challenge round last year and had a mediocre season on grass this summer.

David Cup Captain Billy Talbot allowed as how Seixas played well. "But I've seen him play better," Talbot said. "He had the strokes against Hartwig when he needed them. He also knew the some-where in the match Hartwig was going to stop playing well. He'd have a pretty good chance against Lew Hoad or Ken Rosewall. After

all, they haven't been so outstanding this year."

The new champion was thinking more in terms of doubles even after his singles victory, still insisting the player who was at his best in December in Australia should get the berth.

"I'd like to play against the Australians again," he said. "I'd say we have the definite edge in doubles with Trabert and myself."

We certainly were not as well off last year."

Deris Hart of Coral Gables, Fla., won the women's crown yesterday by stopping Louise Brough of Beverly Hills, Calif., 6-8, 6-1, 8-6.
